



Look to the east, O Jerusalem, and see the glory that is coming from God.
Baruch 4:36

Across Morecambe Bay, even in winter, we are treated to some stunning sunrises. As we look east, we sense hope on the horizon. Hope for all that lies ahead in the day, hope for our lives, for the Church, for the World. We face east, towards the holy city, each time we gather to worship in our churches, and our invitation at the Eucharist is to lift our hearts, as well as our eyes, our minds, and our voices. It is our duty and our joy to gather in this way, in these places, to respond to God's invitation to make this memorial of our redemption until Jesus comes again.

There are a great many things that would lead us to do quite the opposite. To be those who are downcast, weary, mournful and full of despair. To be those who give up on meeting together for times of fellowship. To be those who, like the Psalmist, admit 'Why are you so full of heaviness, O my soul, and why are you so disquieted within me?' (Psalm 42:6). It is a radically countercultural thing to maintain hope in the midst of difficulty, to see the light in the darkness. And yet, from the day before Jesus died until the day He comes again in glory, we are commanded to gather, to retell our narrative of salvation, and to eat and drink in His holy presence, fed and blessed to go and be lights for Christ in the world.

As I step down as Vicar of the Benefice I feel a profound sense of Hope for the Church. God has called some remarkable people to this place at this time, and the knitting together of relationships has been a joy to behold. We have seen, by the grace of God, new members of our congregations, new leaders and ministers of the Gospel, the strengthening of ecumenical partnerships and the healing of broken and damaged relationships, both between the churches and in the wider community. The Benefice is ready for something new and the Lord has promised that you will be 'shocked and amazed' (Isaiah 29.9) by what He is going to do in this place in you and through you, to His praise and Glory.

Thank you for praying for me, for encouraging me, for feeding me, and for offering me your blessing as I continue to serve God as a teacher, a mother and as a priest in this place. As the Psalmist continues:

'O put your trust in God, for I will yet give him thanks, who is the help of my countenance, and my God'. (Psalm 42:7)




Born in the British Virgin Islands in 1744 JCL was sent to Lancaster to be educated at age 6. As I write this in mid-December; it is hard to believe that we are nearing the end of another year. What will the New Year bring for us as a village, as a church, as individuals, and as a community.

By the time you read this article, Winter will be well on its way, yet all around us there are signs of spring. Snowdrops and crocuses are beginning to emerge, mornings are gradually becoming lighter, and we can hear birds singing in the trees. The earth is quietly preparing for renewal, reminding us that even in times of waiting, God is already at work.

Archbishop Hutton Charity (Almshouses)

Warton Almshouses: subsidised housing for people in need of support

Hundreds of years ago, a Charity was set up by Archbishop Hutton, who came from the Ancient Parish of Warton. The Charity provides subsidised housing for those in need of support and who at the time of applying, live in the parishes of **Warton or the surrounding area**.

At present, there is a vacancy. The property is undergoing some re-furnishement and is likely to be available in March. The expected monthly payment is significantly lower cost than would be usual, for an applicant who can demonstrate a need for such support.

The vacant Almshouse is one of a pair of semi-detached bungalows. It has a living room, single bedroom, kitchen, shower-room and access to an outdoor area. Viewing can be arranged prior to making an application.

Application forms, and some further details (including costs), are available from the Secretary (address below) and must be returned to the Secretary by **4.00pm on Monday 16 February 2026**. Viewing of the property can be arranged with the Treasurer (phone number below) Applications will be considered by the Trustees and short-listed applicants will be called for interview, probably in mid-March.

Helping Homeless People

Do you feel uncomfortable walking past people who are homeless? Maybe you feel you should do your bit to help them, but you are not sure how to do it?

One very practical way you could help them would be to donate to Lancaster and District Homeless Action Service (LDHAS). This is a charity that offers services to local homeless people and those in housing poverty. These include practical help such as breakfast and lunch, showers and laundry facilities, clothing, medical support, access to phones and assistance with form filling. They also offer advice and information about claiming benefits, accessing housing, drug and alcohol treatment services and employment.

It costs the charity a lot to provide these services so they are always grateful for financial contributions. If you wish to make a donation you can do so through their just giving site

You can also leave donations of food and clothing in the boxes at the back of St Oswald's and St John's Churches.

They would be very grateful for donations of clothing suitable for 30 – 40-year-old men particularly jeans sizes 32 – 34", boxers, t-shirts, trainers and socks.

They would also be grateful for donations of food to help them provide breakfasts and lunch, particularly long life semi skimmed milk, tinned vegetables, cereals, coffee and sugar.

Eco Church Gardening in January: Welcoming Creation in Winter

January may seem quiet in the garden, but it's a month full of potential for Eco Churches committed to caring for creation. While the soil rests and many plants sleep, this is a time to observe, plan, and prepare—and even spot some early signs of life.

Flowers to Watch For even in January, some plants brave the cold and offer vital nectar to early pollinators:

- Snowdrops: These delicate white blooms often appear in churchyards and signal hope and renewal.
- Mahonia: With bright yellow flowers, it's a winter lifeline for bumblebees on sunny days.
- Daphne and Japanese quince: Fragrant and colourful, they attract bees and lift spirits.
- Hellebores: Also known as Christmas roses, they bloom in winter and can be planted now to establish new colonies.

Wildlife to Welcome



January wildlife may be subtle, but it's there:

- Bumblebees: On warmer days, they emerge and need quick access to nectar-rich flowers
- Birds: Robins, blackbirds, and finches forage for berries and seeds. Consider adding feeders or planting native shrubs.
- Lichens and mosses: Gravestones and shaded walls can host diverse species—mini ecosystems worth celebrating.
- Hedgehogs and bats: Though mostly dormant, they benefit from undisturbed leaf piles and quiet corners.

Gentle Gardening Tasks

- Plant bare-root trees and shrubs: Ideal for hedging and habitat creation.
- Take cuttings: From forsythia, willow, or viburnum to propagate for spring.
- Leave leaf litter and seed heads: These provide shelter and food for insects and birds.

A Sacred Invitation

Gardening in January is more than maintenance—it's a spiritual act.

By preparing our church grounds with intention, we create a space where faith meets ecology, and where winter's stillness becomes a canvas for renewal.

THE CIRCLE OF LIFE

Last year, 2025, I learnt a new word, AGENTIC, a word which will have influence on our lives in 2026. The word is derived from AGENCY, meaning the power to take action.

AGENTIC AI is designed to execute complex tasks independently, make decisions and influence outcomes with little or no human involvement. In former years this would have been the work of a personal assistant i.e. a PA.

For the Gen Z generation i.e. born between 1997-2012, as the first generation to grow up with the internet and smart phones, Agentic AI will seem to be a normal development.

Much of the narrative during 2025 was how artificial intelligence would affect our daily lives. In this New Year, 2026, we are about to find out. Having listened, in particular, to how AI will improve health services, I am not convinced. Human contact is fundamental to our earthly existence. The talk of robotics in medicine makes me shudder.

God created a perfect world for us to live in harmony with each other and with nature. We are dependent upon the natural resources given by the earth for our existence and wellbeing. To create artificial intelligence, the earth has to be plundered for rare minerals to produce acres of Terminals with semi-conductors, supporting the AI plant. These installations become very hot and require gallons of water for cooling. I think during 2026, we will hear global warming is no longer an existential threat as solar panels will never produce the amount of energy to support AI plants.

To start 2026 let us give thanks for the love of God in whom we trust. Our faith may well be threatened by AI, but robots can never emulate human love, sympathy and gratitude.

Living within this benefice, we walk daily in nature, for which we are truly blessed. Observing the bounty of life, a constant joy.

Think of the miraculous birth of a baby, an explosion of God's love, bringing a new life and spirit into the world. As spring approaches, we can observe the same outside. Walking one can almost feel the ground coming back to life.

The hard frosts have disappeared, and the earth is full of life with worms, beetles, rabbits restless in their need for sunlight, simultaneously moles are forming relationships to prepare for breeding. We celebrate the sight of a first snowdrop followed by wood sorrel and wild primroses.

We can never divorce birth from death, nor should we seek to do so. Our Christian faith knows death is not the end, but the start of a new beginning as the spirit ascends to everlasting life. This is our belief and our comfort, as 'God so died for us, whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.'

I fully understand when we question God's love having witnessed both traumatic births and traumatic deaths. Life was forever thus. However heartbreaking these situations may be, the Lord our God never leaves us. We must learn not to fear life events as love is forever omnipresent.

I am reminded of the words of an Elton John song taken from The Lion King, 'The Circle of Life'

'A Baby is born, starting a new life of growing and learning, wonderment and joy. Yesterday an old lady died, she was a mother, a grandmother, a sister, a great grandmother.

For weeks they shared the same world
When one life begins another must end
Live your life
Enjoy your moment, it will end of that we know
Give out love, love your life and those around you.
Make the most of the days you have'

This is a lovely testament at the start of a New Year, 'make the most of the days you have'.

From experience, each day can offer new opportunities to grow and learn whatever your age. All that is required is for your heart to remain open to the love of God.

Our Christian faith which encompasses compassion, humility, integrity and justice is the bedrock of our future. Emotions that can never be emulated by Agentic AI. Men have fought for our freedom, and we must in turn protect those freedoms. Individual autonomy as important as the collective. We can learn to listen more and speak more freely as God ordained.

Let us give thanks for God's love and guidance at the start of 2026.






