From the Reverend Keith Johnson

Nunney Rectory

Eggs are often associated with the celebration of Easter, and this can be traced back thousands of years. What began with pagan roots was first adopted by Christians in Mesopotamia - believers would dye eggs red to symbolise the blood of Christ. Eggs also represented the empty tomb of Jesus Christ, just as the hatching of a baby chick symbolises resurrection and new life.

Spring has arrived in all its glory. Have you sat down recently and just gazed with wonder and awe at creation? The snow drops have faded, but in their place have come daffodils and all wonder of spring flowers.

Our Rectory garden is full of Spring surprises at the moment, as bursts of colour bloom, appearing in unexpected places. The same can be said of God at work in our lives. As we prepare to celebrate the glorious resurrection of Jesus, and all that means for those who put their trust in him, we are reminded that we too can share in that resurrection life, a life of abundance, modelled on the example of Jesus himself.

However, we should avoid the temptation of skipping over Good Friday. The significance of the last few hours of Christ's life in Jerusalem - his betrayal, trial, sentence of death and unimaginable execution at Calvary. As Christians, we are reminded that it is through faith in Christ that he takes our place on that cross, paying the price for all our wrongdoing, before gloriously triumphing over the grave, rising on the third day!

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, hallelujah!

Letter from the Bishop of Taunton

Grace, truth, love and courage

Guilt, shame, mercy, and forgiveness. Four words all linked with Easter, which we shall celebrate this month.

The last two of those seem to be in short supply at the moment. The ‘gods’ of social media are ready instantly to punish all offenders, now and in the future.

People often offer George Orwell’s nightmare vision of Big Brother as a way to understand our times. I’m more drawn to the image of Jeremy Bentham’s Panopticon – a building where a watchman could observe all the inhabitants at all times but without the inhabitants knowing whether or not they’re being watched – which ensured compliance. When we hear about online data harvesting it can feel as if everything you say, or do, can be recorded and held against you, ready to be brought out and used if needed.

Where’s the mercy or the forgiveness in that? Where’s the grace that understands we all make mistakes and need second chances? There’s no possibility of wiping the slate clean and beginning again.

Which is where the astounding grace and mercy we celebrate on Good Friday and Easter Day comes in.

Mark Greene of the London Institute of Contemporary Christianity highlights how the wonder of Easter speaks words of grace and hope to our unmerciful world:

All this judgement serves to highlight the majestic, counter-cultural grace of the Christian gospel. Yes, God is a God of justice, opposed to the degrading of any human on any grounds. Yes, he has seen our every furtive action, picked up every sly whisper, logged every darkling thought ... yet his mercy flows from the cross like an ocean, drenching the universe. As today’s media Pharisees rage, God’s offer is ‘mercy, mercy, mercy’ to all who would repent and receive him. And our watchwords: grace, truth, love, and courage.

May this encourage us all as we continue through Lent, experience Holy Week, and finally reach the joy of Easter.

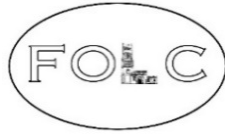
Our Mothering Sunday service was a joyful one, with a fun new song, a quiz and chocolate prizes!

Across our Diocese of Bath and Wells, churches are preparing to celebrate Easter, this most important day of our Christian calendar. Throughout Holy Week and on Easter Sunday there will be sunrise services and church services, community meals and coffee mornings with hot cross buns, and so much more.

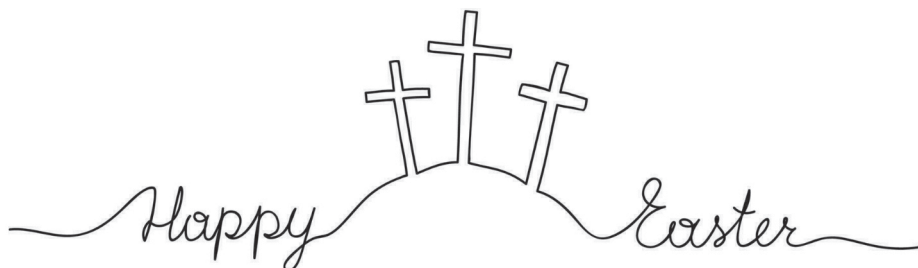
During Holy Week, Bishop Michael will be witnessing many of these activities as he undertakes a pilgrimage walk through Exmoor and the Quantocks, calling in churches along the way.

He says, “During this year of 2026, as a diocese together, we are having an especial focus on prayer. Pilgrimage is one of the most ancient ways that Christians have prayed, come closer to God and learned how better to walk with the Lord throughout their lives. I'm so excited that during Holy Week I'll be making this pilgrimage, meeting members of our churches, praying with them, and experiencing God in the beauty of His creation that's all around us. It's going to be an inspiring journey that I look forward to sharing with many different people.”

One of the places that Bishop Michael will be visiting is Nether Stowey, where a large cross is placed on the mount there at the start of Holy Week. On Good Friday, Bishop Michael will be joining the Walk of Witness down from the mount, into the village and on to the church where many hot cross buns will be consumed.

The Revd Eleanor King, Rector of the Quantock Villages Benefice said, “This walk of witness is one of the three big outdoor services that we have during the year. It is a special occasion when we are joined by members of the community, as well as our Christian brothers and sisters from other local churches.”

East Mendip Gardening Club

April's here and spring has sprung at last! As the weather warms up and early flowers start to bloom, all of a sudden there's a load of jobs to do outside.

Lift and divide established border perennial plants now, like Hostas, to improve vigour and create new plants for your garden.

Pinch out the tips of fuchsia plants and sweet pea plant shoots, to encourage bushy growth this summer. For more information about growing fuchsias, check out our fuchsia hub page.

Divide primroses once they have finished flowering.

Prune your penstemons now — cut back all the old shoots to the base, provided there is new growth at the bottom of the plant. If there are no new shoots at the base, cut just above the lowest set of leaves.

Prune Forsythia as soon as they have finished flowering, cutting back to strong, young shoots.

Sow Scabious seed undercover now. They'll attract bees and butterflies to your garden and will also make great cut flowers.

Sow scented bedding plants, such as dianthus and osteospermum, for beds & borders full of delicious fragrance over summer.

Direct sow wildflower seed mixtures — they're great for bees and butterflies, and they add wonderful colour too.

Continue to plant herbaceous perennial & biennial plants like

foxgloves and osteospermum.

Plant forced flower bulbs (such as hyacinths and daffodils) into borders, once they've finished flowering.

Plant or pot on any hardwood cuttings taken last year.

Add any necessary supports to plants now for them to grow up through. Adding supports later is more difficult and can damage the plants.

Sow aubergine seeds under glass now for growing in the greenhouse or transplanting outdoors later on.

Sow basil seeds in warmth to protect them from April frosts. Sow marrow, pumpkin, squash and courgette seeds under cover.

Sow cucumbers and gherkins towards the end of the month, sow the seeds in individual pots or modules in the greenhouse.

Start kale seeds now under glass, or directly into seedbeds outdoors.

Sow perennial herbs - such as rosemary, sage, thyme and lemon balm - in the greenhouse.

Sow sweet pepper seeds in the greenhouse for bountiful summer crops.

Sow pea and bean seeds directly into the ground, or start them off in modules if mice are a problem.

Stagger sowings over several weeks, allowing about 20 plants per person, for a longer harvest period.

Plant out onion, shallot & garlic sets for crops this summer.

Sow radish seeds directly into the soil for your first salad of the season.

Start off sweetcorn seeds in modules, for planting out after all risk of frost has passed.

Try growing watercress seeds in containers on the patio, making sure the container is sitting in 2-3 inches of water at all times.

Plant out strawberry plants, making sure you enrich the soil first with plenty of well-rotted manure. Place cloches over your strawberry plants for earlier crops.

Continue to plant raspberry and blackberry canes before the hotter weather arrives.

Dig a 5-cm (or more) layer of compost, well-rotted manure or green waste into beds.

Cover prepared soil with sheets of black plastic to keep it drier and warmer in preparation for planting.

Mulch fruit trees with well-rotted manure or garden compost, taking care not to mound mulch up around the trunk.

Top-dress patio fruit-trees with fresh compost and a slow-release fertiliser.

Feed raspberry canes, fruit bushes and fruit trees to encourage good crops this season. Apply a slow-release fertiliser around their base.

Check compost bins to see if you have any compost that's ready to use.

Top dress containers with fresh compost. If your containers are already full, replace the top 5 cm of old compost with fresh stuff.

Give your houseplants some TLC — the warmer weather and longer light hours will encourage them to grow and they may require more water.

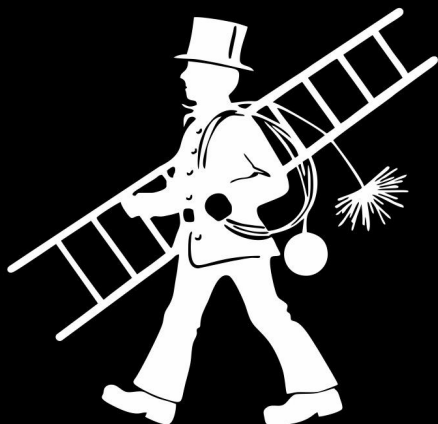
