The Benefice January 2026 of Groby and Ratby

This month we celebrate Epiphany, the occasion on which we remember the Magi from the East following a star to find the baby Jesus: *'Where is the One who has been born king of the Jews?' (Matthew 2:1).*

At the start of a New Year, in an uncertain world, we can be asking the same question. The gifts the Magi offered point us to how Jesus can answer our concerns and worries: *'they bowed down and worshipped Him...and presented Him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.' (2:11).*

The *gift of gold* reflects that the Magi saw in the baby a king, destined to rule over us all. In this coming year we need to remember that Jesus is on the throne, the seat of power and authority in the whole universe. Will we crown Him king of our lives and dedicate all that we are and do to Him?

The *gift of frankincense* reflects that the visitors saw not just an earthly king, but God in human flesh. Incense symbolises the prayers of God's people and so this gift reminds us that God is worthy of our worship and prayer. Will we offer our praise and prayer, as we



seek God to guide us through the uncertainties of this coming year?

The *gift of myrrh* reflects that these astrologers saw beyond the baby's birth and life, to His death which would secure life for all. Jesus was offered myrrh on the cross and was a spice used in His tomb. As we face challenges in the future, we can be confident that Jesus knows and understands our experience. Are we ready to trust Him in everything?

*'Glorious now behold Him arise,
King and God and Sacrifice!
Heav'n sings Hallelujah:
Hallelujah the earth replies.'
('We Three Kings').*

On 6th January we celebrate **Epiphany** - the visit of the Wise Men to the baby Jesus. But who were these Wise Men? No one knows for sure. Matthew calls them 'Magi', and that was the name of an ancient caste of a priestly kind from Persia. It wasn't until the third century that they were called kings - by a church father, Tertullian.

Another church father, Origin, assumed there were three - to correspond with the gifts given. Later Christian interpretation came to understand gold as a symbol of wisdom and wealth, incense as a symbol of worship and sacrifice, and myrrh as a symbol of healing - and even embalming. Certainly Jesus challenged and set aright the way in which the world handled all three of these things. Since the 8th century, the Magi have had the names Balthasar, Caspar and Melchior.



Services and Events in January

As we come into Epiphany season, our regular pattern of worship will continue, but with some specials added in! Thus in Ratby on Sunday 11th January we will worship together with our Methodist friends at the Chapel for their Covenant service. This is a beautiful service in which we commit ourselves to God and if you've never experienced it, do go as it is lovely – and if you have been before, go and enjoy it again! Then, later in the month, it is the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity and so on 18th January our Methodist friends will join us in Ratby and then on the 25th of January our URC friends will join us in Groby and we celebrate being the one body of Christ together.



Rector's Ramblings



I remember on 6th May 1989, at the age of 14, being confirmed by the then Bishop of Crediton, Peter Coleman. If I am honest, I remember the exact date as one of my Godfathers gave me a copy of the Alternative Service Book (which dates me – now superseded by Common Worship!) with the date inscribed. But my Godfather also referred me to the Collect on p59, which is this:

O God, the author of peace and lover of concord, to know you is eternal life and to serve you is perfect freedom: Defend us, your humble servants, in all assaults of our enemies; that we, surely trusting in your defence, may not fear the power of any adversaries; through the might of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

What is Confirmation in the Church of England? In a nutshell, it is a service where a person publicly affirms the promises made at their baptism and is prayed for by the bishop to be strengthened by the Holy Spirit. More importantly it is a personal profession of Christian faith, marking a conscious choice to live as a disciple of Christ, strengthened by the Church and the Holy Spirit. But, even more importantly, it marks accepting your place in the family of God and so knowing all the benefits of the Collect quoted above and much more besides.

I remember my confirmation, because it was a profound experience. Interestingly, for me, the sense of the Holy Spirit came at the rehearsal beforehand – the service itself literally confirmed what was already there! I also remember some of what the Bishop said – and how many of us remember much of a sermon from over quarter of a century ago?! But that was the impact of the experience on me.

If you are not confirmed and would like to explore this important step of faith, do come and talk to me (Rev'd Ed) and we will arrange times to meet and talk about it all – and prepare to be confirmed for those that might want to make this

commitment. For those that want to make this commitment as an adult (or an older child/teenager), but are worried they haven't been baptised, don't worry you can be baptised and confirmed at the same time!

Writing this for the January magazine, I cannot help but wonder if this might not be the best New Years Resolution you could ever make! So do come and talk to me and let's explore together what committing ourselves to Christ really looks like, in confirming that we are, and want to be, part of God's amazing family!

Advent Prayers

These prayers were used by David Willis as intercessions recently and I thought they were a beautiful series of prayers rooted in the ancient tradition of the 'O' Antiphons, a series of short verses which count down the days to Christmas Eve. David kindly shared these prayers and I used them myself in Groby, but, as the magazine is written and comes out still in the season of Advent, I thought it would be lovely to share these even more widely:

O Wisdom, mysterious Word of God, coming forth from the Father and filling all creation with your life-giving power: Come and show us the way of truth.

O Lord of Israel, ruler of your ancient people, you appeared to Moses in the burning bush and gave the law on Mount Sinai: Come, and reach out your hand to save us.

O Flower of Jesse's Line, Son of David, you have been lifted up as a sign of peace, drawing all kings and people to stand silent in your presence: Come quickly and help us, we beseech you.

O Key of David, and sceptre of the house of Israel, you have opened to us the way of hope, and shut the door on the powers of evil: Come and free us from our prisons of darkness.

O Morning Star, radiance of the Father's love, you are the brightness that disperses the shadows of our hearts: Come, cleanse and renew us in your glory.

O King of the Nations, you alone bring joy when you reign in our hearts, and you are the cornerstone of our lives: Come and strengthen us, who were formed by you.

O Emmanuel, God with us, hope of the world, and Saviour of all, come and live in us, now and for ever.

Amen.



Rector's Recipes

Pastitsio

Well, it's back to me again for your culinary delights! Having been in Italy for my holidays, I have been revisiting some of my old Italian recipes and here is one I have made for many years – a sort of Italian equivalent of our cottage pie!

Ingredients

225g/8oz macaroni
90g/3oz butter or margarine
60g/2 oz Parmesan cheese, grated
Pinch of grated nutmeg
2 eggs, beaten
1 medium onion, peeled and chopped
1 clove garlic, crushed
450/1lb mince beef
2 tbsp tomato puree
60ml/2fl oz red wine
90ml/3 fl oz beef stock
2 tbsp chopped parsley
2 tbsp plain flour
280ml/½ pint milk
Salt and pepper



Method

Preheat oven to 190°C/Gas mark 5.

Cook macaroni in plenty of boiling salted water for 10 minutes or until tender but still firm. Rinse under hot water and drain.

Put one third of the butter or margarine into the pan and return the macaroni to it. Add half the cheese, nutmeg and salt and pepper to taste. Leave to cool and then mix in half the beaten egg.

Melt half the remaining butter or margarine in a pan and fry the onion and garlic gently until the onion is soft. Then increase the temperature and add the mince beef and fry until browned.

Add the tomato puree, beef stock, red wine and parsley and season with salt and pepper. Simmer for 20 minutes

In a small pan melt the remaining butter or margarine. Stir in the flour and cook for 30 seconds. Remove from the heat and stir in the milk, then return to the heat and bring to the boil, stirring continuously until the sauce thickens. Beat in the remaining egg and season to

Spoon half the macaroni into an oven proof dish, then cover with the meat sauce. Put on another layer of macaroni and then pour over the white sauce. Sprinkle with the remaining cheese and bake in the oven for 30 minutes until golden brown. Serve and enjoy – lovely with salad and/or garlic bread.

A "Letters to Heaven" post box is a special white, mailbox placed on the wall of the church rooms Church Lane Ratby.

The post box gives the opportunity for grieving people to write and "post" letters, cards, or messages to loved ones they've lost, offering comfort and a way to express feelings on special occasions or any time. The letters are kept securely and never read.

How it works:

Write your message: Create letters, birthday cards, anniversary notes, or anything you wish to say to someone who has passed.

Post it: Place the message in the special post box; no stamp or address is needed.

Comfort & Ritual: The act provides comfort and a meaningful way to connect, often used for important dates or just to share feelings.

Secure & Confidential: Letters are stored securely and never opened or read by anyone.

Disposal: they will be securely disposed of on Easter Sunday each year

How to keep those New Year Resolutions

We are full of good intentions at the start of each year. How come we usually fizz out by February? Here are some tips to keep you going...

Be realistic. If you have several goals, don't attempt them all at once. Research has found that if you stagger your goals, you will have more success. So, for example, if this year you want to spend less money, do more exercise and spend more time with your family, start one change this month, another in February, and start the third in March.

Be specific. For example, don't tell yourself: Lose weight. Decide exactly how much you want to lose. When do you want to lose it by? How will you do it? If you want more time with your family, how and when will you do that? The more exact you can be, the more likely you are to succeed.

Write it down. There's something about committing thoughts to paper that helps to cement your resolve. Why not start some sort of journal this year, to track your thoughts, your hopes, your goals – and your successes!

Tell other people. If you intend to do something, tell someone, and therefore you will feel more obliged to get going with it... your pride may keep you going when all else fails!

Focus on GAIN, not loss. Ever notice how many resolutions are about giving something up? Why not put it the other way round - instead of saying you will eat less, tell yourself you are headed for those skinny jeans....

Give yourself rewards. If you are quitting smoking or sweets, for example, put the money that you would have spent in a jam jar, and treat yourself to something nice (and healthy) with it.

Break your resolution into steps. Some goals will take months to achieve. So, break each one down into tiny steps, and simply head for each step. Build in some time frames, to prevent you procrastinating.

Finally, don't let failure defeat you. You will make mistakes. But the secret is to simply get up again and to keep going. Only if you stop are you *really* defeated. None of us are perfect, and the Bible encourages us to always start again.
