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# STEEP WELCOME CLUB

The Club was founded soon after the arrival of the Reverend Douglas Snelgar and his wife Pam in Steep in 1957. At that time the Mothers' Union met in a room in the vicarage grounds. As Pam and Douglas had no children as yet, Douglas decided to close the Mothers' Union and start a new group for anyone over 60. This met at the Village Hall and so Steep Welcome Club was born.

The club met once a month for table games, speakers, tea, and a chat. Folk paid a fee of two shillings for each meeting. A benefactor provided funds for outings and a Christmas party, and a domestic servant made cakes for the teas, and used to sit in the kitchen of the hall making sandwiches. Various visits to gardens were arranged in the summer.

However, the club gradually dwindled and by the late 1990s had ceased. In 2009 however a small group of enthusiasts felt this type of social event should be revived.

The Welcome Club we have today evolved from this and is now open to anyone, in or around the parish, who would like some social interaction, and can in actual fact be any age.

The meetings are held on the second and fourth Thursdays of the month, from 2.30pm to 4.30pm,

mainly meeting as before in the Village Hall. The club provides an opportunity for those who would like to come together for an activity followed by tea, homemade sandwiches and cake, and lively chat.

Our programme tries to reflect the interests of our members and our local environment. Indoor activities include quizzes, talks, films, demonstrations, discussions and music. We visit further afield in the summer with various outings, sometimes in members' homes or gardens and which include lunch or tea.

At Christmas, we have a festive lunch in a seasonally decorated Village Hall with entertainment and carol singing by all.

We have a willing band of volunteers and will always welcome more.

We hope the Welcome Club will continue to be an integral part of village life, responding to the wants of the members.

And we look forward to seeing you if you would like to join us - we are exactly as our name says!

## STEEP PARISH COUNCIL

### Council Membership

Following a recent resignation, Paul Nayton was co-opted onto the Council. We are pleased to welcome Paul and thank him for stepping forward.

### Key Matters Discussed

The Council discussed concerns relating to potentially contaminated water and the possible installation of traffic survey cameras to determine whether vehicle weight restrictions in Steep Marsh are being observed. Further investigation is required before progress can be made, and these matters will be revisited over the coming months. Residents with an interest are encouraged to attend future meetings.

In the village, a group of residents is exploring crowdfunding to purchase a plot of land and place it in trust, protecting it from development despite it currently being outside the settlement boundary. Consideration is also being given to whether the land

could be designated an Asset of Community Value.

### County and District Updates

Our Hampshire County Councillor, Russell Oppenheimer, reported that the County's recommendation is to proceed with local elections in May.

District Councillor Nick Drew highlighted the growing problem of potholes and urged residents to continue reporting them via:

### SSEN Electricity Substation Proposal

SSEN has approached the Parish Council with an aim to explore if it would be possible to install a new electricity substation at the Village Hall as part of a multi-million pound "beautification" scheme. This would remove visible overhead cables in the valley north of Church Road and eliminate some substations currently located in residents' gardens.

SSEN has submitted one proposed location, so the Council is working at exploring all options before any final decision is made. The Council noted that while it may support improvements to the vista and part of the village's electricity supply, the Sole Managing Trustee of the Village Hall may understandably take a different view.

### Road Naming – New Development

The SDNPA and Royal Mail are now at the stage of considering road

names for the new development adjacent to the Village Hall. Their current suggestion is “The Green”, but we are seeking residents’ input for this lasting legacy. Please send any suggestions to the Parish Clerk at:

### **Church Road / Mill Lane Area Improvements**

For some time, the Council and the Village Hall have been working on ideas to improve the appearance of the Church Road/Mill Lane junction, the new Public Open Space, the Village Hall Land, and the Hall itself, aiming to treat the area as a single, coherent whole.

As a result, the Council has decided to seek some co-ordinated artistic sketches to help illustrate possible improvements for residents. We are approaching local residents known to have relevant skills and would welcome hearing from any architectural or landscape artists willing to help. Please contact the Parish Clerk if you are interested.

### **Finance and Budget**

Although the Parish Precept (the portion of Council Tax that funds the Parish Council) was increased in line with inflation at the December meeting, approval of the detailed budget was delayed to iron out some finer details.

However, several notable potential

future projects were highlighted:

- £5,000 pa to establish a savings fund for the replacement of play equipment on the Common in the next 3–5 years.

- Up to £18,000 for professional fees to develop proposals for Church Road, Mill Lane, the Village Hall, and the Public Open Space, subject to parish support.

- £20,000 in both 2026–27 and 2027–28 to *potentially* progress a Neighbourhood Plan. The council will be seeking the advice of a specialist consultant to determine the benefits of proceeding sooner rather than later.

### **Grants**

A grant of £450 was awarded to the Newsletter. Two larger grant applications were not approved, although the Council expressed a strong desire to find alternative ways to support the Cricket Club.

### Works on the Common

Councillor Shannon Askew has overseen renovation works to the entrance to the Common, including improved drainage inside the gate. The pedestrian gate has been improved in several ways.

First, it closes completely which will be a safer system for everyone including the Steep Primary School children who use the Common at play-times.

Second, it is now accessible for everyone, including those in wheel-chairs and is more useable for people with pushchairs.

The holes in the entrance surface have been repaired, and the surface has been replaced.

A new soak away system has been dug down into the ground on the Common side which will improve the drainage resulting in less mud around the gateways.

A deep channel was dug into the clay from the gateway entrance down towards the wood on the right-hand side. This created a drainage system to take excess water from the gateway and drain into the lower area.

Thanks to Arbolec for carrying out the work in rather bad weather!

The cost of the work was paid for by Steep Parish Council and a grant from SDNPA which was used to pay

for half of the project.

If anyone would like the astroturf beside the gate, then please help yourself. It is muddy but will wash off and it could cover a bare patch in your garden!

The work is now complete, and we are sure residents will agree that the improvements are very welcome.

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## REFLECTIONS ON KARL JENKINS' *THE ARMED MAN*

One of the most appealing things to me about Froxfield Choir is the variety it has shown over the years, and one never knows quite what's coming next. Two years ago, we sang Duke Ellington's Sacred Concert and last year in the summer we tackled the mountain of Brahms' German Requiem, a really tough sing – never any time to sit down – but I think we sang it well, with at the end that familiar feeling of pleased exhaustion. Then in the autumn came Karl Jenkins' *The Armed Man*, something very different. Essentially it is an anti-war piece, composed in 1999 in reflection of 'the most war-torn and destructive century in human history' and as a message of hope that the world of the future would have more peace and fewer wars.

Now, I am writing this in January 2026, a month when we all hope for better things, but in spite of our pious wishes the world continues to rage – in the Middle East, in Ukraine, in Venezuela and Iran – and that's just for starters; and as I look back on *The Armed Man* last November, I can't help feeling that Karl Jenkins' subliminal message was 'when will we ever learn?'

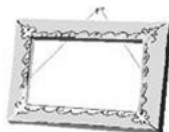
But to the music. I could sum it up and say it is a mixture of the sublime and the savage, with moments that shock in their bleakness, and moments where one feels pure joy. We started off singing and stamping our feet to a 15th century French marching song, with the piccolos egging us

on. That set the scene for war, but here came the first surprise: a muezzin, with powerful voice and snowy white vestments, sang the Muslim call to prayer, and that was tremendously moving. Next came another twist, with the familiar words of the Kyrie Eleison, and that was followed by beligerent music which we knew presaged war.

I've said the music was a mixture of sublime and savage, but it was the words that really got to me. They came from a variety of sources, and most poignant was when we got to the immediate aftermath of war in the section called Angry Flames. This is brutal stuff, much the more so when one realises that what we were singing was a direct quotation from a Japanese man, Sankichi Tobi, as he describes what he found at Hiroshima (he survived the bombing but died of leukaemia later).

It was a relief when we moved on to see the resumption of peace – tremendously moving Agnus Dei and Benedictus, before the last rousing anthem "Better is Peace" with its quiet contemplative resolution at the

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end. We stood stock still in silence for it seemed an age before Michael, our conductor, slowly lowered his hands to break the spell.

Nobody I feel could sing this work and be untouched, nor feel its relevance. No wonder it is the most sung choral work in the world today.

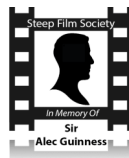

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## LENTIL SOUP

What could be better for lunch on a chilly winter's day but home-made soup? Try this one!

### Ingredients:

2 litres of good vegetable stock or ham stock if you eat meat  
150g red lentils  
6 carrots, peeled and finely chopped  
2 medium leeks, trimmed and sliced  
Good handful of chopped parsley

Heat the stock in a large saucepan and add the lentils. Bring to the boil and let the lentils soften for a few minutes.

Add carrots and leeks and check seasoning.

Bring to the boil again, reduce heat, cover and simmer gently for 45 minutes to an hour until the lentils have broken down. (Partly cooked lentils are vile as well as indigestible!) sprinkle with parsley and serve with warmed, chunky buttered rolls. Perfect for a cold day!



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# RON'S NOTES

The trouble with **gathering winter fuel** is that to a naturalist the fuel is a haven for all manner of plants and animals. Branches and logs are covered in all sorts of ferns, mosses, fungi and lichens. **John Wyndham** (lived in Steep and attended Bedales School) had 'Trouble with Lichen' but whether he pronounced them 'Liken' or 'Lichen' I do not know. All sorts of animals use logs too.

**Plants** appear simple enough and include trees, herbs, and grasses that have flowers and reproduce with seeds. **Ferns** however, release spores from the undersides of their feathery fronds. **Mosses** lack roots, flowers or seeds, reproduce with spores, and have only very simple very thin leaves that transport water and nutrients.

**Fungi** are a kingdom of their own and decompose organic matter using enzymes to allow them to absorb nutrients. The great bulk of larger fungi comprise thin filamentous hyphae that either penetrate deep into decaying wood or form extensive underground networks, the 'wood-wide-web', linking with and connecting the roots of trees and plants. Given the right conditions, fungi send up **mushrooms** and **toadstools** that produce and release spores. **Lichens** (lichenised fungi) are a symbiotic complex relationship between certain fungi and the algae and bacteria they support.

**Animals** too. **Wood mice**, **bank voles** and **hedgehogs** will use firewood log piles for shelter as will **frogs**, **toads**, **newts** and **grass snakes**. **Slime moulds** (colourful clumped amoeba-

like creatures), will slowly slide across damp logs and then harden and produce spores.

Carnivorous **centipedes** with venomous front legs, and algae-eating **millipedes**, will forage across the logs and cracks in the wood. **Woodlice** (related to crabs) will be sheltering and feeding on decaying wood and many insects, such as **beetles** and **ants**, will use the shelter and hunting grounds. **Spiders** of many species will hunt around dead wood and lay their egg sacs in cracks and crevices. **Slugs** and **snails** relish rotting wood. Many **micro-moths** and **butterflies** will hibernate in cracks in the wood and emerge when brought indoors into the warm.

Having checked out the tree stems and branches for their biodiversity it is time to get the chain saw and the axe out and start destroying the wonderful habitat and stacking the split logs to become colonised with a whole new range of creatures over the winter and summer.
