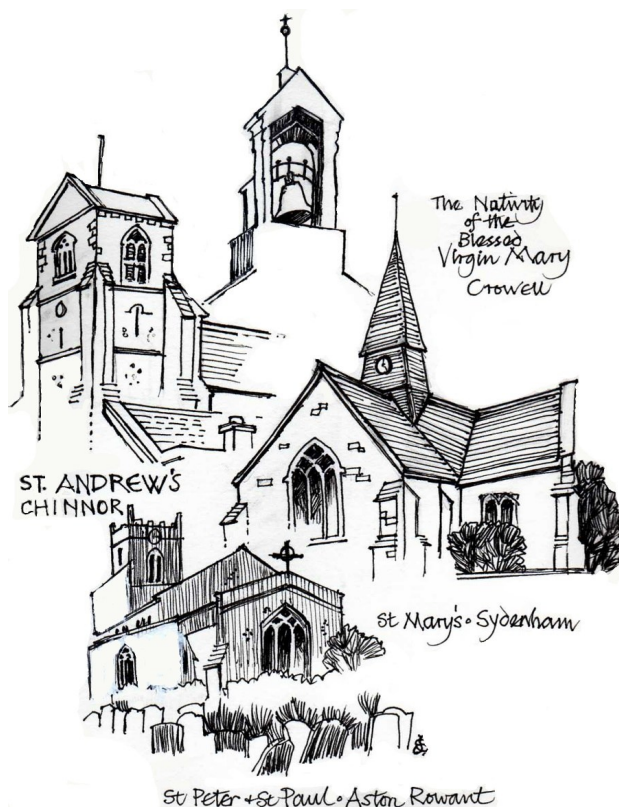

PASTORAL LETTER

Joan writes, Pastoral letter – February 2026

In February our Church Year moves us from a celebration of Epiphany into the season of Lent. Epiphany is a season of invitation when the identity of Jesus is made manifest. It began with the visit of the Magi revealing the anointed of God to the whole world. In the weeks before Lent it continues with the baptism of Jesus in the Jordan; Jesus's first sign in John's Gospel, changing water into wine at the wedding in Cana and concluding with the account of the Transfiguration of Jesus before the closest of his disciples, "This is my son with whom I am well pleased. Listen to him". In these weeks we seek the revelation of God in Jesus so that we may know, love and follow him.

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent with the invitation to receive ashes on our foreheads as a sign of public penance, "remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and follow Christ". We are reminded of the need for self denial and self discipline as we prepare to follow Jesus on the path of self sacrificing love. Lent is a time for self appraisal – not self abasement – nor self advertisement. We are not called to wallow in self loathing nor to seek escapism in spurious excuses as we look at the wilderness places in our own hearts and lives. Rather, it calls for a healthy realism about ourselves. We face up to and accept responsibility for our mistakes and shortcomings. We recognise our complicity in injustices from which we profit, our silence when at times we could have spoken out.

Lent is not a call to retreat from the realities of everyday life. The time Jesus spent in the wilderness was far from quiet and serene. It was a period of challenge and temptation. Rather it is a time to see the world with a new awareness, through the eyes of God. We begin to ask where the food we take for granted comes from, and to think of those who produced it, so we begin to see how our choices can make a difference to the lives of others.

Our lives can become so busy that we lose sight of the blessed refreshment which comes from simply sitting still. Lent affords plenty of opportunity to pause, take stock of our lives including our sins, to deal with some of the distractions that come to the life of prayer, to enter into Christ's sufferings so that we arrive at Easter better able to enter its joys.

A Prayer from the IONA Worship Book.

Living God, we confess our faults and admit our frailty; we own our own brokenness and recognise the ways we wound our lives, the lives of others, and the life of the world. By your abundant grace forgive us, renew us in mind and in spirit, and enable us to grow in love. Move among us and give us life; with the spirit of freedom sustain us that our worship may be joyful and our witness faithful: in the name of Jesus Christ we pray,. Amen.

Luca Zucchi (Baritone)

Luca Zucchi is a London-based baritone and composer, currently studying for a master's in composition at the Royal Academy of Music, where he studies with Adrian Thompson, Helen Grime and Philip Cashian. He has a strong interest in Lieder, performing works by Schubert, Schumann, Mahler and Wolf, alongside music by living composers. Recent highlights include a staged adaptation of Schubert's *Winterreise* with Beckett's *That Time* at the Pentameters Theatre, and an upcoming performance of Schumann's *Liederkreis* Op.24 paired with Robin Holloway's *Fantasy Pieces*. Luca read music at Clare College, Cambridge, where he received the Royalton Kisch Prize and the Lester Brough Prize for performance. His recent compositions include *Fairer Westminster* for brass quintet and *Drop, Drop Slow Tears*, to be performed by Clare College Choir.

Daniel Liu (Piano)

Daniel Liu is a postgraduate pianist at the Royal Academy of Music, studying with Tessa Nicholson. He previously studied at the University of Cambridge, where he was active as a soloist and chamber musician, and at Chetham's School of Music, where he won the concerto prize with Britten's Piano Concerto. Also a composer, Daniel won the BBC Young Composer award in 2018, with his piece *Fanfares* premiered by the BBC Concert Orchestra the following year.

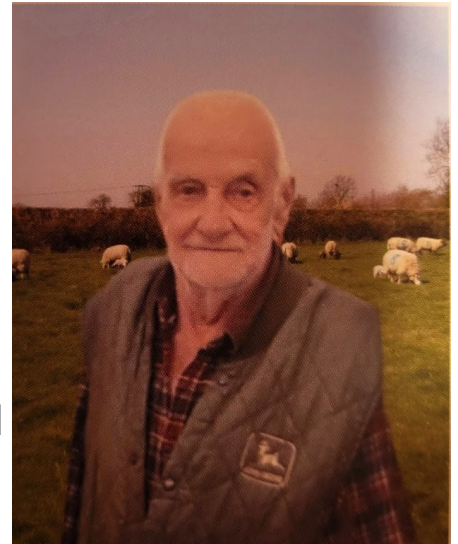
THE LATE JOHN FOLLEY 'DAR'

John Folley: Rest in Peace

26th October 1939 – 1st December 2025

On 14th January 2026, we held a moving service to say goodbye to John Folley, a much loved Chinnor and Henton man: beloved husband of Daphne (for 65 years), caring dad to Stephen, Katherine and Richard and loving “Dar” (Grandad/ Great-granddad) to Thomas, Rupert, Ella, Hayley, Joanna, Maisie, Hallie, Nancy, Elsie, Delia, Albert and newly arrived Leonard. John was a man much admired and cherished by his extended family and many local people.

Four of John’s grandchildren (Rupert, Tom, Ben (by marriage) and Hayley) honoured Dar by carrying him into church, always a moving sight, made even more so by the presence of granddaughter, Hayley.

These are the family memories shared by John’s daughter Kathryn on behalf of the family:

Today we’re here to remember our Dad, John — or as he was known to all of us in the family, Dar — a man whose life was full of stories, kindness, and a very good sense of humour and of what really mattered.

As you know, Dad was born and grew up at the Eagle pub in Henton, which many of us now know as The Peacock. He liked to joke that he started drinking almost as soon as he could crawl, and he absolutely loved telling the story of regulars to the pub letting him have a little sip of their beer. It was one of those stories he told often — and somehow, it never got old.

The pub was always a huge part of who Dad was. He loved going to the Peacock and would often reminisce about his times there. In recent days, when the landlady would greet him with “Welcome home, John,” it meant the world to him. He talked about that a lot — and I think it says everything about how deeply connected he was to the pub and those memories.

Dad had a very simple, very wise outlook on life. He always used to say, “If you wake up in the morning, it’s a good start to the day.” And he lived by that. He never complained — not once. No matter what was going on, he just got on with things, quietly and without fuss. One thing you could always count on with Dad was his gratitude. He would always say thank you — for everything you did, and especially for just popping in to see them. It didn’t matter how small the gesture was, it was always appreciated. He was also someone who could fix just about anything. If you needed help with electrics, plumbing, or any odd

job, Dad always knew what to do — and if he didn't, he'd find a way. He would help anyone, without hesitation, and never expected anything in return.

Music was another big part of Dad's life. He loved doing discos, and no matter what else had been played, he would always finish with Perry Como — “for the good times,” as he'd say. It was his way of winding things down, and it suited him perfectly.

In more recent years, one of his greatest joys was his great-grandchildren. He loved saying rhymes with them, singing with them, and just being in their company. You could see how much happiness that brought him.

And of course, Christmas Day was always special. We would do the rounds by visiting Auntie Shirley and George's, Aunt Dolly and Ron's, Nan and Gramp at The Eagle, and lastly, Nanny and Nampy in Bledlow. And yes, he would always have one too many. But that was Dad enjoying himself, surrounded by family, making memories.

Our dad was kind, steady, grateful, and always there when you needed him. He lived a full life, rich in stories, laughter, music, and love.

We will miss him more than words can say. But we'll carry him with us — in the stories we tell, the songs we hear, the pubs we walk into, and the simple reminder that if you wake up in the morning, it's a good start to the day.

Thank you, Dad. Thank you, Dar. For everything.

Margaret Poole (known to Daphne and John since a baby) shared the following:

These passed few weeks since John'/Dar' passing must have been very strange for you all and especially with Christmas in the mix. I am sure it has been very challenging with the many mixed emotions that you will have all had: one remembering all the Christmas' of the past and then experiencing a very different Christmas this year with John no longer sharing it with you all. Even if he was not in your own individual homes, he would have been sat in his chair at home by the window, and you will have all called in at some point to share presents, and more importantly to share love.

If there is one thing to hold onto from your loss of John/Dar, that is the strong bond of love that has seen you through those difficult times of John'/Dar' decline, and how you have all pulled together in supporting each other over these past few weeks.

Over the past few years, I have had the privilege to get to know John when I have dropped by for a cuppa and cake (mince pie), I have enjoyed conversations about what has been going on in the world, and what was in the newspaper. Or what was being done in the garden, weather permitting! John didn't like the cold, and he didn't like it too hot either!

Had the plug plants been ordered for the tubs and hanging baskets, or the sunflower seeds been planted, all being done, while perhaps having some refreshments by way of a can from the garage? We also enjoyed sharing time talking about the family and what they were all doing. Katherine told us of how John/Dar loved nothing better than seeing his grandchildren and great grandchildren. Watching them play with the huge box of toys and receiving their pictures and gifts that they would come in with, especially for him.

Then of course there were the beloved cats, Mr Fudge and Miss Morgan, John always keeping a careful watchful eye over them as he met their needs, even moving chairs if one had laid claim to his own chair.

But there was one subject that we had in common, and I really enjoyed sharing with John, and that was, keeping up to date with what was happening in the local farming community and especially the shepherding.

When John retired and the funds allowed, John and Daphne along with Stephen started to keep sheep. Ever the good Shepherds, the sheep became part of everyday life, their wants and needs being met by daily trips to check that they were all okay, no matter what season no matter what the weather. And lambing, well that was another matter, with early mornings and late nights. Care and support for their sheep paramount

But those of you here today would not be aware, that those sheep of the past became famous with our school children, especially Snowy the pet lamb, with our school children in the Parish, as we shared photos of them during our Reinspired sessions about the 'Good Shepherd'.

Liz has shared with us this afternoon Psalm 23, that Daphne and the family had chosen for this service. Knowing what we know of Daphne's faith and the shepherding and care that John and Daphne gave to their flock of sheep, it was no surprise to us at all, that this was one of their chosen Bible passages.

Psalm 23 is a passage we turn to in every season – in times of peace, in moments of fear and especially at a time of grief. It's a familiar passage that offers comfort and a profound and unshakable

Today as we remember John/Dar we find comfort not in the philosophy or the platitude, but in a person: the Lord, our Good Shepherd.....

Rev'd Jacky reflected on how the family, particularly Daphne, Steven and Liz, Kathryn and Kevin, and Richard gave John an extraordinary gift by enabling him to remain at home in his last days, in familiar surroundings, cared for with patience, tenderness and dignity. It was an act of love that was quiet, faithful and, at times, costly but right for John.



As Katherine highlighted, being born in and growing up in the Eagle (now the Peacock) had a lasting effect on John. From being a skilled grower of pansies and creator of hanging baskets, to navigating around the country (especially London) by the pubs. And I'm sure that John's generous support of many events in and around Chinnor, by providing the PA system, came from the understanding how important community is, undoubtedly instilled in him by his parents Olive and Cliff while they ran the Eagle. He was also the go to man for a local disco.

He and Daphne set up the Henton Cancer Fund, that is still going, over 50 years ago. This is a wonderful testament to a couple who always wanted to help others.

John's life continues in Daphne, in his children, grandchildren and great grandchildren. It continues in stories told and retold, in country music played in his memory, in kindness offered without expectation, and in gratitude for ordinary days. Love does not disappear. It changes shape, but it remains. These are all qualities John modelled for us all and I know he has passed them onto those he loved and loved him.

So today we commend John into God's keeping, trusting that the Shepherd who led him through life now leads him into peace. And we entrust ourselves to that same care, as we continue the journey without him, carrying love, memory, and hope with us.

And as Psalm 23 ends with a vision of heaven as great feast, we might imagine John's heaven as walking back in to the Eagle and God saying to him "Welcome Home John". Amen.

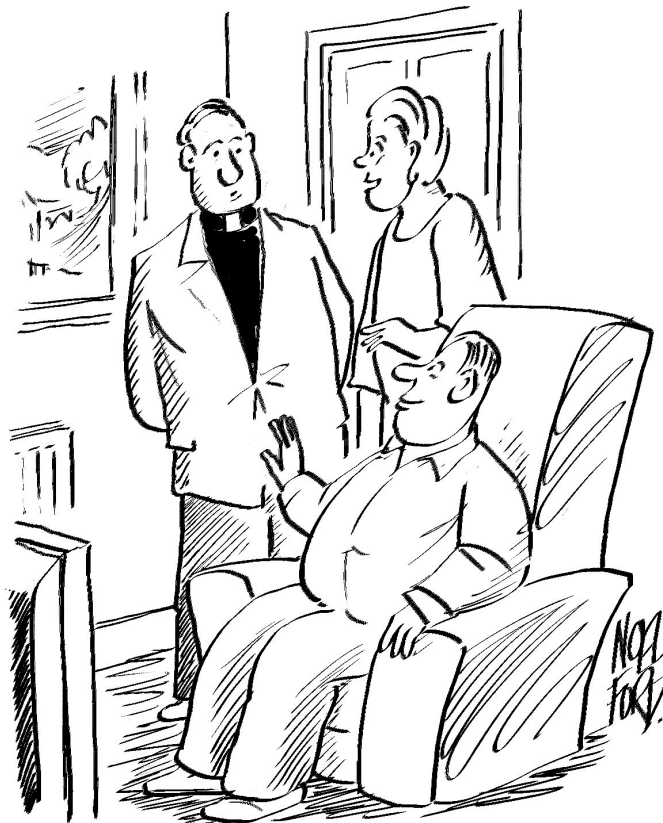

The Presentation of Christ in the Temple/ Candlemas

Candlemas, 2nd February, comes exactly 40 days after Christmas. In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to 'present Him to the Lord'. Thus, we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple (Luke 2: 22-40). So where does the Candlemas bit come in? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World, and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day.
