Rachel writes . . .

As I write this it is almost a year since I was licensed to our 6 parishes as your Priest in Charge. While I feel I am still learning about how each parish does things, and getting to know you all, I feel that we have all made a good start together. I hope you do too. It is lovely to see people attending services in another parish when their home parish doesn't have a service, and to see events in each parish attract support from across the other parishes.

The first month to have 5 Sundays this year will be March, but since that is Palm Sunday there won't be a joint service. A normal Sunday pattern will be maintained. However, we will all soon have a time to gather together, because on Sunday after Easter, known as Low Sunday, April 12th, Bishop Libby will be visiting Christ Church, and that service will be the only one in our 6 parishes that morning. I hope as many of you as possible will gather to worship with our Bishop, and to share fellowship with each other afterwards.

Lent begins this year on February 18th. There will be the usual midweek service at Christ Church that morning, with the addition of the Imposition of Ashes for Ash Wednesday. Please come along if you would like to mark the start of Lent in that way. The following week we shall start our Lent course on Wednesdays at 10:15am at Christ Church, and on Zoom on Thursday evenings at 7pm. Please see the bulletin for further details.

When I was at secondary school, something compelled me to give something up for Lent every year, even though my family didn't go to church often. The first year I gave up chocolate, and ate a lot of salted peanuts, so the following year I gave up both chocolate and salted peanuts. Each year I found a loophole for myself, and the following year added that loophole to the things I was giving up. To be honest, it wasn't much about faith, and more about just giving something up.

These days, as I approach Lent, I still often choose something to give up, but more as a way of reminding myself that it's Lent, rather than challenging myself to endure the absence of something I enjoy. I find it more worthwhile to add something to my life - a little more time in prayer, a conscious increase in giving to a charity, or choosing a Lent book to read.

Within our churches there are opportunities for study and for giving, as well as needs in our communities. We are also starting a bookstall at Christ Church which will be available every day if you'd like to pop in to pick up a book (more details in the monthly bulletin).

Lent is a wonderful gift of time to wait and prepare for Holy Week and Easter. Whatever you choose to do, and however you choose to observe Lent as a separate season, I wish you joy and blessings in your endeavours.

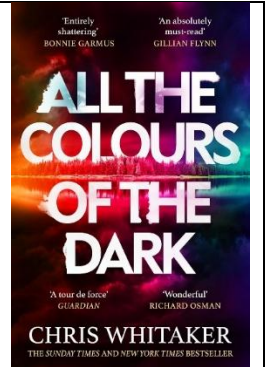

CHURCHYARD WORKING PARTY

Dates for your diary:

My apologies. In the January magazine I put February 8th as a WP date. This is wrong, being the first week and a Sunday!

I am SO excited!

Although January's date had to be cancelled, work in the churchyard has been continuing and very exciting progress is being made. The wood chippings, left from when trees were trimmed to keep them safe and to give more space in the bonfire area, have been moved to another area. Here, they've been carefully spread about and then covered with leaves.

This 'new' area should swamp many of the weeds, although I'm sure we'll have to keep up the work against the more tenacious and invasive ivy and brambles. As it settles down, this should provide a good place for bugs and small creatures to find sanctuary and, further up the food chain, a good area for birds to grub around for food.

Once settled and rotted down a bit we *could* spread grass seed about. However, I think it would be much more interesting if perhaps, a wildflower mix was spread to bring further life and variety of interest to the spot. I'd also like to see introduced various small, woodland plants to the area - by this I mean things like winter aconite, English bluebell (NOT Spanish), woodland cyclamen, primrose, cowslip, wood anemone, snowdrop, crocus, daffodils.....

I'm sort of thinking out loud here. This is a team venture, involving all volunteers and readers of this article. It's a space which is available for the whole Community of Hazelwood (not forgetting people from other places who stop by or pass through) to visit and enjoy. So, whilst I try to coordinate things a bit, I'm only one person in the chain and welcome ideas. Had it not been for a suggestion made by one of our volunteers this, as yet small, regeneration area would not have been made.

You may be asking what is happening to the area from which the wood chippings have been moved (or perhaps you aren't)? Anyway, this is being made into a carefully thought out, designed, approved and tastefully hand-crafted composting area. Again, this is being worked on (and funded by) volunteers. You know who you are and I cannot thank you enough.

So, please do visit us on the second Saturday of each month (or at other times) to see what's going on. The thing about second Saturdays is that even if you can't physically help us, you can have a chat with people and get free refreshments in the church! (The church is of course open on Sundays; times of services as shown elsewhere in the magazine, with a variety of people taking services...after which there are, of course, refreshments).

MEMORIES OF SUNDAYS WITH MY GRANNY **by Gina Clarke**

Granny lived in a large house within a short walk from my house. For my 3rd birthday I received a tricycle, so I had to show her how I could ride it. Happily I set off but as soon as I saw her I was in trouble, Sunday was a day of rest not work. I parked my bike in her yard and was escorted to her private sitting room. She read her bible and embroidered her table cloth. I used a large needle and cotton to finish my tray cloth. I pushed my tricycle home.



DECIMALISATION AND WHAT WENT BEFORE

15th February 1971 – ‘Decimal Day’ was when Britain formally adopted the decimal currency system. Older readers will no doubt remember that prior to 1971, there were 12 pennies to the shilling and 20 shillings to the pound. There were guineas, half crowns, threepenny bits, sixpences and florins. This old system of currency, known as pound, shillings and pence or l.s.d, dated back to Roman times when a pound of silver was divided into 240 pence, or *denarii*, which is where the ‘d’ in l.s.d comes from. The ‘l’ stands for *libra pondo* (pound weight) and the ‘s’ for *solidus* (gold Roman coin).

For centuries, British coins have been given colloquial names, nicknames such as Quids, Bobs, Florins, Tanners and Joeys. Some of these terms are so old that their origins are no longer clear. We know that the word *Quid* has been in English use since at least 1661. It is taken as meaning one pound sterling. The most likely source is from the Latin phrase ‘*Quid pro quo*’ which means ‘something for something’.

The shilling appeared around 1550. Many believe its name comes from the Anglo-Saxon *scilling* or *scyling* meaning a division. Before decimalisation the shilling was almost always referred to colloquially as a ‘Bob’. In a Slang Dictionary of 1864, the author says that it takes its name from Sir Robert Walpole. As Chancellor, Walpole reduced the Land tax from 4 shillings to three, then two and finally one shilling. Which would have been quite popular at the time.

The name florin comes from a gold coin mined in Florence, Italy in 1252. There was a lot of trade around Europe in the 13th century, and traders needed a trade coin which could be used in many countries. In 1344, Edward III decided to produce a coin for England which could also be used in Europe and issued the *Florin or Double Leopard*, worth 6 shillings. The British Florin was later issued as a silver two shilling coin in 1849 and ran until decimalisation.

Sixpences have been minted since 1551. They were very often referred to as a ‘Tanner’. The nickname derives from the name of John Tanner who was Chief Engraver of the Royal Mint during the reign of George II and was the designer of a sixpence. A long time ago, a sixpence was also known as a

'Bender'. When it was a thin, silver coin, it could actually be bent with your bare hands. Sixpence was a lot of money in Victorian times, so you could buy enough beer to get drunk with it, which perhaps led to the expression *'Going on a bender'*.

Many of you will still remember the 12-sided three penny bit, but before 1947 the threepence was a small silver coin. The silver threepence dates back to around 1550 and was once nicknamed a *'Joey'*. Originally a Joey was the name given to a groat (4 pence) which was reintroduced in the 1830s by a politician named Joseph Hume, hence Joey. Hume was upset with cabbies pretending they hadn't got change for short cab rides (in order to get a bigger tip) so he campaigned for more small change and the 4d Britannia Groat to be re-issued. When the grout finally went out of circulation, the silver 3 pence inherited the name.

These nicknames disappeared with the advent of decimalization, following the passing of the Decimal Currency Act in May 1969. To prepare the nation for the changeover in currency systems, the Decimal Currency Board was set up, running a public information campaign in the two years prior to the switchover. Three years before changeover, new 5p and 10p coins were introduced. These were the same size and worth the same amount as the one and two shilling coins. In 1969, a new 50p coin was introduced and replace the old 10 bob (shilling) note. It was originally intended that the new unit of currency would be referred to as 'new pence' to distinguish it from the old money, but this was quickly adapted to the abbreviation 'p' which we still use today.

The banks were closed for 4 days before changeover to prepare. Currency converters were available, and prices in the shops were shown in both currencies. This went some way to alleviate the feeling many people had, that shopkeepers might use the conversion from old money to new to increase prices! 'Decimal Day' ran without a hitch – in general, the population readily embraced the new currency. For a short time the old and new currencies operated in unison, whereby people could pay in pounds, shillings and pence and receive new money as change. Originally it was planned that old money would be phased out of circulation over 18 months, but as it turned out, the old penny, halfpenny and threepenny coins were officially taken out of circulation in August 1971. The last pre-decimal coins finally disappeared from circulation in 1993.

GINGERBREAD COOKIES

Prep 20 mins plus chilling Cook 12 mins

INGREDIENTS

- 120g unsalted butter, softened
- 1 ½ tbs black treacle
- 170g soft light brown sugar
- ½ tsp fine sea salt
- 1 medium egg
- 200g plain flour
- ¼ tsp bicarbonate of soda
- ¼ tsp ground cloves
- 1 ½ tsp ground ginger
- ½ tsp ground cinnamon
- 60g caster sugar

METHOD

1. Beat together the butter, treacle, brown sugar and salt in a large mixing bowl. Add the egg, then beat through all the remaining dry ingredients apart from the caster sugar. Chill the mixture in the fridge for one hour.
2. Heat the oven to 200c/180cfan/gas 4. Line two baking sheets with baking parchment. Roll the mixture into 20 even-sized balls, weighing for accuracy if you like. Tip the caster sugar onto a small plate, then add each ball and roll around to coat. Space the balls out on the baking sheets. Bake for 9-10 mins until golden brown. Leave to cool on a rack.

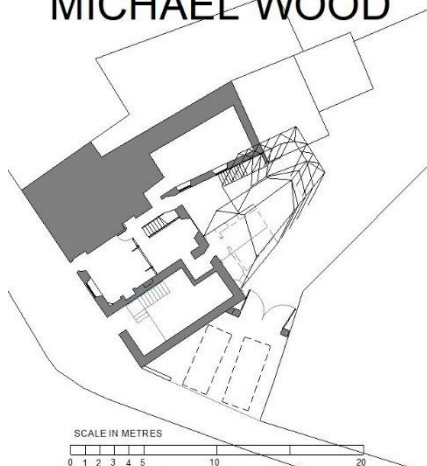

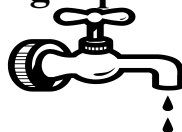
