The Word of God

Psalm 146:4-10

⁴Happy are those who have the God of Jacob for their help, ◆ whose hope is in the Lord their God;

⁵Who made heaven and earth, the sea and all that is in them; ♦ who keeps his promise for ever;

⁶Who gives justice to those that suffer wrong ◆ and bread to those who hunger.

⁷The Lord looses those that are bound; ◆ the Lord opens the eyes of the blind;

⁸The Lord lifts up those who are bowed down; ♦ the Lord loves the righteous;

⁹The Lord watches over the stranger in the land; he upholds the orphan and widow; ◆ but the way of the wicked he turns upside down.

They shall see the glory of the LORD, the majesty of our God.

³Strengthen the weak hands, and make firm the feeble knees.
⁴Say to those who are of a fearful heart, 'Be strong, do not fear! Here is your God. He will come with vengeance, with terrible recompense. He will come and save you.'

⁵Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; ⁶then the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of the speechless sing for joy. For waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert; ⁷the burning sand shall become a pool, and the thirsty ground springs of water; the haunt of jackals shall become a swamp, the grass shall become reeds and rushes.

⁸A highway shall be there, and it shall be called the Holy Way; the unclean shall not travel on it, but it shall be for God's people; no traveller, not even fools, shall go astray.

⁹No lion shall be there, nor shall any ravenous beast come up on it; they shall not be found there, but the redeemed shall walk there.

¹⁰And the ransomed of the LORD shall return, and come to Zion with singing; everlasting joy shall be upon their heads; they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away.

Canticle

Lift up your voice with strength, O herald of good tidings.

¹The wilderness and the dry land shall rejoice, ◆ the desert shall blossom and burst into song.

²They shall see the glory of the Lord, ♦ the majesty of our God.

³Strengthen the weary hands, ♦ and make firm the feeble knees.

⁴Say to the anxious, 'Be strong, fear not, your God is coming with judgement, ◆ coming with judgement to save you.'

⁵Then shall the eyes of the blind be opened, ◆ and the ears of the deaf unstopped;

⁶Then shall the lame leap like a hart, ♦ and the tongue of the dumb sing for joy.

⁷For waters shall break forth in the wilderness, ♦ and streams in the desert;

⁸The ransomed of the Lord shall return with singing, ◆ with everlasting joy upon their heads.

⁹Joy and gladness shall be theirs, ♦ and sorrow and sighing shall flee away.

Isaiah 35.1, 2b-4a, 4c-6, 10

Second Reading: Matthew 11:2-11

²When John heard in prison what the Messiah was doing, he sent word by his disciples ³and said to Jesus, 'Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?' ⁴Jesus answered them, 'Go and tell John what you hear and see: ⁵the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them. ⁶And blessed is anyone who takes no offence at me.'

⁷As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds about John: 'What did you go out into the wilderness to look at? A reed shaken by the wind? ⁸What then did you go out to see? Someone dressed in soft robes? Look, those who wear soft robes are in royal palaces. ⁹What then did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. ¹⁰This is the one about whom it is written, "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you."

¹¹Truly I tell you, among those born of women no one has arisen greater than John the Baptist; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he.'

Gospel Canticle: Benedictus

And for those who feel alone and unloved, forgotten by a society that doesn't seem to care. Silence

Friend and Saviour, may they feel your loving touch.

The Messiah came to bring hearing to the deaf. Loving God, we pray for those with poor hearing. Silence

And for all those who are deaf to your Word, hearing only the noisy clamour of the world. *Silence*

Word of Salvation, may they hear your call.

The Messiah came to raise the dead. Loving God, we pray for the recently bereaved. Silence

And for all those whose lives are empty and dark, entombed by feelings of hopelessness and sorrow. *Silence*

Victor over death, may they find new life in you.

We make our prayers joyfully in the name of him who came to bring good news to the poor and all humankind. **Amen.**
