


### Museum by Torchlight



SDNP/25/04168/HOUS Stoner Hill House, Stoner Hill Road, Froxfield, Petersfield, Hampshire, GU32 1DX Replacement of Double Garage with a Double Garage and Workshop. The application was approved on 6th January 2026 by East Hampshire District Council on behalf of South Downs National Park Authority.



I am excited to announce that 2026 marks the 150th anniversary of Froxfield church of England school. Thanks to the history notes compiled by the late Pam Goodall – a past teacher at the school - I can tell you a little of the history of this wonderful school in its lovely rural setting here in the heart of the South Downs.

'The 1870 Education Act stated that elementary schools should be established in areas where school provision from other sources was insufficient. There were three schools in the parish of Froxfield at that time. Robert Love's Charity School, which opened in 1734 and a School for Girls & Infants, which opened 1837/8 were both at Froxfield Green and there was an infant school in High Cross Lane, between More Lane and Rings Green, which was possibly a Dame School. The Trustees of Robert Love's Charity school decided to provide a new school at High Cross where children of the parish, of all ages, could be educated in the same building. Thus 'It was resolved to accept the tender by Messrs Gammon, builders of Petersfield, to build a Schoolroom and House in the Parish of Froxfield for £1,900 and that Arthur Blomfield Esq, Architect, be authorised to design the buildings.'

(It is interesting to note that among many other prestigious buildings Sir Arthur Blomfield, as he later became, also designed the Royal College of Music and Southwark Cathedral!)

The Trustees agreed that the new school should open on 3rd July 1876 under the charge of Mr H E Close, and Mrs Thomas Jarman who was engaged as the sewing mistress and infant teacher.



## **Froxfield School continued**

What an accolade to all the subsequent teachers and the children who have taught and been taught that the school has not only survived but has thrived over the past 150 years? The current headteacher Mrs Farrow and her team, the governors and the parents all agree that this anniversary is deserving of great celebration, and we are planning a number of events celebratory culminating in concert at Privett Church on Saturday 4th July - please save the date.

As Froxfield Church of England School approaches its 150th anniversary on 3rd July we have decided that as well as holding celebrations this is the perfect opportunity to create a lasting legacy for future generations and to mark this special milestone the school is raising funds to build a new Performing Arts Studio.

Froxfield School values all aspects of the arts - research shows that early access to the arts builds confidence, creativity and lifelong engagement. The school already offers music lessons in violin, guitar, keyboard, clarinet, flute and oboe and these lessons have taken place in our much-loved yurt but recently it has sprung a leak and is beyond repair - and both the children and their instruments have been getting wet!

We will be inviting the parish and wider community to help us create a new studio that will provide far better facilities in a modern, well-equipped space for music, drama and the arts, benefiting every child through curriculum learning, clubs, performances and community events. It will also strengthen links with families, the parish and neighbouring schools.

The project will cost approximately £125,000 and will be part-funded by the School. We will be seeking donations, grants and support through fundraising events.

If you would like to support this project - through a donation, attending an event or offering help - further details will be shared soon. Together, we can help provide an inspiring creative space for children for generations to come.

### **Church News**

There's not a huge break in the church year before the arrival of Lent, this year starting on Wednesday 16th February. Information on the two Lent courses being run in the Benefice can be found elsewhere in this magazine. Regular services continue as we build up to Palm Sunday on the 29th March.

Undoubtedly the main church news is the installation of the new heating system in St Peter's, High Cross – work has finally begun on upgrading the power supply and we very much hope that we will be able to install heating chandeliers during March. In the meantime, the old system may not last until then! We are fortunate that we have St. Peter's on the Green to fall back on during the work.

We have been granted an amazing Boiler Replacement Hardship Grant from the Church of England Net Zero Programme to support the proposed low-carbon heating solution. Many thanks to those who's hard work on getting the grant application in and bringing the heating system project to fruition.

We are very excited to say that the project to improve facilities at the Church is moving ahead. Reverends. Susie and Sue, the PCC and community members have been working extraordinarily hard over the last few months on church Christmas services, fundraising and organising contractors for the replacement of the heating system at St Peter's High Cross.

If you've been in the vicinity of the church, you may have noticed that some electrical work has been taking place in preparation for the installation of the new electric heating system in March. During the installation the organ will be covered to prevent dust entering the pipes/keys and causing damage. We are looking forward to welcoming you all to a warm church in at Easter!

Our focus for 2026 is the installation of a toilet and small servey area at the back of the church. Thank you to everyone for your support of our fundraising events. We look forward very much to seeing you at our next event on 21st March which is to be an auction and dinner in the village hall. If you came to our Harvest Supper, you would know to expect some good food and company – now add a splash of auction fun! SEE YOU THERE!

Reflections on Karl Jenkins' The Armed Man by David Dobson

I've said the music was a mixture of sublime and savage, but it was the words that really got to me. They came from a variety of sources, and most poignant was when we got to the immediate aftermath of war in the section called Angry Flames. This is brutal stuff, much the more so when one realises that what we were singing was a direct quotation from a Japanese man, Sankichi Tobi, as he describes what he found at Hiroshima (he survived the bombing but died of leukaemia later).

It was a relief when we moved on to see the resumption of peace – tremendously moving Agnus Dei and Benedictus, before the last rousing anthem "Better is Peace" with its quiet contemplative resolution at the end.

We stood stock still in silence for it seemed an age before Michael, our conductor, slowly lowered his hands to break the spell. Nobody I feel could sing this work and be untouched, nor feel its relevance. No wonder it is the most sung choral work in the world today.

One of the most appealing things to me about Froxfield Choir is the variety it has shown over the years, and one never knows quite what's coming next. Two years ago, we sang Duke Ellington's Sacred Concert and last year in the summer we tackled the mountain of Brahms' German Requiem, a really tough sing – never any time to sit down – but I think we sang it well, with at the end that familiar feeling of pleased exhaustion. Then in the autumn came Karl Jenkins' The Armed Man, something very different. Essentially it is an anti-war piece, composed in 1999 in reflection of 'the most war-torn and destructive century in human history' and as a message of hope that the world of the future would have more peace and fewer wars.

Now, I am writing this in January 2026, a month when we all hope for better things, but in spite of our pious wishes the world continues to rage – in the Middle East, in Ukraine, in Venezuela and Iran – and that's just for starters; and as I look back on The Armed Man last November, I can't help feeling that Karl Jenkins' Subliminal message was 'when will we ever learn?' But to the music. I could sum it up and say it is a mixture of the sublime and the savage, with moments that shock in their bleakness, and moments where one feels pure joy. We started off singing and stamping our feet to a 15th century French marching song, with the piccolos egging us on. That set the scene for war, but here came the first surprise: a muezzin, with powerful voice and snowy white vestments, sang the Muslim call to prayer, and that was tremendously moving. Next came another twist, with the familiar words of the Kyrie Eleison, and that was followed by belligerent music which we knew presaged war.
