'A small storm'

A small storm

What a week even for a country that is used to talking about the weather.

I was pleasantly surprised by the set reading for Friday at morning prayer. I had opened up a cold church and having just got soaked walking the short distance from the rectory to the church I wanted to check to see if the transept roof was leaking as it does when the wind blows the rain under the tiles sometimes. Yep it was, so I gathered up the buckets and started to listen to natures percussion section, drip, drip, drip a rhythmic back drop to the quiet prayers that would soon be going up to the place where the heavens were now open.

Sitting in the lady chapel the wind was blowing heavily through the stained glass, straight off the marsh, adding the wind section to the percussion, all we needed now was the string section, natures orchestra in full jubilant symphonic glory.

Then we opened our bibles to the set readings for the day, now who says God does not have a sense of humour, check these out Psalm 148: 8 'lightening and hail, snow and clouds, stormy winds that do his bidding.' Then Jeremiah 30: 23 See, the storm of the Lord will burst out in wrath, a driving wind swirling down. Could those who put these readings together hundreds of years ago have known what today would be like as storm Goretti pounds our small Islands. What's in naming storms anyway but in this case maybe a lot as the name Goretti has its origins in Italian meaning be watchful and vigilant. It suggests that a person can find protection and safety. That

was certainly our prayer in that chapel, that those who have to face the storm which had been given both an amber and red warning might be protected and shielded from the damage that such storms with this kind of magnitude carry with them.

Where then can we find protection when the winds tare down trees and rip off roofs, where can we find warmth when driving winds hit freezing cold fronts and the store house of snow falls from the heavens. Where is safe passage, where are the harbours that keep at bay the mighty waves crashing down, that toss our mightiest ships against the rocks at the bottom of the ocean.

More prayers for those who will wander field and mountain to restore powerlines and plug up burst pipes, for those who walk tracks to check rails, for tree surgeons who cut away the obstacles blocking our paths. For all emergency services and hospitals who patch us up and rescue us when we are lost and afraid. For farmers and those who look after live stock and the crops that will feed us all throughout calmer seasons.

Then prayers for common sense, we are not bigger than the storms that batter us from time to time, the machines we drive, sail and fly are not invisible, there are many journeys that can wait. There are other times to take a walk to see what is going on outside, because what we can say with full confidence is that every storm will pass. It is then that like nature around us that we can pop our heads back above the parapet or look out from our burrows of safety and examine the damage and pick up the pieces until the next storm.

In truth we have escaped here in the southeast the worst of this storm, on Thursday evening as the winds hit 99mph on the Southwestern coast I opened my back door to let our dog out. It was totally still in the rectory garden but for the rain, no wind at all, were we really in the middle of a storm so powerful. I then looked on my phone at the current satellite image of where the storm was, there I could see here in Cliffe we were sitting in the eye of the storm, the safest place to be when all around that eye the winds were bringing destruction. If only we could remain in this central safe zone, but storms move and the eye with it and so as it passes by it is not long before the winds return and we must endure them until they fully pass us by. This reminded me of our spiritual lives set against the storms of life that sometimes pass our way and batter us. When these times come we need to focus on the peace and stillness that is found at the centre of our lives. It is Christ who wants to be that safe place in our lives, he is the eye of every storm, the place where we can find rest long enough to then be ready to face the storm again that will soon pass over us until we can come out on the other side.

Both the Psalmist and Jerimiah reflect that we cannot avoid the storms of life, but we can prepare for them, we can seek him who will guide us through them and bring us out on the other side, the psalmist said, give him all the praise. Jeremiah was pointing people towards this person as God's people faced many storms and today we can find comfort in knowing that this person is Jesus, and we find Jesus in the body of the Church, in other words, in each other. Its why we gather week by week so that we may help each other through the storms. Those storms come in many ways just like natures storms, they can be destructive but together we have the strength to weather them and come out on the other side.
