Rachel writes . . .

With so much in the news that makes me feel sad or fearful, it was a joy in the first half of February to come across a story that gave me reason to feel joy and hope. I don't remember how I first stumbled across this particular news item, but it was about a group of nineteen Buddhist monks (and one dog) who set out on a Walk of Peace from their monastery in Texas to walk 2,300 miles to Washington DC. They left the monastery on October 26th and walked for four months, arriving in Washington DC on February 10th, where they were welcomed at Washington National Cathedral for an interfaith service. It was a journey of 108 days, which is a sacred number in Buddhism.

I don't know what they expected as they set out - maybe no one would notice their journey, or maybe a few people would greet them along the way. What actually happened was amazing. As they walked in single file, in silence, mindfully marking each step, walking through freezing temperatures, people came out in great numbers to offer food and drink, to cheer them on, and to kneel and ask for a blessing. When they arrived in Washington DC, thousands of people came out to greet them.

What was it about their journey that touched so many people? In an article in the Guardian, reference was made to how fractured American society is, and called the monks and their journey 'a balm for America's wounds'. The New York Times noted that Americans are feeling weary, and that the monks' journey gave people an opportunity to slow down, to think about peace. Many spoke about gaining a sense of calm being in the monks' presence. "May you be safe and warm. Thank you for your walk of peace. We desperately need this in our world now," one follower on Facebook wrote.

At Washington National Cathedral, they were welcomed by Washington Episcopal (Anglican) Bishop Mariann Budde. "Their long journey and gentle witness invite us all to deepen our commitment to compassion," she said. The dog accompanying the monks on their journey was a street dog with a heart-shaped mark on his forehead whom they had adopted when they did a similar walk in India. Aloka, which means "light" in Sanskrit, became a celebrity in his own right, with his own Facebook page.

In his book, *Three Mile an Hour God*, the Japanese theologian Kosuke Koyama notes that 'Love has its speed. It is a spiritual speed. It is a different kind of speed from the technological speed to which we are accustomed. It goes on in the depth of our life, whether we notice or not, at three miles an hour. It is the speed we walk and therefore the speed the love of God walks.'

This is the speed the monks walked, and the people who witnessed their walk also witnessed peace, calm and love. They stood by the side of the road to witness love. In the Gospels we read about Jesus and the disciples making their way from town to town, from village to village, on foot. They will have walked at the same speed as the monks did, at a speed where you can notice everything around you, where you can share a sense of peace and calm with those around you. This Lent, let us all walk at the speed that God walks - the speed of love.




BOOK REVIEW

SHOTTLEGATE & DISTRICT W.I (EST.1918)

Meet first Wednesday of each month @ 7.00pm

Our first meeting of the year was held on February 4th 2026 with a 'full house' of members attending. Our speaker was Mary Wilson portraying 'Life as a Mill Worker in 1850' dressed in character and using local vocabulary and accent of the time. The mill was very noisy and dangerous with machines. Sign language was in common usage.

Telling of how living in Long Row, The Clusters and other Strutt owned houses for workers was a huge step up from living in poor housing in areas outside Belper and having to walk to work each day, six days a week. There were also houses just for apprentices. Life was frugal but sheltered, tin-baths for bathing by the fire and a cold water wash in the morning.

Long hours of work six days a week starting at 7am, with Sunday free for obligatory attendance at the Chapel. During the working day there was a one hour dinner break -workers went home to eat, there was then a mug of tea break mid afternoon. The working day finished at 7pm.

Mary told the life of a mill worker wonderfully with recognition of the benefits of working under The Strutt's ethos of care and education for their workers and their families.

Mary was thanked for her enjoyable and informative talk. Refreshments were served to Mary, her helpers and to our members which brought to a close a very informative and enjoyable evening.

BARBADOS

Our experience of Barbados, the most easterly of the Caribbean, is that it is a very happy place to be with everyone polite and helpful. It measures only 43Km x 34 Km but packs a lot within this space. It was first colonised during the reign of Charles I and by 1639 there were six Parishes and by 1652 there were, as there still are, 11 (these were on the Anglican model, religious and administrative units). For many years The Anglican was the major church in the Island. Today, all the old Parishes are still there and the worship in these churches is High Church in nature. The 18th century saw the arrival of Moravians and Wesleyans, with the Roman Catholics, a century later. Nowadays a huge number more recent American churches have sprung up, the latest group to try an establish a foothold seemed to be the JW's.

The old Anglican Churches are all interesting buildings, mostly built in the early 1800s as replacements for the original churches, or to replace churches destroyed by hurricanes. Their style is a sort of late Georgian/early Victorian Gothic and originally they all had organs. They are large churches - think St Peter's in Belper as the size of most of them and, like St Peter's, have galleries, with organs (where they sound best - in the West end). The former Anglican College, Codrington College is wonderfully sited just above the sea and it is approached via a stupendous avenue of royal palms, it was the first such College in the Western Hemisphere - founded in 1830, but the building dates from 1634.

The Islands Anglicans and Catholics have their Cathedrals in the principal city of Bridgetown, the former is St Michaels, a very imposing building to the east of the city and, like all the churches we visited, the walls are lined with many interesting memorials. The Catholic Cathedral is dedicated to St Patrick and dates from 1840. Also in Bridgetown is the old Synagogue: this was one of the two oldest synagogues in the Western hemisphere, built in the 1654, destroyed by a hurricane and rebuilt in the 19th, it then fell into disuse in 1929, as by this time all the Jews had left the Island. Recently it was restored and, with its attendant museum, tells a fascinating story, especially interesting was the recently-discovered Mikvah (ritual bath), dating back to 1634 and being the only one known to exist in the Americas.

I managed to chat to a few of the organists and the job is highly regarded there - the organist has his/her named parking place for example. Enough playing was heard to shew that high levels of musicianship are standard. Nowadays, as so often, when the old organs are in need of major intervention, they are often being replaced with (very expensive) digital/electronic instruments, the only two pipe organs I saw looked magnificent but unfortunately I couldn't get permission to try them.

Unfortunately, we were unable to attend any services - lack of transport and distance from the nearest Anglican Church made this impossible, this was a shame as I suspect the services would have been quite something.

I was able to buy a lovely book called "Historic Churches of Barbados", illustrated with lovely photographs, profits from its sale go towards the upkeep of the islands historic churches. At the moment this is my bedtime reading but if anyone is going to visit Barbados and would like a "taster", then please let me know.

Thank you for making us so welcome, Amita, as always the food was delicious. This month the book out of the **Random Selection Box** was ***Pride & Prejudice by Jane Austen*** it was selected by more than one reader! Wonderful to have Mr Darcy join the session!! The themes for the November meeting were ***Solitude & Surveillance***. The following books were shared:

The Snow Child by Eowyn Ivey: Set in the 1920s, Jack and Mabel, move to a homestead in Alaska to start a new life. While Jack struggles to farm the land, Mabel grieves the stillbirth of their only child. With the appearance of the first snow and in a moment of lightness, they make a child out of snow only to find that, by morning, she has disappeared. They begin to make regular sightings of a little girl running through the forest, accompanied by a fox. Who is she and is it possible that she could this be their snowchild?

Solitude-Terry Waite – A study and analysis of different types of solitude. Terry has visited all the places and interviewed all the people featured in the book. Explores solitude due to Geography,(e.g. Australian Outback) Work (e.g. Spy), Inescapable solitude (e.g. Stalin's daughter and the after effects of a Japanese POW), Carers in society and End of Life Carers.

No Place to Hide -Glenn Greenwald:An account of the journey made and impact on the journalist (author) who exposed the information provided by Edward Snowden on Mass Surveillance and the gathering of data from emails telephone messages and online communication of the American people, (and potentially other countries worldwide) by the American Government – under the guise of "War on Terror" post 9/11. Discusses the impact on Society's behavior, and the extent that data gathering is used as a tool to control the masses. Highlights the invasion of our privacy which we appear to readily accept, and the close association and collaboration of companies such as Google, Yahoo, Facebook, Skype with Governments. Our day to day activities are now known as Facebook Data!

All He Ever Wanted -Anita Shreve: Nicholas van Tassel is a mediocre academic with a high opinion of himself. He obsessively pursues the love of his life -Etna Bliss, who craves Solitude, and goes to great lengths to achieve it. This fuels Nicholas' jealousy and obsession to 'own' her. Nicholas carries out unreasonable Surveillance of his wife and his subsequent actions have a detrimental impact on his family, career and his life in general.

The Sea The Sea -Iris Murdoch: Charles Arrowby chases a retirement of solitude after a successful career in the London Theatre and buys a house by the sea. Things don't turn out as he planned as he meets with the 'Love of his Life' from years ago. Despite this being a Booker Prize Winner and ticking the box for the 'Selected Theme' – I didn't enjoy the book and found the main character's behavior a bit bizarre – and annoying!




