Churchwarden's Message

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Dear friends,

As we move through February and into March, we find ourselves in an interesting moment in the Church's year. We begin in the season of Epiphany and gradually move towards Lent. It is a time of transition, both spiritually and naturally, and one that invites us to pause and take notice.

Epiphany is about light and revelation. It reminds us that God is often revealed quietly, not always in dramatic moments, but through steady presence and gentle insight. Over these weeks, the gospel readings speak of calling, growth, and people beginning to understand more fully who Jesus is and what it means to follow him. Epiphany encourages us to look again, to notice where God is at work, sometimes in ways we did not expect.

As Epiphany gives way to Lent, the focus begins to shift. Lent is often misunderstood as a sombre or joyless season, but at its heart it is about preparation. It is a time to reflect, to simplify, and to make space for God. Like a gardener pruning back in readiness for new growth, Lent invites us to prepare our hearts for what is to come.

This movement through the Church year mirrors what we see around us in the natural world. Winter does not suddenly become spring overnight. Instead, there are small signs that change is coming. A little more daylight. A hint of green where there was none before. Life stirring beneath the surface, even when the ground still feels cold and quiet.

Church life is often like that too. Much of what truly matters happens quietly. Faith grows through steady worship, familiar prayers, kind conversations, and people continuing to show up week by week. These ordinary acts of faithfulness are where God does much of his work.

As we look ahead to the coming months, the Church season reminds us that this is a time not just of waiting, but of readiness. Whether changes come quickly or slowly, Lent encourages us to be spiritually prepared, rooted, and attentive. It asks us to consider how we listen, how we pray, and how we care for one another as a community.

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Spring will come in its own time, just as Easter always follows Lent. Until then, we continue faithfully, trusting that God is at work even when we cannot yet see the full picture.

As we journey through these weeks, I am reminded of these words:

“Those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength.”
Isaiah 40:31

May this season of Epiphany and Lent be a time of gentle growth, renewed strength, and hopeful preparation for us all.

Here is the next thrilling episode of the History of our area by Jonathan Ormesher

FAITH AND VALOR: A CIVIL WAR SAGA OF WRIGHTINGTON, HESKIN & TUNLEY

Episode 6: Dawn of Peace

Wrightington & Wigan – August 1651. Two years had passed since the execution of King Charles I. England was a republic under Parliament's iron rule, but unrest still simmered. In the summer of 1651, Royalist hopes rekindled when Charles II – the late King's exiled son – marched south with a Scottish army to reclaim his throne. Lord Derby returned to Lancashire from the Isle of Man, calling on old loyalists for one final effort.

At Wrightington Hall, John Molyneux pleaded with his son. "We have lost so much, James. Must you go again to war?" his voice trembled with fear and sorrow. James gripped the hilt of his sword – the same blade he had dropped at Preston. "Father, our true King needs loyal men. I gave my word long ago," he replied softly. In truth, his heart was conflicted.

The flames of vengeance that once drove him had cooled. But duty and honor – and the memory of his murdered kin – compelled him to fight once more.

James joined the Earl of Derby's small force as it moved toward Wigan to rally support.

By late August, they faced a column of Parliamentary troops under Colonel Robert Lilburne. The two forces met on the wooded lane north of Wigan at dusk. Outnumbered and ill-equipped, the Royalists were desperate but determined. James found himself riding beside Sir Thomas Tyldesley, a gallant Cavalier officer who had survived many battles. Tyldesley gave James a grim smile as they drew their swords. "For the King – and for England," the older knight declared. James nodded, steeling himself with a final silent prayer.

The Battle of Wigan Lane erupted in a fury of pistols and sabers amid gathering twilight.

Royalist horsemen crashed into the Parliamentary flank, briefly scattering their musketeers. James stayed close to Tyldesley as they wheeled to charge again. In the melee, figures blurred in shadow and gun-smoke. James parried a thrust from a green-coated Parliamentary and countered, wounding the man who fell with a cry. But more Roundhead cavalry poured in, encircling the Royalists.

Suddenly, Sir Thomas Tyldesley lurched in his saddle with a musket ball through the chest. He toppled to the ground not far from James. "Sir Thomas!" James shouted. He spurred his horse forward, slashing wildly to reach the fallen knight. Tyldesley lay motionless on the bloodied cobbles of the lane. Shock and anger swelled in James – another noble life lost in this endless strife.

Before he could react further, a Parliamentary trooper rushed at James with a raised sword. James parried, and the two men crashed to the ground grappling. They rolled on the muddy lane, panting and desperate. James finally gained the upper hand, wrenching the sword from the soldier's grasp and pressing his blade to the man's throat. In the fading light, he saw the soldier's face clearly – no older than himself, eyes wide with terror. The young Roundhead trembled beneath the blade. "God save me... I yield!" he gasped, expecting death.

James's muscles tensed. Here was the enemy at his mercy – how easy it would be to drive the steel home, to avenge Mary, Father Brennan, and all the fallen. His hand shook as he thought of all the blood spilled on his account. The soldier squeezed his eyes shut, whispering a prayer James recognized: "...forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us..."

The familiar words of the Lord's Prayer pierced James's wrath. In his mind flashed an image of little Mary, her face innocent and peaceful, and his father's broken plea: "Do not become like them." James drew a long breath. Slowly, he lifted his sword away from the prone soldier's neck.

“Go,” he said hoarsely, pulling the man to his feet. The Parliamentarian opened his eyes in disbelief. “Get out of here. Go home.” James released him and shoved the surrendered sword back into the young man’s hands. With a choking sob of relief, the soldier stumbled backward, then turned and ran into the darkness among the trees.

Around James, the battle was ending in disaster for the Royalists. Lord Derby’s forces were shattered and in retreat. The Earl himself lay wounded not far off, being helped by a few loyal men as they fled the field. The King’s last hopes in Lancashire were collapsing.

But James felt a strange calm amid the chaos. He had spared an enemy, choosing mercy where once he would have sought vengeance. In that moment on the blood-stained lane, the war within his soul had found its truce.

With the Royalist army broken, James slipped away through the woods. Bruised and exhausted, he made his way back toward Wroughtington under cover of night. A few days later, news spread that Charles II’s outnumbered forces had been decisively defeated at the Battle of Worcester. The Civil War – at least this chapter of it – was truly over. There would be no miraculous victory for the young King in exile.

One crisp September morning, James and his father walked together up a gentle slope on their estate. Under a yew tree at the crest stood two simple wooden crosses marking Mary’s and Father Brennan’s graves. The wounds of war ran deep, but John and James knelt side by side and prayed for the souls of their departed – and for the souls of friend and foe alike.

As John prayed aloud, “...and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us,” James whispered those words with him, his heart finally understanding their weight. He asked God silently to forgive Colonel Rigby and all who had caused their family pain. Tears of release wet his cheeks – not of sorrow this time, but of healing. In forgiving, he felt the chains that had bound him fall away.

John placed a hand on his son’s shoulder. Both men rose and gazed eastward, where the morning sun was breaking over the Lancashire fields. The worst of the fighting was over, and though the nation remained under Cromwell’s Commonwealth for now, peace of a sort had returned to Wroughtington, Heskin, and Tunley. Families began rebuilding homes and lives, determined to move forward.

In the weeks that followed, James helped his father quietly restore their little chapel that had been burned. Though Catholic worship was still officially outlawed, the Molyneux family found ways to gather in faith with a few trusted neighbors. Each Sunday at dawn, James lit a candle at the chapel’s altar for Mary and all the fallen. He had discovered that true victory was not in vanquishing enemies on the battlefield, but in reclaiming his own soul from hatred.

That autumn, on a tranquil Sunday, James stood outside Heskin Hall after prayers, watching golden sunlight filter through the oak trees. The air was cool and still. His mother and father chatted quietly with neighbors, and a few children laughed as they chased each other through the fallen leaves. It was an ordinary scene of life carrying on – something precious that war had nearly stolen from them.

Though scars remained on the land and in their hearts, James felt hope take root anew. Faith, tempered by trials, had guided him through the darkness. As church bells in a distant village pealed for midday, James lifted his gaze to the clear blue sky. He breathed deeply, the air full of promise. In that peaceful moment, he understood that God’s purpose had been with him all along – in mercy given and mercy received. Despite all the loss and sorrow, he had gained something precious: a heart free to forgive and a land free from war. It was not the victory he once sought, but it was victory nonetheless – a victory of the spirit that would light the path ahead for Wroughtington, Heskin, Tunley, and all of England’s tomorrow.

Spaghetti with Mushrooms, Tomatoes and Walnuts

This recipe comes from a Cookbook called WI meals for One from the late Jean Norris who we remember as being a marvellous cook, just double up the quantities for more than one.

Ingredients

- 25 grams walnuts – coarsely chopped
- 1 tsp lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon of oil
- 55 grams dried spaghetti or 80 grams fresh spaghetti
- ½ chopped onion
- Small clove of garlic – finely chopped (optional)
- 1 tbs fresh chopped parsley
- 1 tomato quartered and sliced seasoning to taste
- 55 grams button mushrooms halved

Method

1. Dry fry the walnuts over a medium heat for 2-3 minutes.
Remove from the pan
2. Heat the oil and fry the onion and garlic for 2-3 minutes until softened but not browned
3. Add the tomatoes, mushrooms and lemon juice to the onions.
Cover and simmer gently for about 10 minutes
4. Cook the spaghetti according to the manufacturers instructions
5. Add the walnuts and parsley to the sauce and season to taste
6. Drain the spaghetti. Serve onto a plate and toss the sauce into it.
