'There's no place like home' goes the old song and it is true that for virtually everyone home is important. One of the worst punishments that was handed down in the past was exile: a permanent exclusion from home. Of course leaving home is important. To establish our independence, our separate identity as individuals we need to break away eventually. But no sooner have we left home than we are trying to create home for ourselves. For most of us home is a geographical place. Some people are clever enough to be able to feel at home in a variety of different places. Gypsies and travelling people come to mind, but most of us pine for something more settled than that.

However, the Christian gospel suggests that home is not something with which we should be too comfortable. Throughout the Bible, the people of God are seen as a pilgrim people, constantly moving on. Of course, God promised his people a home, the promised land, Jerusalem, the temple. Nevertheless, Jesus teaches that God is not to be found in any particular place. He himself leaves home and becomes an itinerant preacher, moving on from place to place, however when he returned to his home town of Nazareth it was a disaster. His fellow townspeople took offence at him. We can just imagine it. *"Who does this chap think he is, trying to teach us? We can remember him running around in short trousers and no shoes and socks."* So Jesus declares, *"prophets are not without honour except in their home town ..."* and so on.

The very next thing that Jesus does is to send out his twelve closest followers to spread the good news of the Kingdom of God. He sends them out, away from home, with few of the luxuries that most of us take for granted as necessary for a secure life: no bread, no bag, no money, no change of clothes. It's as if he's stripping them of anything of home. Maybe he did this in response to the way in which he was received when he went home. Maybe his thought is that if he has not been respected in his own home, then neither would they be in theirs. Perhaps people will receive the message better from outsiders. So, from now on Jesus and his band seem to steer clear of home. They always seem to be on the road, moving on.

This constant moving on continues after the earthly time of Jesus. So much so that the first title applied to Christians is those who belong to *'The Way'*. Early Christians reflect this in their writings. Paul teaches us (Phil. 3.20) that *"our citizenship is in heaven"* and in Hebrews we learn that *"here we have no lasting city, for we seek the city that is to come."* Early Christians used a very strange phrase to describe themselves. They called themselves *'resident aliens'*. For although they knew they lived in the world they also knew that their real home was not here but in another place. They had a vision of something far more wonderful than any earthly home could be; a heavenly home in which they could enjoy eternal bliss in company with God.





This vision is a great challenge to us. We are the inheritors of the faith of those early Christians but I guess that most of us love and need the security of home. We want to feel that we have somewhere we can go back to, somewhere we really belong. So how can this paradox be resolved? On the one hand, our deep need for home; on the other, the teaching of the Bible and the Christian tradition that our real home is in heaven, with God. I think there is a way out and it works something like this. All of us need the experience and comfort of home. Without this, especially in our formative years, we become dislocated and disturbed. Moreover, throughout our lives we need the comforts of home to rest upon. However, these comforts, and even home itself, should never be seen as ends in themselves.

What they really are, are pointers to something far more real and fundamental. Indeed perhaps we could say that they are earthly reminders of where we come from and where we are all bound. For God himself is our true origin and our destiny and our earthly homes with all their comforts and contents are a distant echo of where we come from and where we shall return. So let us not invest ultimate value in our mortal homes or in all our possessions. Rather let us look through them seeing them as pointers to the one ultimate reality and our final home, God our creator and redeemer.

Rise and Worship Can Be Fun

Here at St Ediths, Grimoldby, our first service of 2026 was our monthly Rise and Worship Service which took place on the 11th January. As part of our main talk during the service we asked for 2 volunteers, and thankfully Yvonne Smith and Bill Everett stood up for the challenge. As you can see, Yvonne stood behind Bill with her arms extending from his waist. Guided by the rest of the congregation, Yvonne had to wash her hands, finding the soap and towel, then proceed to make a proper jam sandwich, opening the butter and Jam jar, spreading the butter and jam to 2 slices of bread, then cutting the bread in half. Finally, feeding Bill with the jam sandwich, then washing and drying her hands. Thankfully for Yvonne, she was given very warm water to wash her hands. Many thanks to Yvonne and Bill for their excellent performance, well done.

Brief History of Shrove Tuesday

The tradition of acknowledging the start of the Lenten fast has been observed for at least hundreds of years. By the age of the late Middle Ages, the feast of Shrovetide lasted until the start of Lent. It was customary in many cultures to eat pancakes or other foods made with the butter, eggs, and fat that would be given up during the Lenten season.

The tradition of British Christians enjoying pancakes on Shrove Tuesday dates back to the 16th century.



Along with its celebration of feasting, another Shrove Tuesday tradition includes Christians repenting their sins in preparation to start the season of Lent. Ælfric of Eynsham's "Ecclesiastical Institutes" from about 1000 AD declared: "In the week immediately before Lent everyone shall go to his confessor and confess his deeds and the confessor shall so shrive him as he then may hear by his deeds what he is to do [in the way of penance].". In many Protestant and Roman Catholic Christian churches, a popular Shrove Tuesday ritual is the ringing of the church bells (on this day, known as the Shriving Bell) "to call the faithful to confession before the solemn season of Lent" and for people to "begin frying their pancakes."







The New Bishop Of Grimsby

The Diocese of Lincoln is pleased to confirm that The Venerable Jean Burgess as the next Bishop of Grimsby. Jean is currently the Archdeacon of Bournemouth in the Diocese of Winchester and brings a wealth of experience in mission, ministry and leadership. She has previously served as an archdeacon in the Diocese of Manchester, where she played a pivotal role in transformative change including the revitalisation of urban churches.

On Wednesday 10 and Thursday 11 December, Jean toured parts of the diocese who will benefit from her care and oversight. She visited various parishes, schools and churches as well as met the

diversity of people and communities building God's kingdom in Greater Lincolnshire. Jean will serve alongside the Bishop of Lincoln and the Bishop of Grantham in the leadership of the diocese. As the Bishop of Grimsby, she will have particular care and responsibility for the north of the diocese. She will also take a lead on mission and evangelism for the whole diocese. As the chair of the Diocesan Board of Education, she will work with schools and colleges to see young people in the area develop and thrive. She was ordained priest in 2004 and has ministered in varied contexts, serving her curacy in Church Gresley, Priest-in-Charge and then incumbent at St Alkmund and St Werburgh in Derby. Jean also held the portfolio roles of Dean of Women for the Diocese of Derby, Honorary Canon at Derby, Manchester and Winchester Cathedrals and Assistant Archdeacon (2017) in the Diocese of Derby.


Speaking about her appointment, The Venerable Jean Burgess said:



Here are some tips on what to do if you have one in your home to minimise any damage:

1. Turn off the water supply

Find and turn off the main stop tap – it should be in the cupboard under your kitchen sink or where the service pipe comes into your home.

2. Drain the cold-water system, turn on all your cold taps to do this.

3. Turn off water heating systems. Switch off your central heating, immersion heater or any other water heating systems. If you use solid fuel, let this die out. Once it's shut down, turn on the hot taps to drain the system.

4. Turn off the electrics.

Don't touch any wet electrical fittings such as lights, sockets, or appliances. Switch off the electricity supply straight away and call an electrician.

5. Release any ceiling water.

If water's been leaking for a while, it may have damaged your ceiling plaster. If you see a bulge in the ceiling, make a hole to release the plaster and water.

6. Check your insurance.

Your home policy may cover you for plumbing or heating emergencies; if it does, contact your insurer for assistance.

7. Call a professional to repair the damage.

If you need to find a qualified plumbing and/or heating professional, take a look at the online search tool WaterSafe.
