Light of the World

Christmas 2024 I was given a wonderful candle holder. It has lots of little LED lights within it that light up when the candle is lit. When I light the candles all the little LED lights flicker - providing a beautifully atmospheric glimmer on a dreary winters' evening. I know many of us like to light candles in our homes (safely, of course!). They add warmth, atmosphere, and maybe a nice scent, to our rooms.

In church we light candles every week; candles in church remind us of the presence of Jesus with us. In the bible he is referred to as 'The Light of the World'. His spirit and his teachings remain with us and guide us through the light and dark times of life.

On 2 February, or the nearest Sunday, the church celebrates the Feast of Candlemas - when Jesus was presented, by his parents, at the Temple in Jerusalem (as all first born Jewish sons were). Mary and Joseph were greeted there by two elderly people, Simeon and Anna. Both had been waiting many years to see God's chosen one, the Messiah, arrive. Both knew, without Mary and Joseph saying anything, that this baby was the one they had been waiting for. Simeon burst into song and he sang:

Now, Lord, you let your servant go in peace:
your word has been fulfilled.
My own eyes have seen the salvation
which you have prepared in the sight of every people;
A light to reveal you to the nations
and the glory of your people Israel

(Luke 2. 29-32)

Candles can bring joy and comfort to our homes. For Christians, candles are a reminder that Jesus, the Light of the World, who out of love died for us, is always with us (Traditionally people would bring their candles from home to church on Candlemas be blessed, reminding them that Jesus is with them everywhere - at church and at home).

I pray that as we move through Candlemas and the darkness of winter to the brighter days of spring to come, you will know the Light of the World with you, whether you are a fan of candles or not!

Shrove Tuesday: Pancake Day

This year Shrove Tuesday falls on 17 February.

Ever wonder why we eat pancakes just before Lent? The tradition dates back to Anglo-Saxon times, when Christians spent Lent in repentance and severe fasting.

So on the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday, the church bell would summon them to confession, where they would be 'shriven', or absolved from their sins, which gives us Shrove Tuesday. At home, they would then eat up their last eggs and fat, and making a pancake was the easiest way to do this. For the next 47 days, they pretty well starved themselves.

Pancakes feature in cookery books as far back as 1439, and today's pancake races are in remembrance of a panicked woman back in 1445 in Olney, Buckinghamshire. She was making pancakes when she heard the shriving bell calling her to confession. Afraid she'd be late, she ran to the church in a panic, still in her apron, and still holding the pan.

Flipping pancakes is also centuries old. A poem from Pasquil's Palin in 1619 runs: *"And every man and maide doe take their turne, And tosse their Pancakes up for feare they burne."*

Some people have noted that the ingredients of pancakes can be used to highlight four significant things about this time of year: eggs stand for creation, flour is the staff of life, while salt keeps things wholesome, and milk stands for purity.

Shrove Tuesday is always 47 days before Easter Sunday and falls between 3 February and 9 March.

Two unexpected visitors

As we were having refreshments after the morning service on Sunday 21 December, two men walked in and asked if they could look around the church. They introduced themselves as John Vaughan-Jones and his son Dylan. From conversation with them we discovered that John's grandfather William Vaughan-Jones had been Rector of Downham from 1937 until 1955 and the statue of St Margaret over the door to the toilets is dedicated to his memory. John's father Frederick and his uncle were also priests. His mother Jean Claydon grew up in Downham, living first at 64 School Road, then at 68 School Road. She was a Sunday School teacher, bell-ringer and played the organ from time to time at St Margaret's. She was also a talented artist, producing the painting of the interior of St Margaret's before the fire, that appears in our history booklet. John's parents married in St Margaret's in 1952 and they then moved to South Africa. John was born and grew up there but has since moved to Australia. His son Dylan is currently working in London and John was visiting him, whilst celebrating his 65th birthday. They were taking the opportunity to visit the five parishes in England where John's grandfather, father and uncle served as ministers.

Christmas celebrations

Christmas started at St Margaret's with Downham School's Christingle service on Monday 15 December, followed on Sunday 21 December when we sung carols during our Eucharist service. Christmas Eve started with the Christingle service at 3.00pm which was attended by about 170 people, including about 60 children. The collection taken at that service was for The Children's Society and we were able to send them £500 (which included the collection taken at St Mary's Carol Service). Thank you to everyone for your generous support. We continued, welcoming about 50 people to Midnight Mass, then a smaller group for the service of Holy Communion at 10.00am on Christmas Day. We estimate that, across the three churches of the Downham Group, about 300 people attended services on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day which was the most we have seen for several years.

Ash Wednesday - 18 February

We commence the season of Lent on Ash Wednesday. This year the five churches that make up the Reservoir Group will have two services. The first at 10.00am to be held at All Saints Stock will be a said service of Holy Communion together with the imposition of ashes for those who wish to participate. Then at 7.00pm we have a Sung Eucharist, also with the imposition of ashes at St Margaret's.

Downham Church of England School

2026 is the National Year of Reading and, at Downham Church of England Primary School, we are excited to embrace this national campaign. From our Early Years classroom right up to our oldest pupils in Year 6, we aim to develop a love of reading in every child. For some, this reading for pleasure will take the shape of reading fiction which transports them to new lands and a myriad of fantastical creatures. For others, it may be recipes, sports magazines, instruction manuals or even environmental print (road signs and billboards).

One of my favourite books, which I love to share with the children at school, is "Elizabeth and Larry" by Marilyn Sadler. This book describes a friendship between Elizabeth (who is "pushing forty") and Larry, an alligator who arrives in a box of oranges from Florida. The unlikely duo's relationship develops until they are more like family than friends. Other people comment on their differences and, for a while, this has a significantly negative impact until they realise that true friendship looks past differences and connects hearts and minds.

This message resonates so clearly with the message of the Bible. Think of Jesus' choice of disciples – fishermen, a tax collector, a nationalist zealot – yet each one played an important role in the founding of the Early Church and the establishment of the Christian faith around the world. Other people with whom Jesus connected included Mary, Martha and their brother Lazarus, Mary Magdalene and Nicodemus. On the surface, these friendships seemed unlikely as they challenged many of the social norms of Jesus' time. Today, the Bible challenges us to look beyond ourselves and our regular social circle and to reach out in love to others in need of a friend. Indeed, often times we are the ones who are in need of a listening ear, a shoulder to lean on and a new perspective on the problems we face.

At Downham Church of England Primary School, we aim to be inclusive, looking out for each other and searching out opportunities to build friendships. It is a joy to see friendships within classrooms, but even more so to watch relationships develop across the year groups and even between adults and children around the school. Older children help younger ones to find lost

coats and gloves, adults and children plan World Book Day outfits together, and high-fives are regularly exchanged in the corridors. We celebrate our differences and all that makes us unique but we also seek to connect with others around us in meaningful and life-changing ways. Our hope and prayer is that these are the lessons which will impact the children and remain with them long after they have moved on from Downham.

All in the month of February

It was:

300 years ago, on 20 February 1726 that William Prescott, an American colonel in American Revolutionary War was born. Famous for giving the order: "Don't fire until you see the whites of their eyes."

200 years ago, on 4 February 1826 that James Fenimore Cooper's historical romance novel The Last of the Mohicans was published.

175 years ago, on 1 February 1851 that novelist Mary Shelley died, aged 53. Best known for her Gothic novel Frankenstein.

125 years ago, on 2 February 1901 that the funeral of Queen Victoria took place.

80 years ago, on 11 February 1946, that the Revised Standard Version of the New Testament was published. It was the first major English-language update of the Bible since the King James version was published in 1611.

Also 80 years ago, on 14 February 1946 that the Bank of England was nationalised.

Also 80 years ago, on 19 February 1946 that mathematician and cryptanalyst Alan Turing presented a detailed paper for the national Physical Laboratory that gave the first reasonably complete design of a stored-programme computer.

70 years ago, on 11 February 1956 that two members of the Cambridge spy ring, British diplomats Guy Burgess and Donald Maclean, announced that they had defected to the Soviet Union. They had both vanished in mysterious circumstances in 1951.

65 years ago, on 9 February 1961 that the Beatles played at the Cavern Club in Liverpool for the first time.

50 years ago, on 11 February 1976 that John Curry won Britain's first-ever Olympic gold medal in figure skating.

Also 50 years ago, on 23 February 1976 that the artist L S Lowry died. Known for his bleak industrial landscapes of north-west England, populated with matchstick men.

40 years ago, on 12 February 1986 that the Treaty of Canterbury was signed by Britain and France. It was the agreement to construct the Channel Tunnel linking the two countries. The tunnel opened in 1994.

30 years ago, on 1 February 1996 that US President Bill Clinton met Sinn Fein President Gerry Adams at the White House, to discuss the Northern Ireland Peace Process.

Also 30 years ago, on 15 February 1996 that the oil tanker Sea Empress ran aground near Milford Haven in Wales, causing a major oil spill along the coastlines of Wales and Ireland.

25 years ago, on 12 February 2001 that the Human Genome Project announced the publication of the first complete working draft of the human genome.

20 years ago, on 18 February 2006 that the Rolling Stones played the world's largest free rock concert on Copacabana beach, Rio de Janeiro. An estimated 2 million people attended.
