

Light-bulb Moments

Do you ever experience 'light-bulb' moments? Something which hasn't made sense suddenly becomes so clear and obvious. Or maybe a revelation—'Well, I never knew that before!' That's why we call this season at the beginning of January '*Epiphany*'. Epiphany means a sudden realisation or understanding; a revelation. January 6th is the date when we focus on the Wise Men visiting Jesus with their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

Jesus was probably a toddler by the time they arrived, which was why King Herod ordered all the children under 2 years old to be killed. They'd travelled several hundred miles, probably from Persia. They were astrologers, astronomers and seers (literally wise men who advised at the King's court), learned men who had studied the science and philosophies of the time. They noticed an unusually bright star in the sky and believed it indicated something important. It must have been extraordinary for them to make such a journey into the unknown. They were so sure that this indicated a new King, such as had never been seen before, that they brought expensive gifts to present to him. When they found him they '*bowed down and worshipped him*'.

For those of us who call ourselves Christians there has been an 'epiphany' moment, when we have acknowledged God as our creator and literally or metaphorically bowed down before Jesus, the Saviour of the world. It might have been a gradual realisation that everything we'd grown up with is true; it might have been a journey of enquiry and discovery; it might even have been a 'light-bulb' moment. We are all different. But one thing is the same. We have acknowledged God's sovereignty. We have to bow down and worship him for who he is.



Our eternal life begins at that point, but there is plenty to get in the way of life, despite our good intentions. You only have to look around at what is happening in the world to see that bad things can happen to anyone. Life is not a bed of roses. How do we react when things don't go our way? What do we do when we are tempted to go along with everyone else, because we are afraid of what may happen if we stand up for what is right? It's so easy to start off with good ideals and intentions and for them to be eroded, bit by bit, until it's hard to tell the difference between life before that epiphany and life after it.

It's about choice. The Wise Men met Herod. They asked directions from him (which was possibly an unwise thing to do, considering that he was a very jealous, unstable personality) and he asked them to come back and let him know when they had discovered the exact location of this new king. He said he wanted to pay homage himself, but his intentions were far from that. Thankfully, they sensed this and decided not to comply with that particular request and slipped off home quietly. They were risking their lives doing that. Herod could have easily sent his soldiers off to find them. But they knew it would have been wrong.

We too have the gift of choice and January is a perfect time to choose to take a different route in life. In fact, every day, every moment, we can do that.

I came across this prayer, which I think encompasses a lot of what some of us might like to say to God. It was written by Karl Barth (1886 – 1968), a prominent Protestant theologian of his time. He spent much of his life resisting the Nazi movement, and so knew a thing or two about entering a New Year undaunted by troubles all around him.

O Lord, our Father!...at the turn of the year... our hearts are filled with sombre thoughts... our ears are deafened by the voices of the radio and the newspapers, with their numerous predictions for the coming year. Instead we want to hear your word, your voice, your assurance, your guidance. We know that you are in our midst, and are eager to give us all that we need, whether we ask or not.

We ask for one thing only: that you collect our scattered thoughts, getting rid of the confused and defiant thoughts that may distract us, and thus enable us to concentrate on your limitless generosity to us. You were abundantly generous to us last year, and will be no less generous to us next year, and in every year to come. Fill us with gratitude to you. Amen.

That's my prayer and I hope you can make it yours.

How to keep those New Year Resolutions

We are full of good intentions at the start of each year. Why do we usually fizzle out by February? Here are some tips to keep you going...

Be realistic. If you have several goals, don't attempt them all at once. Research has found that if you stagger your goals, you will have more success. So, for example, if this year you want to spend less money, do more exercise and spend more time with your family, start one change this month, another in February, and start the third in March.

Be specific. For example, don't tell yourself: Lose weight. Decide exactly how much you want to lose. When do you want to lose it by? How will you do it? If you want more time with your family, how and when will you do that? The more exact you can be, the more likely you are to succeed.

Write it down. There's something about committing thoughts to paper that helps to cement your resolve. Why not start some sort of journal this year, to track your thoughts, your hopes, your goals – and your successes!

Tell other people. If you intend to do something, tell someone, and therefore you will feel more obliged to get going with it... your pride may keep you going when all else fails!

Focus on GAIN, not loss. Ever notice how many resolutions are about giving something up? Why not put it the other way round - instead of saying you will eat less, tell yourself you are headed for those skinny jeans....

Give yourself rewards. If you are quitting smoking or sweets, for example, put the money that you would have spent in a jam jar, and treat yourself to something nice (and healthy) with it.

Break your resolution into steps. Some goals will take months to achieve. So, break each one down into tiny steps, and simply head for each step. Build in some time frames, to prevent you procrastinating.

Finally, don't let failure defeat you. You will make mistakes. But the secret is to simply get up again and to keep going. Only if you stop are you *really* defeated. None of us are perfect, and the Bible encourages us to always start again.

What, oh what, is that person's name?!

Do your New Year Resolutions include the forlorn hope that you will be better at remembering people's names in 2026? Many of us – and not only those of the older generation – have difficulty remembering names. It's not just TV personalities and so on, but people we meet in the street. We know exactly who they are, we see them every week in church or the supermarket, we know what job they do and which school their children go to. But as for their name – it's a blank.

Help is at hand, however. Not to solve the problem, but at least to name it. 'Anomic aphasia' is the clinical name for the inability to remember a name, even when we can remember everything else about someone.

There is also the strange truth that the cure for anomic aphasia comes spontaneously, often in the middle of the night, when that elusive identity pops unbidden into our memory. We must be sure, of course, to put the light on and write it down, because for sure it will be gone again with the morning light!



Letter from Westminster

December has come around, and South Shropshire's beautiful scenery looks better than ever in the morning frost. As Christmas approaches, I am continuing my work in Parliament and across the constituency, and also reflecting on the past year. I have been privileged to meet with hundreds of constituents at surgeries and Meet the MP events (recently in Craven Arms, Bridgnorth, and Bishop's Castle). My team and I have responded to more than 8,500 individual enquiries so far in 2025. I look forward to continuing this work in the month ahead, with two upcoming surgeries in Ludlow.



November marked the season of Remembrance. As a veteran, this is always an emotional time, but one which I was glad to share with many of South Shropshire's 4,000 veterans. To honour the 75th anniversary of the official re-opening of the House of Commons after it was engulfed by the Blitz during World War Two, I was delighted to join my colleagues in a moment of reflection. I also visited the House of Commons Books of Remembrance, which commemorate Members of Parliament, their staff, and families who died in both World Wars. I was honoured to join the service in Ludlow on Remembrance Sunday.

I have also been busy campaigning to save South Shropshire's post offices. Post office branches provide vital services across the constituency, including in Acton Burnell, Alveley, Aston on Clun, Broseley, and Bishop's Castle. What's more, with access to cash and everyday banking services becoming more difficult, it is more important than ever to protect rural post offices. As such, I have renewed my campaign against the Government's proposals to close up to half of our post offices, reduce the three-mile radius, and cut the availability of outreach services.

Especially at this time of year, our churches also play a central role in our communities. Religious or non-religious, I know that residents treasure these time-honoured buildings which are dotted all over South Shropshire. As such, I was concerned to learn that Historic England's latest Heritage at Risk Register reveals that almost a thousand churches are in need of urgent repair and conservation work. So, I have urged the Chancellor to scrap the cap on the Listed Places of Worship Grants Scheme which, since 2010, has funded conservation projects that keep our historic churches open.

Finally, we all know someone who has battled cancer. Thankfully, Lingen Davies have been helping Shropshire residents through this battle since 1979. They provide invaluable support across Shropshire, Telford and Wrekin, and Mid-Wales, and have recently announced the launch of their Sunflower Fundraising Appeal. The £5 million appeal has the potential to double the provision of chemotherapy in our local area, with a new state-of-the-art Chemotherapy Centre in Telford's Princess Royal Hospital. I would encourage all my constituents to consider donating generously to this fantastic cause.

I hope everyone in South Shropshire has a very merry Christmas and enjoys the many festivities which the constituency offers over the Christmas period.

The Christmas Light Switch On event always raises money for a charity selected by Highley Parish Council. This year we chose Highley Minors Childcare and I was very pleased to be able to inform them we had raised (with a significant donation from Highley Community Project) £1,200! I was joined by Vice Chair Tracy Pinches and Councillor Emma Aspen to present Manager of Highley Minors Childcare Melissa Hodgson with a cheque for the amount whilst at our second Christmas event of the season 'Santa at The Centre'. We arranged this event to ensure every child in the village could get a chance to see Santa rather than just those who live on the streets he usually visits at this time of year. It was a great success with lots for the little ones to do and mulled wine available for the adults. The atmosphere was great and it was really nice to see so many of the community enjoying themselves.

As we enter the new year we have lots of exciting plans at Highley Parish Council but we couldn't do it without our fantastic councillors so I would like to take this opportunity to say thank you to Vice Chair Tracy Pinches and to Councillors Emma Aspen, Sally Bunn, Pete Vinall, Matt Green, Chris Stanley, Megan Roberts, Dillip Thakrar, Louise Hodnett, Andrew Hancox, Helen Hancox and John Marshall.



Mindfulness

But as Christians, we have an extra, divine resource, to call on. Here are three verses to help reassure readers that they are not alone in their tough times. (Luke 8:22-25)

Peaceful mind

The Bible tells the story of Jesus and His disciples in a boat. The wind blows, the waves rise, and the disciples are stressed. Like them, we also get hit by storms in life. Like them, we can't control what comes our way. But like them, we can know that Jesus is also with us.

Why not take a moment to ponder these promises:

- ◊ The Lord gives strength to His people, the Lord blesses His people with peace. (*Psalm 29:11*)
- ◊ For God is not a God of disorder but of peace (*1 Corinthians 14:33*)

Character is what counts

Man looks at the outward appearance, but the LORD looks at the heart.' 1 Samuel 16:7

Here is a description of Saul, Israel's first king: 'There was not a more handsome person...among the children of Israel' (1 Samuel 9:2 NKJV). But his looks couldn't compensate for his lack of character, and he died prematurely in shame and defeat. When Samuel the prophet went to the house of Jesse to anoint one of his sons as Israel's next king, God said, 'Man looks at the outward appearance, but the LORD looks at the heart.'

Many years ago a boy was born in Russia who thought himself to be so ugly, he was certain there would be no happiness for him in life. He bemoaned the fact that he had a wide nose, thick lips, small grey eyes, and big hands and feet. He was so distraught about his appearance that he asked God to work a miracle and turn him into a handsome man. He vowed that if God would do this, he would give Him all he possessed.

That boy was Count Tolstoy, who became one of the world's foremost authors, best known for his epic *War and Peace*. In his books he admits that through the years, he discovered that the beauty of physical appearance he had once sought was not the only beauty in life – and it was not the best beauty. Instead, Tolstoy came to regard *the beauty of a strong character* as having the greatest good in God's sight. Character is not a matter of money or looks, but of doing what is right apart from money and standing up for what's right apart from appearances.

Why nature matters workshop - Alastair

On the 22nd November, Sustainable Highley hosted a 'Why nature matters' workshop in the Severn Centre. There was plenty of discussion about nature in Highley, and because of the enthusiasm of the group, we now have an official 'Local nature recovery working group'!


Our first job is to identify the existing or potential nature corridors for flora and fauna within the village. They can vary from a river to an uncut verge, but they need to link isolated, wildlife rich habitats together. If you have seen wildlife in your garden, or have an idea of how to connect it with another local habitat, then please let us know, and we can map it.

Lots of other ideas came out of the workshop. How many have you tried?

- In the garden, chop and drop (let nature take its course), do 'no mow' May, make a bug hotel, put out water for the birds, grow native plants with fruit and nectar for native wildlife, or put a pile of logs in a shady corner.
- Read Joanna Macey's book; Active Hope, for how to cope with anxiety around the nature and climate crises.
- Join Shropshire Wildlife Trust or other nature or climate charity like the Woodland Trust, or Shropshire Climate Action.
- Take a permaculture course or other form of free online training.
- Reduce pollution and plastic waste.
- Make a dead hedge or a wildlife pond.
- Become a Biodiversity collage or climate fresh facilitator and run your own workshops.
- Buy fruit and veg and meat produced locally, and if possible, farmed regeneratively.
- Tell other people about what you are doing!
- Attend the next local nature recovery meeting on 28th January 2026 in the Parish Clerk's Office in the Severn Centre at 1830.
