### Minister's message

"Let's go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about."



As we enter Advent and then into Christmastide we hear once again the familiar stories of the angel's visit to Mary, the birth of the Christ child, the visits of the shepherds and the wise men, and we too are invited to "go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about."

We don't know a great deal about the shepherds who spoke these words. They are relatively obscure actors in this story. We're not sure if they are hired hands or tending their own flocks. They run to find Jesus, and afterwards, we don't meet them again.

They begin in a rather ordinary space, "living out in the fields" with their sheep. When the angel suddenly appears, they are terrified! Who wouldn't be? Then quickly they move from terror to wonder to delight and finally to joyful worship. Like the people whom the shepherds first told about Jesus, I am once again amazed at what I hear.

After the angelic choir disappears, the shepherds urge each other: "Let's go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about." What else could they do? As I read the Christmas story once again I find myself responding in the same way: "Let's go and see, let's look again into the amazing good news of the child who has been born in Bethlehem!"

My prayer for each one of us is that, however many times we have heard this story, may it awaken in us the joy and wonder of the good news of Jesus' birth!

A happy and blessed Christmas to you all.

#### It's not over yet!

A recent meeting of Chaplaincy ministers was reminded that Covid and 'flu infections are becoming widespread again, and that, given the high proportion of vulnerable people in our congregations, we ought to review our hygiene practices.

After discussion we agreed:

- 1 To urge those feeling at all unwell to consider very carefully whether to attend a Sunday service, for the sake of others who may be there. (This will apply to ministers as well!!)
- 2 To discontinue the physical sharing of the Peace in our services: we encourage members to shake hands with others after the service if they wish.
- 3 To provide hand sanitiser, especially on entering church.
- 4 We were reminded that personal intinction *dipping one's own Bread in the Cup* was identified as a health hazard at the time of the Covid Pandemic, and is specifically not permitted under C of E rules for that reason. Instead, those concerned about drinking from the Cup are encouraged to receive the Bread only.

If you have any questions or concerns about any of this, please speak to one of the ministers.

After giving up our mobile phones (no cheating allowed, though next time maybe smart watches will have to go too!) we had varied and interesting questions which stretched our brains and our knowledge. It was wonderful this year to be back in the hall for the fair, with the cafeteria once again in full swing, fairy lights strung along the walls and the bright stalls ranged at one end with a wide variety of goods for sale from marmalade and chutneys through beautifully decorated Christmas cakes to Christmas cards and gift items. With fewer people available this year to make the dozens of mince pies usually snapped up by our French friends, there were instead extra jars of home-made mincemeat, so our customers could make their own.



The last time we were able to use the hall at Christmas, the fish and chips were so popular we ran out of tables, so this year there were more tables and at the peak lunch time period most were occupied; over 50 portions of fish and chips were enjoyed in addition



to vegetarian quiche and vegetable soup, both home-made. During the afternoon there was another flush of visitors who were happy to sit down with a cup of tea or coffee and sample the variety of homemade cakes available.

The total raised was a wonderful **2,075.88 euros**. Given the number of key people who were away or ill, this was a magnificent result, so many, many thanks to all those who contributed in any way, with their time and their energy, especially that tiny group who really went above and beyond. #### A Christmas carol – without Jesus??

We all love a good Christmas carol, but what would we list as the essentials of a good Christmas carol? *Mary and Joseph?* Of course. *Jesus?* Absolutely. *A stable and animals?* Probably. *Snow?* Possibly. *A good tune?* Certainly! So why do we sing 'Good King Wenceslas'? The tune is great (even if it is borrowed from a carol to welcome the spring!), but apart from lots of snow 'Good King Wenceslas' lacks all the essentials we've just listed!



'Good King Wenceslas' was written (like so many carols) in Victorian times: the author was the great priest and scholar J.M.Neale. The editors of the 1928 'Oxford Book of Carols' were pretty scathing about it: This rather confused narrative owes its popularity to the delightful tune, which is that of a Spring carol. . . . Unfortunately Neale in 1853 substituted for the Spring carol this 'Good King Wenceslas', one of his less

happy pieces, which E. Duncan goes so far as to call 'doggerel', and Bullen condemns as 'poor and commonplace to the last degree'. Oh dear! But where did Neale get the story he turned into a carol? Who was Wenceslas, and how was he 'good'?

Good King Wencesla(u)s (a Duke, actually) was the Christian ruler of Bohemia from 907-935. He was much loved, especially by the poor and vulnerable. Perhaps modelling his ministry on the earlier Bp Nicholas of Myra, Wenceslas would quietly leave his palace at night, accompanied only by a servant, to bring practical help trom his own riches to care for widows and orphans. Wenceslas was the first Christian ruler of the country, and worked hard to unite his country as a Christian nation while resisting constant pressure from neighbouring Hungarian and Saxon raiders.

The reign of Wenceslas ended in martyrdom: his pagan younger brother Boleslav lured him to an ambush and killed him in order to become Duke. Wenceslas was soon reverenced as a saint: a statue of him stands in the centre of Prague, and 28<sup>th</sup> September is celebrated as not only the Feast of St Wencelas, but also as Czech Statehood Day.

The story (and the carol) of St Wenceslas teaches a valuable lesson on how we should respond to the Good News of Christ by living in a way that brings Him glory. It's an especially powerful lesson for the rich, the powerful, the important: it's a reminder that with richness and privilege comes responsibility, the responsibility to care for the poor and struggling, just as Jesus had a special care for them during His ministry on earth. In a world where leaders too often claim the title of Christian yet live lives of selfishness, excess and domination, the example of Wenceslas reminds us of the Gospel teaching about the path that leads to greatness in the Kingdom of heaven. In a world where kindness in rulers is derided as weakness, Wenceslas shows that true Christian leadership combines compassion for the needy with the strength and determination to protect one's people from danger. And that's why the truth about Wenceslas is still worth telling, to remind us why our carol labels him as 'good'.


