## Rachel writes . . .

I noticed on Facebook that three priests I know who live further south in England had used their time off after Easter to take holidays in the Peak District. Of course, there are many parts of the UK that have spectacular countryside and lots of history, so our corner of the country is not unique in that aspect, but I often remark to people that we are very blessed to live in Derbyshire.

One of the customs that still exists in Derbyshire is Well Dressing. An Internet search told me that Well Dressing has a long history that predates its Christian connection, possibly beginning as a Roman or Celtic offering to ensure clean and reliable water, but it noted that by the nineteenth century Well Dressing was the tradition we still have today, with wells and other sources of water being decorated with elaborate mosaics with Christian themes using flower petals, moss and other natural materials. Apparently the birthplace of the modern tradition is Tissington, which begins its Well Dressings on Ascension Day each year.

Ascension Day is one of those days in the Church's calendar that might pass unnoticed by a lot of people because it is always on a Thursday, forty days after Easter Day, and ten days before the great feast of Pentecost, when we remember how Jesus' disciples received the Holy Spirit and were empowered to start spreading the Gospel.

When services are held to mark Ascension Day, they are usually outside at sunrise. By the middle of May the sunrise is very early - around 5am. It has been some years since a sunrise service has been held in our parishes (as far as I know), but I try to go to one of our Church schools and have an outdoor service - although it's usually at 9am rather than 5am!

When I was at theological college in West Yorkshire, there was a tradition for the 'College Child' (the youngest student) to get up before sunrise and run around the college banging on people's doors and shouting (from Psalm 47):

*God has gone up with a shout, The LORD with the sound of a trumpet!*

This emphasis on marking the day at sunrise is not going to appeal to everyone - and the banging and shouting at college didn't endear the College Child to the rest of us! We were somewhat mollified by the promise of a cooked breakfast after Morning Prayer though - a treat reserved for feast days. We were even allowed to talk to each other - on regular days we had to eat our breakfast in silence.

As I already noted, Ascension Day is easy to miss because it falls on a weekday, but should you remember to mark the day, I encourage you to stop and look up at the sky, as the disciples did, and give thanks for Jesus' ministry on earth.

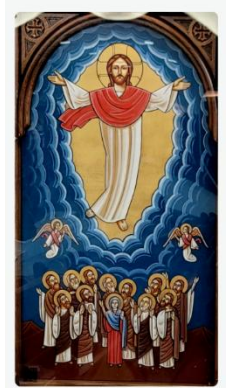
## **CHARITABLE COLLECTIONS**

# Principal Feasts in May

## **Ascension Day**

After his Resurrection, Jesus appeared to his disciples and others a number of times. Ascension Day is the day Jesus finished his work on earth and said farewell to his disciples. He didn't leave them alone though - Jesus had promised his followers that, although they would not see him after his Ascension, they would soon receive the Holy Spirit to guide and inspire them. This happened at Pentecost, which we read about in the book of Acts. This year Ascension Day is on **May 14th**.



## **Pentecost**

The Day of Pentecost marks fifty days since Easter Day and brings the Easter season to an end. It is a major feast of the Church's year - second only to Easter, and is sometimes called the birthday of the Church. At Pentecost we remember how the Holy Spirit was given to the disciples after Jesus' Ascension, empowering them to begin the work of making disciples of all nations. In chapter 2 of Acts we read how the crowds gathered in Jerusalem were able to hear the disciples preaching in their own language, even though they were from many different nationalities and spoke numerous different languages.

The colour most often associated with Pentecost is red, representing the tongues of fire scripture describes as appearing above the heads of the disciples as a sign that they had received the Holy Spirit. Some people like to wear something red to church at Pentecost. With its focus on the Holy Spirit being poured out on believers, Pentecost is one of the most popular days for baptisms and confirmations in the Church's year. Pentecost was also referred to as Whit Sunday though that is not heard so much now.

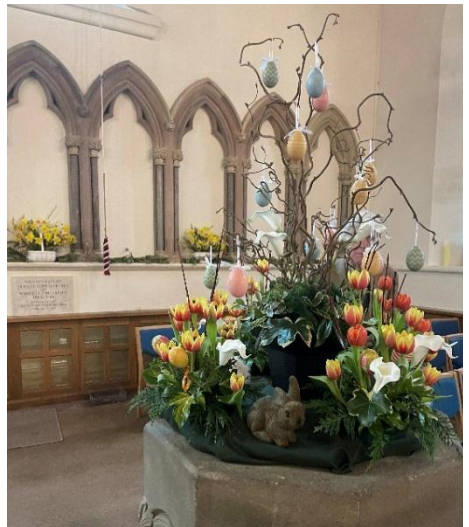
Although the priest or bishop may seem to be the one doing things in services (Communion, Baptism, Confirmation etc.) what we say in liturgy makes it clear that it is the Holy Spirit who blesses the bread and wine, who baptises, confirms and ordains, not human beings. This year Pentecost is on **May 24th**.

**A big thank you goes to all who helped with the Easter floral decorations at St John's. The church looked truly wonderful.**

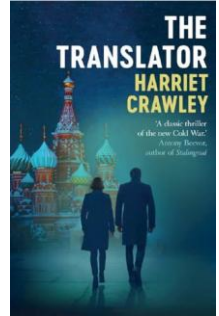


# BOOK REVIEW

## THE TRANSLATOR

This month I am reviewing *The Translator* by Harriet Crawley. This is a thriller set in Russia by Harriet Crawley who worked as a journalist in Russia for twenty years. It is about a devastating plot to sabotage undersea communication cables linking the United States and the United Kingdom. The plot threatens the whole of the internet and would bring the Western world to its knees.

Clive Franklin, a Russian language expert in the Foreign Office, is summoned unexpectedly to Moscow to act as translator for the British Prime Minister. His life is upended when he discovers that his former lover, Mariana Volina, is the interpreter to the Russian President. Together they will try to stop the attack that could paralyse communications and collapse the Western economy.

This has an eerie closeness to what is happening in parts of the world today. It is a very readable book with a lot of characters although some of them are quite one dimensional. It is very plot driven and not much background.

It was the Sunday Times Best Thriller of 2023.

## CHURCHYARD WORKING. PARTY

### Dates for your diary:

**Saturday 9th May : Saturday 13th June**

It was raining lightly when I walked Topsy (the dog) first thing but had stopped come the 10.00 a.m. working party start time, 'though it was still decidedly chilly. However, even before the sun made an appearance, we were all thoroughly warmed up and even feeling rather over dressed for the occasion.

The grass has had its first cut of the season and this has made a huge difference to the overall appearance of the churchyard, especially where the daffodils and primroses have been carefully mowed around. It's a difficult task mowing around graves and avoiding flowers and other hazards and we thank Martin for the work he does in this respect. Many thanks too, to the person who successfully reinflated the wheelbarrow tyre. I can pump it up but invariably manage to let all the air out trying to remove the pump!

The turnout this month enabled us to work as two teams, one in the Remembrance Garden, where things looks much better for having been weeded and swept.



There was time to do a bit of cutting back where we were certain no birds were nesting and with care, there's still plenty to do in this area. It was here that one of our robins cheerfully kept us going in the very bold way they have. He/She was appreciative of worms and insects exposed for the taking.



The other team - well, I'll leave you to work out the area chosen for the start of their rejuvenation project. Please see the photos for a clue. The casual observer might not think that much has been done but clearance from the area started has doubled the size of the bonfire and filled our garden wheelie bin (after poo bags, a plastic bag and plastic dish with that foam stuff you put flowers in had been removed and put elsewhere. *Please use the correct bins*).

This project involves thinning out, removing dead stuff and branches which have bent down and rooted themselves and taking out unwanted thugs like sycamore, ash and elderflower where they have self seeded inappropriately. Eventually the height will be reduced as well, but that's a job for later in the year. All this will provide more light and air to what should be growing and will make it easier to assess whether/how much more needs clearing. It has also made a start in revealing some rather camouflaged headstones.



Whilst working we saw a number of cock and hen pheasants. The latter were, I think, starting to nest build, perhaps even laying, although it's still quite early in the season. We gave them a wide berth. (I have seen one pheasant nest this year, unfortunately with three eggs removed and eaten.) I didn't see the nuthatch this time but heard a nearby wren, among other things. Whilst I'm on about birds....have you seen any swallows yet? I heard and saw my first on April 3rd.

I must stop rambling on!

So - a big thank you to all those who were able to be a part of the group today. More good work achieved and plenty still left for next time. Thank you for eating most of the sandwiches!

Finally, it was really good to be able to welcome a couple of local youngsters (year 10, from Ecclesbourne School) into church for refreshments.

## **Meeting the first Wednesday of each month @ 7.00pm**

Our vice-president Elaine Hobson introduced our speaker Gavin Fowkes a member of the police service with thirty years of service.

When Gavin first became a trainee in the police force he said it came as a shock the intensity of training to be fit - running marathons, marching, exercises in all weathers sometimes in full uniform. For this period of training they lived in barrack-like conditions and didn't see their families.

Once training was completed they were issued with their full uniform plus truncheon, whistle, note-pad and pen which is all they were sent out 'on the beat' alongside a trained officer. After one week, they were on their own. Gavin was stationed in a difficult area 'The Meadows' in Nottingham. Gaining knowledge of the area quickly by talking to shopkeepers, local inhabitants, visiting schools and generally building up a 'picture' of 'the beat'. Of course moments of confrontation and difficulties with some groups was inevitable - the use of the truncheon was only to be used in defence and then only to the upper arm or thigh. Ever present was the need to make notes etc. All notes handwritten ready for possible use in court cases. As time progressed Gavin became a detective interviewing offenders in cells and elsewhere, then presenting his findings in court. Presenting facts changed quickly from note-book to computers, film and body worn cameras. When retirement came for Gavin the police force had changed radically from pen & paper to computers and mobile phones but bringing to a conclusion a very interesting and rewarding career.

We closed the evening by our vice-president by thanking Gavin for such an interesting talk and all enjoying home-baked cakes and tea.

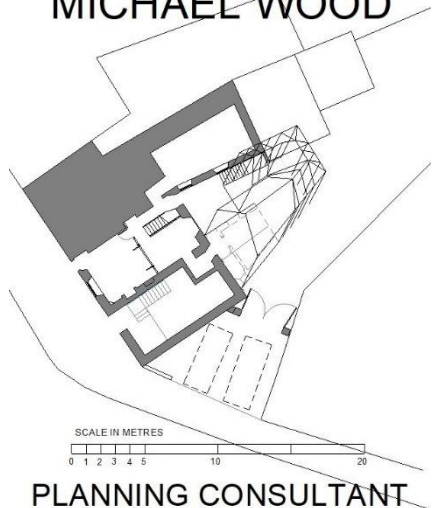

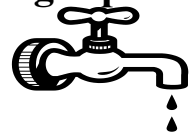

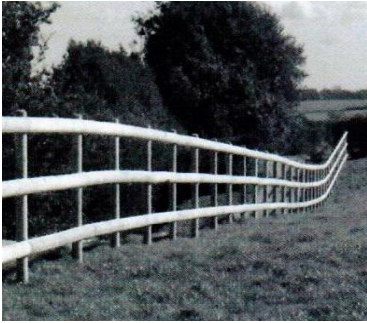
