

Profile of the Parishes of Ewhurst & Bodiam East Sussex 2026

The parishes include the villages of Bodiam, Ewhurst Green, Staplecross and Cripps Corner Rural idylls, twelve to fourteen miles from the coast, with enthusiastic residents of all ages.

The Parishes

- The two parishes are held in plurality.
- The patrons of St James's are King's College, Cambridge.
- The patrons of St Giles' are All Soul's, Oxford.
- The service style at all the churches is in the central tradition of the Church of England,

Ewhurst Parish

The parish has a population of 2700, with 150 in Ewhurst Green.

- St James The Great, Ewhurst Green is at the heart of the village physically and emotionally; a beautiful building set in a well-kept churchyard with far reaching views. It has an active church life with involvement in many spiritual and social activities. The church and churchyard are supported and maintained by the wider parish and the church really is at the heart of the community opposite the White Dog Inn. The PCC are committed and there is a good congregation for the weekly services at 9.30am.
- St Mark's, Staplecross is a mission church with a small but faithful congregation presenting an opportunity for outreach, especially to the school and the younger families in the village. Staplecross is a lively village with its own pub, shop and a wide range of community and social activities including a bonfire society. Services are held twice a month at 11.15am alternating with St Giles'.

Bodiam Parish

- St Giles' Church, Bodiam. For a rural church St Giles' has a relatively young and lively PCC many of whom are engaged in community and other activities. Pub quizzes, coffee mornings, post-service wine and coffee are part of the programme. There is an opportunity to build on this and to grow the relationship with Bodiam CE Primary School and Claremont private secondary school. Laughter is a critical part of the mix of church life. There are two services per month: a simple friendly family service and a BCP Communion, both at 11.15am. The 2011 census gave a total of 395 people in Bodiam Parish.

The Place

East Sussex sometimes feels like the South of England's best kept secret but...

- We have an extraordinary quality of environment from the South Downs through the Rother Valley to Rye Harbour. In the county we have: Ashdown Forest, Hastings Pier, the Seven Sisters; and Eastbourne claims to be the sunniest spot in Britain. Sussex wine is now world renowned and vineyards dot the area.
- We have an amazingly rich culture and heritage ranging from Bonfire societies to the Bloomsbury group at Charleston, 20th century art at Hastings Contemporary, the Towner Gallery, Eddie Izzard and others at the De La Warr and Glyndebourne. Winnie the Pooh, Keane, Paul McCartney and Roger Daltrey of the Who live here. JMW Turner and Quentin Blake painted here; Charles Lamb, Henry James, Virginia Woolf and Rudyard Kipling wrote here, and there is just that little matter of a Battle in 1066. More locally there are two independent cinemas, great music with festivals at Peasmarsh, Rye, Marlborough House Vinehall School and Battle and the world class Hastings Piano Competition.
- We have London and Brighton, close enough for day visits. Gatwick airport and the Channel Tunnel and ports are within an hour - Heathrow is not much further. Robertsbridge and Etchingham stations (for Charing Cross) are a short drive away and the A21 is the principal trunk road towards London and the M25.
- There is a good range of private and state schools across the county and in neighbouring Kent. In our own parishes we have Bodiam C of E Primary School, Staplecross Methodist Primary School and Claremont, a private secondary school in Bodiam. The county has two universities and three colleges of further education.
- The parishes have a village store, three pubs, the Hub, a community hub and café, Bodiam Castle, Kent and East Sussex steam heritage railway. Tescos and Waitrose are at Hawkhurst around 3 miles away.
- Farm shops and local produce of high quality are available nearby.

The Home

- The Rectory is a charming 1960s brick built house in an edge-of-the-village location within walking distance of St James's Church and the popular village pub.
- Set back from the lane with a large front drive with parking for three cars and a useful single garage.
- The house benefits from a south-facing 2/3rd acre garden, with far reaching views. It is mostly laid to lawn and mature shrubs. The retiring incumbent was a keen gardener so there is a vegetable plot and cutting garden.
- The house has a large attractive sitting room/dining room - ideal for entertaining or quiet evenings in - with a wood burner and French windows to the garden, it is the perfect room for all times of the year.
- The downstairs is flooded with light from the many south facing windows and includes a good-sized study, kitchen (with a new oven), utility room, WC and entrance hall.
- Upstairs there are four good-sized bedrooms, two of which enjoy the magnificent views, plus a family bathroom and separate WC.
- As well as the wood burner, the house has oil-fired central heating throughout plus an alarm system.
- The Rectory is in good repair and decorative order after a major overhaul in 2017.

Transport links

There are good road links to London and the M25 via the A21 and the coast via the A259 and A27. South Eastern rail service from nearby Robertsbridge or Etchingham stations with direct lines to Tunbridge Wells, Tonbridge and London Charing Cross or Cannon Street, and to Hastings and St. Leonard's on the coast. The trains service also links to Gatwick and Thames Link.

There are two excellent garages in Ewhurst and Cripps Corner and a petrol station at Sandhurst.

Local Amenities

- **Ewhurst Green** Sports and leisure facilities in Herdman Pavilion with Pilates and Yoga classes and in the grounds there is outdoor keep fit equipment, a Boules court and a children's play area. It is also used for a popular monthly wine club, parties and other celebrations together with clubs for children's football at weekends. There is a good network of footpaths across glorious countryside within easy reach of the Rectory. The White Dog Inn is opposite the church.
- **Staplecross** Londis store and post office. A Village Hall utilised by the primary school for PE, Women's Institute meetings, Art Classes and other community events. Bonfire Society, Bowls and Stoolball clubs, Pre-school playgroup in St Mark's Church room, which has a kitchen and toilet facilities and is available for small evening or weekend events; Staplecross Social Club and the newly revived Cross Inn pub with restaurant.
- **Bodiam** Recreation ground and pavilion. Annual School Fundraising Day. Regular 'Meet Up' Club. A Parish Room for meetings and activities. There is a local network of walks. Hospitality venues include the Castle Inn, the Hub café and community space, Kent & East Sussex heritage Railway at Bodiam Station, shortly to be extended to Robertsbridge and the mainline service to London and Hastings. Railway enthusiast priests will be particularly welcome as the railway is largely manned and built by volunteers.

Medical services

There is an excellent hospital, the Conquest, about seven miles away in Hastings and four doctors' surgeries in the area: two in Hawkhurst and one in Northiam and Sedlescombe respectively.

Local Schools

Bodiam Church of England Primary School is a small rural school in the village. It is a voluntary controlled school whose vision for its Christian community is that pupils feel valued for who they are, reach their full potential through high quality learning experiences and are ready for life in an ever-changing world. This vision is guided by the Christian values of compassion, friendship and tolerance with the theological underpinning that 'we love our neighbour as ourselves' (Mark 12:31).

The school has 66 pupils and a special relationship with the wider community in Bodiam through its association with the Parish Church of St. Giles. Pupils attend church regularly for events and celebrations. The Vicar of Bodiam is a foundation governor (ex-officio) and supports the pupils by leading Collective Worship on occasion. There is also a "foundation" governor appointed by the Diocese from Bodiam.

The school has a well-established caring ethos and is renowned for its strong pastoral care which contributes to the wonderful family feel which is regularly commented upon. The 2024 SIAMS report remarked "the Christian vision of Bodiam school serves its context very well. It is a simple yet profound vision that results in a close-knit school community supporting and nurturing each other day by day". The 2025 Ofsted Report: the school is "Good" in 4 categories and "Outstanding" in behaviour and attitudes. <https://bodiamceschool.co.uk/>

Claremont School is a non-selective independent school, and the senior school is based in Bodiam: the junior school is just outside Hastings. Claremont Senior School opened in 2011 and caters for 340 pupils, 100 of whom are accommodated in boarding houses in Battle and St Leonard's. Judged 'Outstanding' by Ofsted the school has a highly successful Football Academy and was recently named 'Independent School of the Year for Performing Arts'. Students move on to higher education and a wide range of major universities. The school plans to offer some of its facilities including the pool to the local community. <http://www.claremontschool.co.uk/senior/>

Staplecross Methodist Primary School is a Methodist controlled primary school with 88 pupils although the teaching is non-denominational. In its brochure, the Head explains that the school's aim is to develop each child spiritually, morally, socially and culturally. There are strong links between the school and the congregations at St James's & St Mark's. The Head welcomes this contact with the church. End-of-term, Harvest, Christmas and other services are held at St. Mark's. <http://www.staplecross.e-sussex.sch.uk/>

There are two excellent local play groups, one at Staplecross based in St Mark's Hall and the other, Bodiam Pre-School at the Parish room.

St James The Great, Ewhurst Green

Ewhurst Green is an attractive village with the White Dog Inn and Herdman Pavilion - a small community space. Yoga, Pilates and the Wine club are regularly held here, as well as providing a facility for football coaching for children.

- **St James The Great** church is on the village green and a chain of prayer has taken place on this site for 800 years. The current building has some 12th century architectural features, but was completed in the 14th century.
- The Grade I listed building is in good order, with all works completed as recommended by the most recent quinquennial report, at a cost of over £35,000, thanks to the generosity of parishioners and grants received.
- The churchyard is well maintained by many volunteers. Even the cleaning is done by rota, the church is open daily and visited by many as seen in the Visitors' book.
- A Tea Station was installed in 2020 and has enabled vibrant community activities such as regular 'Talks @ St James's' during the summer months, coffee mornings, and for the last two years the Harvest Supper has been held in church, catering for over 40 people on each occasion.
- Talks attract parishioners beyond the regular congregation. Recent speakers have included 'The Glass House' - a charity working with female prisoners through horticulture, a local family-run vineyard, and a Brigadier from the congregation marking the 80th anniversary of VE Day.
- There is a keen active band of bellringers who ring at Ewhurst and Bodiam.
- We have a group of loyal and talented flower arrangers who always go the extra mile particularly for special occasions and events.

Services and the church community

There is a weekly sung 9.30am Holy Communion Service CW & BCP alternating. Vestments are worn. In our vacancy, we have been blessed with a regular rota of retired clergy. The continuity has ensured the congregation has remained faithful. Visiting clergy are happy to provide references from their first-hand experience.

The congregation is made up of active retirees and has recently been joined by a younger cohort. Many join in the services as readers, intercessors and servers. The large input from the congregation and wider parish facilitates the smooth running of the church and the well-kept churchyard. This cuts down on parish expenses. A lunch in the church is held periodically to thank the army of helpers, most recently on the visit of The Right Reverend Dr Martin Warner, Bishop of Chichester, for our patronal festival in 2025.

PCC and administration

During the vacancy the sole churchwarden has been assisted by the Reader. The remaining seven PCC members have all helped, playing to their strengths. We have six meetings a year, four in the church and two in winter months in a warm house. As expected, there is a Safeguarding Officer for both churches of the parish.

Finance

We pay our Parish Share monthly in full. The Parish Giving Scheme is well established, and, together with offerings at church services and rental income from the Pre-School Playgroup at Staplecross, the churches' running costs are covered.

The recent investment in the Quinquennial Inspection work, the organ refurbishment, and the lightning conductor upgrade have hopefully reduced the risk of major expenditure in the immediate term. Funds exist towards future expenditure on Fabric, the Organ, St Marks, and a fund for the provision of Christian books and other resources for outreach to children.

We have recently introduced contactless card giving which is available at services and has been especially helpful at special events.

Supporting other charities, whose focus is to relieve those in need, forms an important part of our mission. This includes: TARIRO an educational charity in Zimbabwe, and Family Support Work, the diocesan charity supporting local families in distress. We support Rye Food Bank with monthly donations of food and other items, and occasional financial gifts. After the Talks at St James's, the speaker is encouraged to designate a charity of their choice to which we send donations.

St Mark's Staplecross and Cripps Corner

Staplecross is a large village about a mile from Ewhurst Green. It has a primary school, a well-supported village hall, a Londis general store & post office, a thriving public house and several garden centres.

Cripps Corner is less than a mile from Staplecross with a garage/workshop and several small businesses.

St Mark's church in Staplecross was built in the 19th century and has a small but loyal congregation. Attached to the church is a small hall with a kitchen which is used for church events and is hired out to the village pre-school playgroup, providing a useful income to the church. The playgroup use it 4-5 days a week and is inspected by Ofsted, who gave a rating of Good in 2022.

Services

St Mark's holds two services a month at 11.15am including a Morning Praise and Holy Communion. These alternate with St Giles', Bodiam on the other two Sundays in the month. An annual Carol Service is held for the Bonfire Boyes which is well attended.

The running of St Mark's church is currently organised by one member of the PCC who acts as deputy warden.

Future Plans:

An enthusiastic younger group are working on innovative plans to engage the young families in Staplecross. As yet they are in the early stages of planning, but it is a very positive germ & hopefully will bear fruit. We also aim to deepen our long-established contacts with the local school.

Church Community and the Parish

There are 68 on the electoral roll, the weekly congregation averaging 35-40 over the year. As in many rural parishes, there is a wide range of churchmanship, but we try to be sensitive to everybody's needs. In our services we are reverential but understated. We are fortunate to have the services of three organists and although there is no choir, several members of the congregation are keen singers and form an occasional choir for Special Services.

What we do well:

- Give a warm welcome to visitors with care, concern and friendship shown for the church family.
- Keep St James's church open daily for visitors whatever their needs.
- Harness a wide range of talents and skills across the parish to help us with the Church and churchyard maintenance both practically and financially.
- Maximise and appreciate what our three organists, Richard, Ian and Philippa provide in services and recitals.
- Organise monthly talks at St James's to reach out to the wider parish.
- Support charities whose work assists those in need who are beyond our immediate environment.

What we aim to do:

- Keep the church at the very heart of the community.
- Develop further our outreach programme, including responding to the needs of families in Staplecross.

The Church

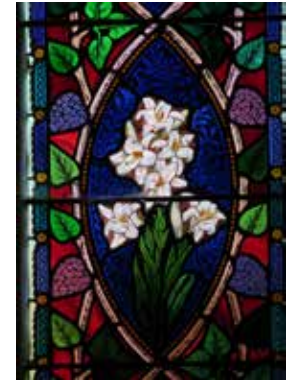
St Giles' sits above the village of Bodiam on the Sandhurst road. It is a Grade II listed building, the fabric of which was constructed of Hastings sandstone in the late 14th century but was significantly restored by RC Carpenter between 1845 and 1856 and features in Pevsner's series "the Historic Buildings of England". It has a glorious stained-glass 'Lily' window of particular significance and the peal of six bells, which are located in an internal bell tower, are considered to be very fine and are usually rung before each service by a local group of bell-ringers. One of the bells is dedicated to the Emperor Haile Selassie.

Given its secluded location, St Giles' is locked during the day but all members of the PCC have a key and the church is opened on request. The Churchyard remains open for members of the local community and is well maintained in naturalistic style. The church has an organ which is in good condition and we have a number of local organists who play at special services. For regular services, there is a very effective computerised organ system, which is operated by members of the PCC and is used to very good effect – many visitors have been surprised to find the organ was in fact housed in a small lap-top and not the organ loft!

A major overhaul of the roof and rainwater ware costing in excess of £40,000 was completed in 2023. Interior decoration and lighting improvement will start in 2026. These have been funded by historic fundraising and two very generous legacies which leave a substantial reserve. A quinquennial inspection is due this year but we will be surprised if any other than minor works are required.

Services There are two services a month. The first is a family service which attracts all ages and a popular feature is the refreshments served after the service, which also serves as an important forum for conversation and fellowship. The more formal service is the celebration of the Eucharist on the third Sunday:

1st Sunday	11.15am Family Service – average congregation approx. 20.
3rd Sunday	11.15 am Holy Communion (BCP) average congregation approx. 12

Special Services: in addition to weddings, christenings and funerals, Festival services are held for Easter, Christmas (including Carols by Candlelight which frequently has a congregation in excess of 80) and Remembrance Sunday. Members of the PCC co-ordinate all services on a rota basis. The church is prepared for the service, readers are arranged and the intercessions are usually led by a designated member of the PCC for each service. A team of flower arrangers drawn from the wider community beautifies the church for services.

St Giles' PCC

St Giles' is blessed with an active and cohesive PCC who enjoy the fellowship and friendship of belonging to the St Giles' community. The churchwardens take responsibility for much of the administration, ably and willingly supported by the PCC.

It consists of the incumbent, the two churchwardens, Graham Peters and Rachel Piper, and 5 remaining members including the secretary and treasurer; two PCC members are representatives on the deanery synod. Members have all been chosen for their commitment to St Giles' and also the particular skill set which they bring, and include: an accountant, surveyor, ex-publican, a PA or two, a retired entertainment and comedy impresario and an investment manager. The PCC also includes some excellent cooks! A member of the congregation, a former nurse and school matron, is the safe-guarding officer and attends necessary training days.

The PCC meets on average 5 times annually, and there are 59 names on the electoral roll.

Finances

Finances are in good shape and St Giles' pays its Parish Share in full. Our regular donors cover our share of the parish contribution and regular church maintenance costs etc. We have been most fortunate recently to receive two very generous bequests which have enabled major building work whilst leaving a significant reserve. The Crittall fund provides comforts for the incumbent at the discretion of the church wardens of St Giles.

Communications

Over the past few years, email has been the principal medium of communication between members of the PCC, the incumbent and the wider congregation. An email is sent before every service to remind parishioners of timings and often the theme. This is particularly useful given that St Giles' does not have a service every week. It is also used to notify parishioners of any other relevant events. Social media are used to publicise major events.

The truly excellent monthly parish magazine has a designated section to cover all matters relating to St Giles' including event promotion and is well read throughout the wider community.

St Giles' and the Community The PCC is very aware that, although not all members of the local community attend St Giles' on a regular basis, the church is still perceived as a fundamental pillar of village life. We are fortunate that fundraising and events have historically drawn donations and participation from the wider community.

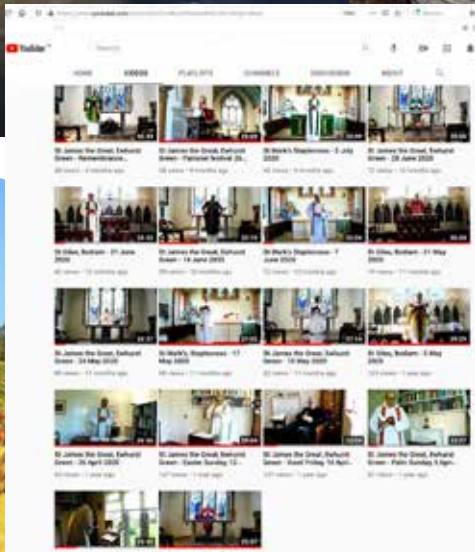
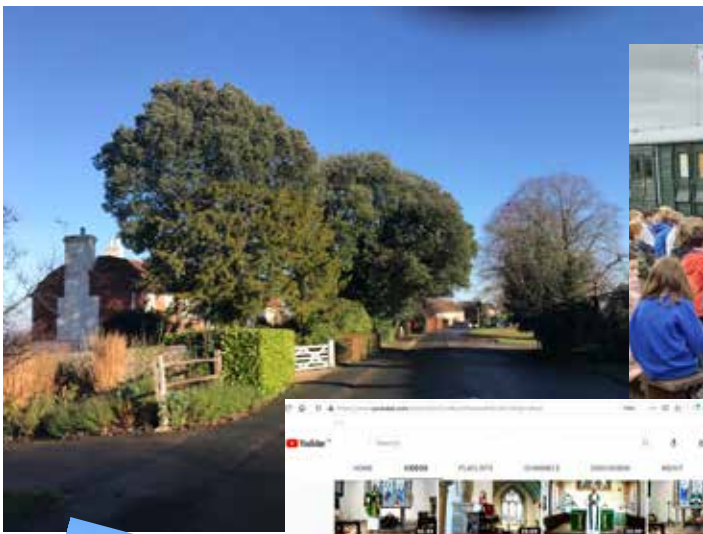
The church also participates in outward giving, for example after Harvest Festival, produce is donated to the Seaview homeless charity in Hastings. In addition, we have hosted a number of events which focus on including the whole Bodiam community: a regular and very popular pub Quiz at the Castle Inn, annual coffee morning and Community harvest supper at the Castle Inn.

The Parker and Ashcombe Trust owns four alms flats and a house in Bodiam. The house contains the Parish Room, a subsidised community meeting room. The vicar is an ex-officio member of the trust and also an ex-officio governor of Bodiam CE School. The school holds festival services in St Giles' church - neither post demands much time.
