The December meeting was addressed by *Brian Morris* who gave a talk on **Magic Lantern Shows**.

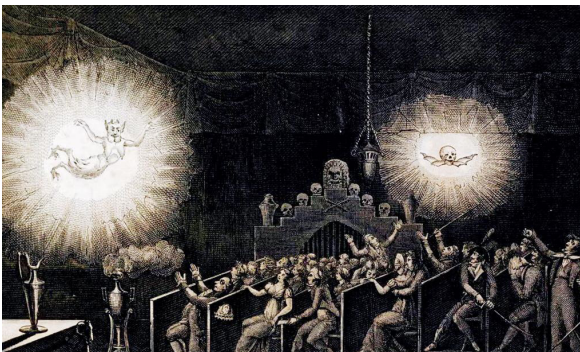
The lamp is an early type of image projector that uses pictures, paintings or photographs on transparent plates (usually made of glass), one or more lenses, and a light source. Because a single lens inverts an image projected through it which inverts the image, slides are inserted upside down. It was mostly developed in the 17th century and commonly used for entertainment purposes by showmen who travelled the country. It was increasingly used for education during the 19th century.

Apart from sunlight, the only light sources available at the time were candles and oil lamps, which were very inefficient and produced very dim projected images. The invention of The Argand Lamp (*a much more efficient Oil lamp*) in the 1790s helped to make the images brighter, and the invention of the electric arc lamp in the 1860s eliminated the need for combustible gases or hazardous chemicals.

The MagicLantern was in wide use from the 18th century until the mid-20th century when it was superseded by a compact version that could hold many 35mm photographic slides: the slide projector.

O What a Year!

It's good to look back and reflect on what we have achieved in the last 12 months in Salt & Hopton. The church is a focal point of the village and the heart of where key events of our lives are recorded.

We celebrated the baptism of *Donald, Grace and Olivia*, and two weddings between *Stella & Alex* and *James & Amy*. Both were happy occasions, but we also said our goodbyes to members of the community we loved; *Pat Scott, John & Beryl Rock* and *Frank Stubbs*. We tend to take the church for granted, but when we need it and need its support our faith brings us together.

Overall attendance has been maintained and at key dates through the year, such as Easter and Christmas the community came to celebrate the events with the regular church goers. Do remember, you are always welcome to attend our Sunday service or have quiet time during the week when the church is open.

Our major events have all been supported by the communities of Salt and Hopton. *The Rock Choir*, our *Murder Mystery* evening, cake sales and our summer fete all contributed to funding the running of the church. All these efforts enabled us to commence the renovation work on the roof and the chancel area. The hiccup of finding brown long eared bats in residence, the roof slates crumbling whilst being removed and the investigation of the leaning bellcote to ensure stability, all resulted in the two bells being taken down and not rehung. They are now in storage at Taylor Bells Foundry. Hopefully, they will be reinstated in the future.

We came in on budget partly because of the generosity of our congregation, our community and the local businesses who responded so positively to our roof appeal. (Continued on next page...)



We thank you for your support. We couldn't have done it without YOU. Part of the £50,000 we needed came from grants and we thank Salt Parish Council, The Benefactor Trust, Stafford Historic Churches, Edward Cadbury Trust, William Lasslett Trust, Congregational and General, and Garfield Weston for their contributions. The work on the church has resulted in the chancel area being made watertight and it will prevent the interior from deteriorating further. We have more to do this year.

We rounded off the year with the Carol Service and our beautiful Christmas tree and nativity scenes both inside and outside the church, installed by the Scott family. It was attended by people from both Salt and Hopton, who enjoyed the carols and readings and generously donated £160 to Stafford Baby Bank. This gift was greatly appreciated.

We look forward to the year ahead and hope that our faith, with the support from the community, will enable our church to prosper and serve you all in the months ahead.

Thanks must go to Janet Stubbs, our Church Warden, who has worked tirelessly over the last few years to enable the major repair work on Salt Church to take place, by applying for grants, completing Faculties and organising events.

Contact with the contractor suggests that this is for a new telegraph pole for a fibre optic cable to be brought into the village. The road will not be fully closed. Sadly, the temporary River Trent bridge was not put in place before Christmas as we had been led to believe it would be. I can't thank you enough! *writes Margaret.*

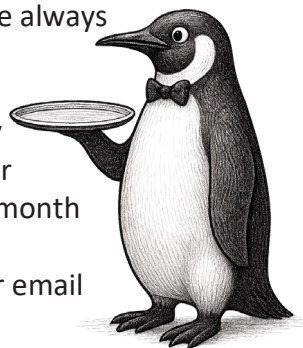

The Newly Opened Dog & Doublet 1906

Building commenced in 1905 and was licenced to open six days by order of the 5th Earl of Harrowby. The six-day licence was due to his Lordship calling in from a Sunday church service to see how the building works were progressing only to find the builders drinking alcohol in the adjacent Dog & Doublet (old Pack Horse Inn) which was still trading while the new pub was being built. His Lordship vowed never to open the pub on Sundays and it remained a six-day licence until 1990. The rent for the new pub was £50 per annum with a function room and stables. The signage, originally on the roadside, was moved back and attached to the building in the 1920's. The present date stone above the arch (1906) was added

in 1970 by request of the 6th Earl of Harrowby.
