# *from our Rector*

It has been a busy time in the Church lately. Over the past two months we have had Christmas and Epiphany. These seasons in the Church calendar have been a time for celebrating with family and friends and journeying together.

With Candlemas (1<sup>st</sup> February 2026) marking the end of the Epiphany season, we will enter a little over two weeks of 'Ordinary Time' before the start of Lent on Ash Wednesday (18<sup>th</sup> February 2026). This period of Ordinary Time can seem like a moment to breathe after the busyness of Advent, Christmas and Epiphany. Although, as the Church of England states, despite its name, Ordinary Time 'is hardly boring'. We have a number of powerful readings coming up during these two weeks, including Matthew's version of the Transfiguration (Matt.17.1-9). This passage can help give us more insight into Jesus' life and identity as God's son, presenting us with the opportunity to continue to deepen our relationship with Jesus.

As that brief period of Ordinary Time concludes we reach Ash Wednesday. At our services that day we are invited to have a cross drawn on our foreheads in ash as a symbol of humility and a reminder of human mortality. Ash Wednesday begins the 40 days of Lent (excluding Sundays). Lent is an opportunity to slow down and look inward in order to prepare ourselves for the momentous events of Easter. It is a time for penitence, self-denial, self-examination and study. Sometimes these words and ideas can leave us feeling like Lent is a heavy time of year that is to be endured. Instead, I would like to encourage us to look to Lent as an opportunity to try and see ourselves from God's viewpoint. It is about allowing space for God's grace within us and to realign ourselves with God.

But Lent is not just a personal journey. It is a communal one too. All across the world Christians will be observing Lent. By sharing this experience with one another we are reminded that we are part of the great body of Christ, the Church, and that we walk this path together.

We will be running our Lent course this year and will use the 'Come and See' resource from the Oxford Diocese. Bishop Stephen Croft says this about this year's Lent Course:

*Come and See this year focuses on meeting Jesus in the Eucharist. In Holy Communion, we meet Jesus the servant, who welcomes us, and Jesus the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world.*

*We meet Jesus the Bread of Life, who feeds us for the journey, and Jesus the Vine, who offers us rest and life. We encounter Jesus the Son of God, who draws us into the life of the Holy Trinity; we meet Jesus the Apostle, who sends us to share in God's mission to the world.*

*There are life-changing truths embedded in the meal which is at the centre of our faith. Holy Communion is, in John Wesley's words, a 'converting ordinance'. We are drawn more deeply into the love of God whether we are enquirers ourselves or have been Christians for many years.*

Please keep an eye on the Pew Sheet for information about how to attend the Lent course this year.

I pray that in the few weeks after Epiphany and Ash Wednesday you will have a good time of rest before we begin the rich and insightful journey of Lent together this year.

As we start the new year, we reflect on the last month of 2025 and we are sorry to report the loss of two of our villagers John Taylor who passed away on Sunday 30th November and Miriam Parsley who died on Saturday 6th December. John was a well-known local farmer; a great character. Miriam was for many years a Sunday school leader here in Broughton and a member of the Church choir and was well known for her flower arranging. Our thoughts and prayers are with their families at this sad time.



On 13th December, we held our Church Fayre where we had a raffle, tombola, books, cakes, crafts and refreshments available to purchase. Thank you to everyone who came along to support us and all those who ran stalls. We are delighted to report that we raised a wonderful £509.71; thank you.

Our Christmas services were really well attended. The collection of nearly £300 from the Crib Service is being donated to the Church of England Children's Society. The collections from the Carol service and Christmas Day service, totalling almost £500 is being given to Alan's Africa for the wonderful charity work Alan Wolstencroft is doing in Sierra Leone, building schools and improving living conditions in very poor communities.

For many years Doreen Knight has been part of the flower arranging team for St Mary's church and has also managed the rota during that time. She has decided to step down from the team and we would like to extend our thanks to Doreen for her significant contribution.

As we look ahead to the coming months, Lent begins on Ash Wednesday which falls on 18th February and Lent lunches will be held across the benefice.

Grateful thanks also go to Opus Property Service Ltd, for their professionalism and for completing the reordering works on time thereby enabling us to reopen the Church before Christmas.

We were able to clean and reopen the church in time for our Christmas Tree Festival and Christingle Service that weekend and were able to host the Sibford Tots Christmas Party and Sibford Primary School Christmas Service with a display demonstrating children's artistic talents in the enlarged and welcoming space.

# Celebrating the Benefice 30 years on

## The Wykeham Benefice, by Ken Jeffs

Major Pastoral Reorganisation in the north of the Deddington Deanery, agreed in late 1995, led to the creation of The Ironstone, Shires Edge and Wykeham Benefices. These church grouping were initially informal until the necessary legalities were completed.

The Revd Timothy Wimbush assumed responsibility for Broughton with North Newington and Shutford parishes on 1<sup>st</sup> January 1996. An inaugural Benefice Service was held in Broughton on 4<sup>th</sup> February. Timothy had been vicar in Sibford since 1976. Broughton and Shutford had been part of the Wroxton group of churches since 1990.

The new Wykeham Benefice was made up of the parishes of Broughton with North Newington, Epwell, Shutford, Sibford, Swalcliffe and Tadmarton. We have been together for 30 years and during that time we have had three Rectors: Timothy

Wimbush until September 2011, Ronald Hawkes – September 2012 until January 2020, Neil Bowler – January 2021 until July 2023 and Emily Rowbottom-Scott from August 2024. During the two vacancies church wardens became responsible for their parishes under the guidance of Revd John Tattersall and the Area Dean.

Our Rectors had / have different styles of ministry and interpretation of the scriptures in a rapidly changing world. Some have liberal ideas, others have more traditional views, but all come together to exemplify the churches “Living in Faith and Love” doctrine. They have been ably assisted by many other priests, not least Keith Walklate and John Tattersall, Associate Ministers, and village lay people.

Our six communities are all different – we have shared happiness and sadness over the years and have come together for all the important occasions. Our congregation numbers remain stable, but we need younger members of our villages to lend a hand to keep our churches open and part of village life. Our churches are for people of all faiths or none and everyone is welcome in them. Whatever happens, we will continue to care for our neighbours and will always have a cup of tea available and some cake to share.

We remembered our 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary at the Epiphany Service on 4<sup>th</sup> January in Sibford with a birthday cake. There will be more celebrations and recollections during this year




