Letter from The Rectory ...

The Gift That Keeps on Giving

Here's a trivia question for you: in which decade was the phrase 'The gift that keeps on giving' used in a commercial advert for the first time and for what product?

The phrase implies a present that brings joy and benefit long after it is given. It is a gift with a lasting impact that continues to be appreciated over time. Today it is used to sell all sorts of things, from electronics and magazines to jewellery and chocolates.



But it's also a phrase that's long been used of Jesus, and that's what I want to encourage you to reflect on this Advent and Christmas: in what way is Jesus the gift that keeps on giving in your life?

Shaped for Serving God

Do you know what your SHAPE is?

Spiritual Gifts God's unique gifts to you
Heart's Desire what motivates and excites you; what you love to do
Abilities your talents, knowledge and skills
Personality your character, personal qualities and strengths
Experience your life experiences and what you've gained from them

So my second challenge this Advent and Christmas is to reflect on these five dimensions of you: how God might give you as a gift to others?

Health and Safety

I'm delighted to report that as many of you know, Billy Stevens from the One Big Family is just the right SHAPE to become our Health and Safety Officer and has already made some

significant improvements. He's the inspiration behind moving the tealight stand away from areas where children are likely to be and keeping the gas lighter on the piano out of their reach. He's introduced fire drills ensuring that we've thought through who will do what if we have to evacuate in an emergency. He's produced a loose-leaf folder of all our current risk assessments in the vestry and made sure they are all available to PCC members online. He is most definitely one of God's many gifts to St Martin's.

One Big Family Team

I'm also delighted to report that Rebecca Church has not only joined the OBF planning team but as her day job is working for an American IT company she's also volunteered to take over the website from Peter Dudeney and promote our use of social media. She is another definite gift to St Martin's from God. Elsewhere in this Newsletter you will find her reflection on the parable of the yeast (Matthew 13.33 and Luke 13.21), which she brought to her first planning meeting and was then persuaded to give at the 16th November service, despite being completely unused to public speaking.

St. Peter's Management Group

Someone who is also God's gift to us is Cheryl Griffiths. She's actually a member of the URC down the road but lives near St Peter's and so volunteered to become one of the 'three wise men' (the others being David Irving and Monica Richardson) who together with yours truly signed up to 'Save St Peter's' from closure given that to do so we needed a lay team of at least three who would take on full responsibility for running St Peter's, including managing its finances, H&S and other compliance, building maintenance, churchyard upkeep, social events, worship services etc, etc. If you read the St Peter's reports in this Newsletter and/or Ongar News you will know they are doing an excellent job. But having reached her 80th birthday, Cheryl decided it was time to ease up a bit so whilst she'll continue to bake and organise events, she's standing down from the committee. Thankfully, God has provided another gift in the SHAPE of Jenny Day, who already provides the excellent St Peter's publicity but has now replaced Cheryl in the group, becoming our Minutes Secretary for both that group and the PCC.

Who else is God's Gift to our churches?

I've given just three examples of people who have discovered that their SHAPE means they can be a gift to our churches, but there are plenty more. Truth be told, everyone's SHAPE ensures they can serve God in one way or another, maybe predominantly in the church or maybe predominantly elsewhere, so let's celebrate them all. That leads me to my third Advent and Christmas challenge: who would you like to nominate as a gift from God to be featured in future editions of this magazine? Reflection on the Parable of the Yeast Matthew 13.33 and Luke 13.21

Hello. For those who don't know me, my name is Rebecca and I'm relatively new to this church, and church life in general. Whilst I have always believed in Jesus Christ, and in God, like a lot of the children in this room, I am also a first-time reader of the bible in full – so I'm discovering a lot of Jesus' parables for the first time, including the parable of yeast. When we were planning this service, I shared a few thoughts with Hazel, Caroline and Sally, and Hazel asked if I would share them with you as well. So here goes.

Yeast is tiny. It's almost nothing in your hand, and once it is mixed into the dough you cannot see it any more. There is no dramatic moment where the dough announces that it's rising. It simply expands quietly and steadily, until the whole thing is transformed.

I think Jesus uses yeast because he knows how easily we overlook small things. We often wait for big moments or impressive signs to show us that something holy is happening. But God loves to start small, and work in the hidden places.

Kindness works the same way. Most acts of kindness aren't dramatic or flashy. They're small things, like a friendly word when someone's having a bad day, a bit of patience during an argument, or a text message that says, "I'm thinking of you." These are quiet, unseen things that most people will never notice from the outside. But the person receiving them feels the difference.

Think for a moment about a small act of kindness you've received recently. Maybe someone listened when you needed to talk. Maybe someone showed you grace when you were tired or stressed. It wasn't huge or life changing. But it did something inside you. It made space and helped you breathe. That's yeast at work.

Jesus' parable tells us that yeast spreads. It doesn't stay neatly in one corner of the bowl. It moves through the whole mixture. And that's what kindness does. One kind action can shift the tone of an entire situation. One person choosing calm in a stressful moment can help others calm down, or a person offering compassion can inspire someone else to do the same.

One final thing about yeast, before I start to sound like the Great British Bake Off judge Paul Hollywood. It needs warmth to rise. If the dough is too cold nothing happens. Human hearts are similar. When we show people warmth, they begin to rise. When we offer encouragement instead of criticism, or give second chances instead of shutting people down, we create the conditions where goodness can grow and expand.

What does it mean to feel, and be, safe?

It's holding the hand of someone you love. Or a parent's magic kiss on a grazed knee. It's a baby sound asleep in a loving embrace. That's safe.

It's when you're wrapped up warm and tight, indoors on a dark and cold night, somewhere you know, somewhere that's comfortable, where you can just 'be'. That's safe.

It's knowing you're not on your own because there's someone there at the end of the phone, to call or to text when you're feeling alone. That someone you can always rely on, that shoulder to cry on when things get tough. That's safe.

Safe can be the shield, the defence, the fortress, a lighthouse guiding you through the storm, or the harbour offering protection when the seas get rough.

Or safe can be that big red traffic sign that says stop, there's danger ahead.

And isn't that what the church is called to be? A refuge for the refugee, a sanctuary for the broken. A space for the hurting to find healing, a place for the last, the least, the lost, those on the margins and those in the centre, a place to find meaning. For God's eternal banner over me and you is love. And there is no fear in love for His perfect love casts out all fear and is safe.

We've not lived up to that expectation, we've fallen short, instead we've prioritised our own reputation, and if that's not cause for lamentation, I don't what is.

I don't mean to be the voice of condemnation; it's just time to prioritise the conversation. Giving space for those who need to, to share, to be believed, be renewed and find restoration.

If those things that were once kept out of sight, and covered up, are brought into the open. And we make space for the unspeakable things to be spoken. Their power can be broken.

Because a church that faces its shortcomings, and gives space to listen, reflects something of the kingdom of God. A church which truly loves is a church striving to be safe.

So it's time to put safeguarding on the church's agenda, to change the culture of yesterday, to pause and remember. Because safe is bold, it's the firm foundation beneath our feet, it means we can stand and take the leap of faith to have those conversations and be a church that's safe.

Our next service is the Service of Nine Readings and Carols to be held on Sunday 21st December at 2.30 pm.




Bishop Guli's 'Listening to the Music of the Soul' is this Advent's Big Church Read

Bishop Guli's new book, 'Listening to the Music of the Soul', is the Archbishop of York's chosen Advent Book for 2025 and this year's Big Church Read for Advent.

Drawing inspiration from Mary's Magnificat — "My soul magnifies the Lord" — 'Listening to the Music of the Soul' explores how faith, beauty and courage shape our response to life's joys and sorrows. Born in Iran and forced into exile after the Revolution, Bishop Guli reflects on her own story of loss and hope, connecting it to the themes of Advent: exile, fear, and the transforming power of grace.

Each chapter links to a piece of music, inviting us to consider the melodies that sustain us as our lives unfold.
