

Dear Friends



We had a fantastic All Aboard last month which took away the dreariness of Winter when our three-year-old Keir “joined the gang” and was Baptised during the service. He had decided this is what he wanted to do after hearing all about Jesus being Baptised. The service was great fun as we got to learn about how God created the world and the universe and how he loves each and everyone of us because He created us. We even had a massive chocolate cake decorated with all the planets and stars afterwards to celebrate. Delicious!

And so, when March comes around it means that winter is finally leaving us, (and oh aren't we glad about that! With the amount of rain we have had, I'm sure that I need to invest in a boat!) and spring is on its way. I love to see newly sprouted daffodils and crocuses which the Churchyard is full of this year as well as the spring lambs in the fields. It reminds me that creation is renewing and bringing with it the promise of new life and hopefully, a warm summer.

This month we start the liturgical season of Lent when churches around the world begin to prepare for Easter. Lent is regarded as a penitential season that builds up to the events of Holy Week culminating in the crucifixion on Good Friday.

Once all the pancakes have been eaten on a particular Tuesday evening Lent begins with Ash Wednesday with the Imposition of Ashes when worshippers receive a mark of the cross on their foreheads with words spoken over them:

# Annual Parish Meetings

All Parishes in the Church of England are obliged to hold annual Parish meetings before the end of May. This year it is planned to hold the meetings at the end of April but, at the time of writing, the date cannot be confirmed. Although it can appear that there is one continuous meeting, in fact there are two separate meetings which have specific agendas and different voting criteria for attendees:

- Annual Meeting of Parishioners [APM]
- Annual Parochial Church Meeting [APCM]
- 

**APM**                The APM has one item of business, to elect the Churchwardens; all members of the Church Electoral Roll and all those resident in the Parish who are on the Civil Electoral Roll may attend and vote. Parishes are supposed to have two Churchwardens, chosen annually. At present, St Paul's has one Warden, who is allowed to stand for re-election. If you feel that you could offer your service to St Paul's as a Warden, please contact the Vicar to discuss the role.

**APCM**                The APCM has several essential items of business as listed below. It is customary at St Paul's for any members of the Congregation to attend; however, only members of the Church Electoral Roll may vote.

- Presentation of a written report on the proceedings of the Parochial Church Council [PCC] and the Parish generally, for the year to 31 December 2025. At St Paul's this is part of the 'Trustees Report', which will be available to view in good time prior to the APCM.
- Presentation of financial statements of the PCC for the year to 31 December 2025. At St Paul's this is part of the 'Trustees Report'.

- Presentation of the Church Electoral Roll     The Roll was completely revised for 2025, only changes since last year will be reported. If you are aware of anyone who wishes to be added to the Roll, please encourage them to contact the PCC Secretary.
- A report on the fabric, goods and ornaments of the Church. At St Paul's this is usually given verbally by the Vicar or a PCC member.
- Election of PCC members. A third of the PCC membership has to retire each year, although retiring members can stand for re-election. If you feel that you could offer your service to St Paul's as a PCC member, please contact the Vicar to discuss the situation.
- Election of Deanery Synod Members. St Paul's is part of the Kirkham Deanery and the Synod is a committee that considers the affairs of the Deanery as a whole. Elections to the Deanery Synod take place every 3 years, 2026 being an election year. If you feel that you could offer your service to St Paul's as a Synod member, please contact the Vicar to discuss the role.
- Other Business. It is customary at St Paul's to invite general discussion at the completion of formal business; however, if there are specific issues or questions it would be helpful if they were known in advance, in order to prepare suitable answers / information.

- Renewal of the list of Sidespeople usually coincides with the APCM cycle. Sidespeople, or Welcomers as they are more often now known, are essential to the smooth running of our services. It's not just about handing out hymn books; our Welcomers are the first faces that people see on entering the Church and have the vital task of making members of the congregation, and especially new visitors, feel welcome and comfortable in our Church. If you feel you could offer your service to St Paul's as a Welcomer, please contact the Vicar or Paul Barfoot to discuss the role.

A special mention goes to Grace and her sermon at an “All Aboard” service in which she talked about Jesus's baptism.

# BISHOP PHILIP'S LENT COURSE FOR THE BENEFICE

The Lent course will be running for 5 weeks on Mondays 6.45pm St Paul's Church.

23rd February, 2nd March, 9th March, 16th March, 23rd March.

Some of you may be using the Lent Devotional, God's Story - Your Story, which will be available in both printed format, available in both churches and on the Diocesan Fruitful App.

This course complements these by taking key moments in the book of Acts to help us know Jesus, while also celebrating our Diocesan centenary focus, 'All for Jesus'

Bishop Philip's new 'Knowing Jesus' course has five sessions. The series will help us to know *about* Jesus *as we* seek to understand more about who he is, what he has come to do and how he sets us free. It will also help us to *know* Jesus as we explore what it means to be in a deeper relationship with him and to offer our whole lives to him.

The sessions are:

- The Ascended Jesus
- The Sending Jesus
- The Suffering Jesus
- The Servant Jesus
- The Triumphant Jesus

They all build on each other but can be done as stand-alone sessions if you can only make it to one or two. If you are following this course as part of our Lent group meeting together there will be a chance for conversation and discussion. And most importantly, in each session, we will do some praying.

For each session there will be:

- Opening time of prayer
- Listening to the Scriptures
- Video talk
- Discussion
- Prayer liturgy
- Closing Diocesan Centenary Prayer

If you can't make it in person, then why not follow it on the Fruitful app which is available to download from Apple's App Store and Google Play and provides support to people of all backgrounds and ages in our Diocese to grow in confidence in their faith through this new digital space.

# CONFIRMATION 2026


The confirmation service for the benefice of Holy Trinity and St Paul's will take place on **Sunday June 7<sup>th</sup> 2026 at 4pm at St Paul's Warton** with **Bishop Joe**

Confirmation marks the point in the Christian journey at which people affirm for themselves the faith into which they have been baptised and their intention to live a life of committed discipleship. At baptism your parents and godparents made promises on your behalf; at confirmation you make these promises for yourself. During the confirmation service the bishop will pray for you and lay hands on your head, and you will receive the bread and wine during the Eucharist. It is open to anyone in year 6 and above, there's no upper age limit! You need to be baptised before you're confirmed, if you haven't been, don't worry, speak to me as it's not a problem.

I would encourage those who want to be confirmed to attend church regularly as part of their preparation.

# Churchyard Memorial Safety Update

Late last year the PCC commissioned a full churchyard inspection to ensure the safety of all who visit and worship here. The inspection was carried out by Brent Stevenson of Stevensons Memorials, a qualified memorial safety inspector with extensive experience in both churchyards and cemeteries.

During the inspection, around 100 memorials were identified as requiring some level of remedial work. In some cases, action was needed immediately, while others can safely be addressed further down the line. This is not unusual for a historic churchyard, where many memorials are decades and in some cases centuries old.

We were fortunate to be able to engage Jason, a specialist memorial contractor who works in churchyards across Lancashire and including many council-run cemeteries. Jason has already completed remedial work on 17 of the older and larger memorials. Some of these monuments were originally standing on stone “steps”, which over time can cause instability and present a safety risk. The steps have now been removed, the memorials reduced in height, and the stones sunk securely into the ground. This work was carried out carefully using a small crane and digger to minimise disturbance.

We also remember with gratitude Edward Frowde and the Revd R. Halstead, both of whom are buried in our churchyard. As part of our ongoing care for the churchyard, their memorials are among those that have been repaired. The Frowde family left a gift to the church earlier in its history, and in caring for the churchyard we honour both that generosity and the lasting contribution they made to the life of the church.

In addition to the larger memorials, six families have contacted us regarding smaller “lawn” headstones, and they are engaging a stone mason to repair them.

Memorials belong to the families of those buried and are inherited by descendants, meaning the legal responsibility for their upkeep rests with the family. However, while the churchyard remains open for burials, the PCC has a duty to ensure the overall health and safety of the churchyard for everyone who uses it.

As a result of this year's work, around a quarter of the memorials requiring attention will have had action taken during 2025. The remaining memorials will be reviewed and addressed on a rolling programme, as and when church finances allow.

We thank everyone for their understanding and support as we continue to care for our churchyard, a place of remembrance, heritage and peace, ensuring it remains safe and welcoming for future generations.

Adopting the persona of Cornelia's colleague, Emily, and dressed in the fashion of her times, Judith took us through the life and extraordinary circumstances of this redoubtable lady who rocked Victorian society to its core in a series of notorious court cases. American by birth, the Connellys came to Europe to follow separate vocations in the Catholic church, which were to wreck their earlier happy marriage and separate Cornelia from her children. Faithful to her religious vows, she nevertheless became a pioneer in the field of female education, founding the Society of the Holy Child Jesus which is currently active in 14 countries and proclaimed "Venerable" by the Catholic Church in 1992 (a precursor to beatification).

Following the talk, members enjoyed the usual refreshments with heart-shaped biscuits baked by Lin as a nod to February's main event: Valentine's Day.

We all enjoyed Pauline's quiz and the monthly competition both of which had a wedding theme.

Finally, Gwen was asked to read her entry for the LFWI 2026 Writing Competition, which took the form of a letter to a friend from someone who had just attended their first W.I. meeting back in the pioneering days of 1915. Fingers were crossed collectively, but the result will not be announced until the ACM in April.

Meanwhile our thoughts turn towards Spring with plans for a trip to see the Lytham Hall snowdrop extravaganza on Thursday 19<sup>th</sup>. And staying with the floral theme, we'll look forward to our next meeting on March 10<sup>th</sup> when florist Michelle will be talking about her workshops.
