Letter from the Chaplain



“Father, forgive.” As we begin Lent and the 40 days of preparation for Holy Week and Easter, we enter a time of reflection. A time to step back and look at our lives, the world, where we are now and where we hope to be. Yes, it is a time to be serious about things – and yes, giving something up for Lent can help focus us, remind us of what this season is all about – but not in a mea culpa, I am not worthy, self-mortifying way. This is not a time to look at our manifold sins and wickednesses and get bogged down in naming every single thing and feeling sorry for ourselves because of

our failings. This is not what “O lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world” demands of us.

It is a recognition of the things we have done, and not done, yes, but it is to be done in the light of the fulfilled promise of Christ, his words at the Last Supper: “this is my blood of the new covenant which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.” It is done to bring transformation, to restore hope. Our examination of our selves is done in the hope Christ’s promise, the gift that is given through his life death and resurrection. Yes, we acknowledge that we have trespassed, but we know that before we even confess them, these are forgiven, just as we forgive others.

This contemplation of who we are, where we are, is done in the light of the one who came to give us hope, forgiveness and life. The one who tells us: ‘I believe in you, you can be more than you are. Follow me, forgive others, forgive yourselves, and step forward into the light with

me. Don't just sit there wallowing in those things that you have done, or not done, but learn from these, move forward in the light of these, using the past deeds to know better how to live now and in the future, to understand what my calling to you is, and go out into the world, be there, be with me there.'

We acknowledge our sins and wickedness and accept the freely given, but dearly-bought, forgiveness from the one who forgives from the heart. Then we are tasked to take this gift of forgiven-ness into our lives by living God's word in all we do – in our thoughts, words and deeds. Walking with Christ to bring hope back into the world by sharing God's love and loving forgiveness with all. By seeking to transform the lives of those who live in darkness, in poverty, in hopelessness, in fear, who are struggling against all the world throws at them, struggling to forgive themselves, forgive others or feel forgiven.

Perhaps this Lent, instead of giving something up to help ourselves, we can take something up – a charity, an activity, - which builds up the lives of others. Perhaps this Lent we can donate to groups that help those in need or difficulty across the world, across Switzerland, across Zurich. Perhaps we can use the time to look at how we treat each other – do our actions show our love of each other or do we let our hurts, our assumed slights, get in the way of true relationship with each other and with God. Even little changes can help transform the world, make it more like the promised kingdom where each and every one of us lives life in all its fullness, where all feel safe, and greed, hate, terror, oppression are overcome, where those who spout hate and division are transformed, their words turned from fear-instilling to love-building, and where all hearts are united in the love of God, our love for God and our love for neighbour.

Let's use this Lent for a positive change letting the promise of Christmas move us forward through the reflecting we do in Lent, to the glorious transformation of Easter: let there be peace on earth and let it begin with us, now, today, this Lent and on into the rest of the year.

Music at St Andrew's

Music is a major part of the life of our Chaplaincy and there are many opportunities on offer to get involved in the musical life of the Church.

St Andrew's Choir

For older teenagers and adults our choir offers an opportunity to sing Anglican choral music. Our choir welcomes sopranos, altos, tenors and basses to sing pieces from across the Anglican repertoire and across the ages – from Purcel to Parry to Dove. They sing regularly in our main Sunday service and at a monthly Choral Evensong, and often take our Choral Evensong to our ecumenical partners in Zurich, singing in Predigerkirche and Augustinerkirche. At Christmas, our choir sings carols services in St Gallen, St Andrew's and Augustinerkirche, whilst a smaller group also sings a carol service in our daughter community in Zug. They also sing at our Ash Wednesday and Maundy Thursday services as well as a Good Friday service of words and music. Before the summer holidays they also hold an end of year concert in which they combine some of their religious repertoire as well as some secular pieces. Choir practice is Thursday evenings between 7 and 9pm.

St Andrew Choristers

For our young people who have treble voices we have our Choristers. This lively group of youngsters meets regularly during Zurich school terms after the main 10.30am Sunday service to rehearse music ready to take part in our Sunday services and carol services. They follow the RSCM training programme to learn about music and singing and earn their medals. They join our main choir regularly for Evensong, Sunday services and in our carol services in December. Once a year they have a trip to either join with others junior choirs or just sing in a different church in a different part of Switzerland.

STArS

For those who enjoy singing but who prefer a more informal style of music come and join the St Andrew's Singers (STArS). This group meets frequently to practice for half an hour after our main Sunday service. Their repertoire includes world music and music from the Iona Community and Taizé. This group leads the worship in our four Intergenerational Services in which the leadership of parts of the service are shared with younger members of the congregation. STArS is open to singers of all abilities – all that is needed is willingness to learn new songs and enthusiasm.

Words Matter!

I was inspired by an article in my newspaper this week. Martin Luther King III (1), the son of Martin Luther King jnr, wrote about the power of language to build up or break down. The words we choose to use to talk to or about others can really influence how that person is seen, feels or is represented. As Christians, we are commanded to love God with our heart, mind, soul and strength and to love our neighbour as ourself. In loving our neighbour, we are to speak with kindness, compassion, love. To use words which strengthen others, supporting them. We are also called to consider the words used in our wider society: to challenge the language of division, which demeans or dehumanises others, which destroys self-worth, diminishes or threatens. In the eyes of God, all humans are loved, all have a value beyond measure, and we, as beloved children of God ourselves, should work with God and each other to make sure no-one feels unloved, unworthy, that the language of hate, of name-calling, of prejudice is challenged and transformed into words of hope, love, unity and encouragement, so that God's will may be done on earth as it is in heaven, and so we live out the command to love God wholly and fully, and love our neighbour as ourself.

Our Lent Course: Lent February and March 2026:

Walking Holy Week with the Disciples

Have you ever wondered what the disciples were thinking during the events from Palm Sunday to Easter Day? This year's Lent course is offering a chance to walk with the disciples as they move through the events of that week with Jesus. We use the Gospels to try and understand their thoughts and feelings as they watched and worked with Jesus following his entry into Jerusalem. The sessions are based on ideas in the book: "Notes on an Execution" by Rhidian Brook (2025, SPCK) but rewritten and adapted for our Chaplaincy. The book itself is very interesting, ending with a series of meditations on Good Friday and the thoughts of the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. Our course walks towards Good Friday, piecing together the thoughts of the disciples from the Gospel stories and then there will be a final session after Easter when we look at the responses of the disciples to the resurrection.

The course will start the week after Ash Wednesday and will be held in person and online. The online sessions will be on Wednesdays from 6.30pm to 8.00pm. Please let Jackie know if you are interested in either the online or in person version. Once we know numbers for the in person session we can work out times and days. Come and join us on our walk with the disciples and Jesus as we journey through Lent.

Weekly Wednesday Eucharist

Every week we hold a said shortened Eucharist in St Andrew's Church at 10.15am in church during winter and bad weather or outside in summer, when the weather permits. This is a quiet service during which we speak the names of those who have asked for our prayers and remember the recently departed. Please do join us if you are in town at that time, or please do let us know any names for the prayer list.

Food for Thought! Or Recipe of the Month

Here is my recipe for bean casserole. It was one of the first vegetarian dishes I made and it is still a staple today. It is easy to make and to adapt – it all depends what you have in the cupboard or in the vegetable rack. Here is my original (I think – I have changed it so often).

- 1x onion
 - Garlic (how ever many cloves you like, but at least 1)
 - 1x green pepper
 - 1x tin peas (or a couple of handfuls of frozen)
 - 1x time baked beans (it also works with kidney bean, butter beans, aduki beans or similar)
 - 1x tinned chopped tomatoes
 - Olive oil
 - Black pepper
 - Dried thyme, basil, herbs of choice
1. Finely chop the onion and pepper and soften in a little olive oil in a saucepan.
 2. When the onion is translucent, add finely chopped/grated garlic and stir.
 3. Drain the tinned peas and add to the mixture. (If using frozen peas, they will need a little longer to cook)
 4. Add the baked beans and chopped tomatoes and stir.
 5. Add the dried herbs of choice.
 6. Simmer for about 20 minutes or until the vegetables are soft and all is piping hot.
 7. Serve with salad and potatoes (or rice if preferred).

As can be seen, the recipe can be adapted to preference and availability. Just have fun experimenting and enjoy your dinner.

Children, Families and Young People

Have you noticed how many children families and young people we have at our Chaplaincy services now? The creche at St Andrew's is a very popular feature of our Sunday services for families, and parents love being able to stay in the service with their children. The slightly older children enjoy their time in Junior Church, with fun activities linked to the readings for that Sunday, and once a month they get to take the communion elements and collection up to the altar.

Our older children enjoy Youth Group, with lots of fun activities – always involving food in some way, from just biscuits to full meals at the beginning of term. However, we are also about to introduce a new group to the life of St Andrew's. For children aged 10+ we will have a monthly Church Club held during the 10.30am service. This will involve well-planned, targeted activities for the age group, and sometimes they will join with the Youth Group on a Saturday for more adventurous activities. We hope this will inspire and engage these youngsters in the life of the church and our local communities.

All these activities need volunteers to help lead and run them. If you have time to help, either on a Friday evening, a Sunday morning or even for the occasional Saturday, please let either Jackie know, contact the office or let the Junior Church Admin team know. Thank you.

On Good Friday, the church communities across Zurich come together in a joint act of witness in the Kreuzweg procession across the city. For the past few years, I have been invited to read a prayer in English at one of the stages of the Weg, and this year this will be at the final stage at St Peter's Church. Please come along and walk with us if you are able, or choose one of the stages to join with this wonderful act of witness.



Kreuzweg is not the only ecumenical event the Chaplaincy engages in. We also hold a joint communion service in English and German with our Christkatholishe partner in St Gallen. I am also invited to take part in the August 1st celebrations at Predigerkirche and in Zug with our friends in the Reformierte Kirche. This year we have also been invited to host the AGCK (Churches together in Zurich) AGM and to host the World Day of Prayer, both at St Andrew's. I have also been involved in other projects at Predigerkirche, including leading a meditative evening using poetry from the Christian mystic poets. Working together with our ecumenical partners is a wonderful way to show solidarity and provides us with outreach and opportunities to witness with others.
