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Annual Report for the Year ended 31 December 2025

Church Council Report

As I look back at 2025, I am struck by the variety of things that we have done as a church, and by all that God has been doing in us. There is lots to be encouraged by! This year we had five weddings (and one wedding blessing) and we baptised seven children. We had eight funerals in church and said goodbye to some much loved members of our community. In both the joys and the sorrows, God has been with us.

At the beginning of the year, I organised an away day for the PCC where we talked about the story of St Giles so far and where we hope our church will go in the future. Around this time our diocese invited churches to take the opportunity to reflect on their culture, considering how our churches might become places which are more safe and more welcoming. At St Giles there were some very useful responses to the 'Exploring Church' culture survey and we had an opportunity to discuss some of that at our morning with a member of the Diocesan Safeguarding Team just before Easter. Having spent some time looking back, we then, at our mission planning morning on the 7th of June, shifted focus to the future of St Giles church. We were joined by the Rev'd Kate Lomax, Church Growth Officer, who helped to host the morning with me. We thought about our: vision, values and what our priorities should be in relation to mission. Three things came through very strongly in our discussion: reaching families and children; growing in our discipleship and sharing our faith in the community. After this event, the Mission Planning Team was formed to develop and draft the Mission Action Plan in concert with the PCC. This team is also given tasks to do in relation to mission by the PCC, with whom it works closely.

Other significant events in the first half of the year included a joyful celebration on Easter day, where we had an all age eucharist with a baptism. This followed our Lent Course, led very well by Catherine Jupp and Frances Maddex which focussed on different ways of meeting God in prayer. At our APCM we thanked Ian MacFarlane and for all of his work as Treasurer and Susan Boardman for examining our accounts and supporting Ian in his role over the years.

The summer began with the School Leavers' Service, where we presented 55 Year Six children with a Bible, generously sponsored by members of the church, and we prayed for them, as they moved on to the next phase of their lives. I reminded them that St Giles continues to be their church after they leave school and that they are welcome back any time. Village Day was another great success thanks to the hard work of many members of our congregation. We welcomed lots of people into our church, including our MP Kevin Bonavia, who, with Team Rector, David Munchin and I, enjoyed a tour of the tower from Chris Coxell.

The beginning of the school term in September marked the start of a new initiative in school. The Alban Way is a program provided by the diocese aimed at children in Year Six. The diocesan website says:

'The Alban Way schools programme is delivered in partnership between local parish churches, schools and the Diocese of St Albans. The year-long programme is designed to support pupils in their personal, spiritual, and emotional development as they prepare for the transition from primary to secondary school by giving them the tools to navigate change with faith, confidence and reflection'.

In practice, this means going into school for two blocks of four sessions in Autumn and Spring term with Rachel Drury, the Alban Way Lead for our diocese. In these sessions we help the children to engage with ideas about prayer and spirituality in a way which is accessible and inclusive for all of them. In 2026 I look forward to the second block of sessions with the children before we invite them to spend the day at St Giles towards the

end of the school year. This is a great thing to do in itself, but it is also a way of engaging with our priority at St Giles of reaching children and young people in our parish.

In tandem with this, and in response to the strong feeling that we'd like to do more as a church to reach children and young people, I took part in the Launchpad course also provided by the diocese. Launchpad is for church leaders who want to develop their work with children and young people, and gives lots of practical ideas (informed by useful research undertaken by the charity Youthscape), as well as space to reflect on your context and ask God how he is calling us to love and serve young people. The course was five weeks long and gave me lots of ideas which I am looking forward to exploring more with the PCC and congregation in the new year.

The latter part of the year is always busy, with Harvest, Remembrance Sunday, All Saints and All Souls coming in quick succession. All of these were well attended, and it was particularly good to welcome our uniformed groups into church and to see children leading the prayers at Remembrance. Our services over Advent and Christmas went very well and it was a joy to welcome lots of people into our church. Looking forward to the coming year, I am excited to see how God will continue to reveal his purposes to us, to lead us deeper into his love and help us show that love to the community around us.

Church Wardens' Report for Year ended December 2025

2025 was another busy year for the churchwardens. A significant amount of time was taken up with fabric and general maintenance matters, some of which are covered in the report of the Fabric Committee.

It is useful to note that in terms of our statutory obligations, the annual fire extinguisher, PAT testing and servicing of the heating system was undertaken and the PCC approved the fire risk assessment. The Leaping Board was also finally restored.

We were formally sworn in, in June 2025 at the Archdeacon's Visitation Service. We have completed our mandatory safeguarding training and attended several Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) led training sessions on maintenance matters. We also met with the Rural Dean who carried out the annual inspection of St Giles. The PCC held an awayday and this was followed by a cultural awareness session for the whole congregation. Thoughts from these have been taken forward by our Mission Planning Team.

We continue to meet regularly with Christie and attend PCC team meetings. Following the retirement of Ian, our longstanding Treasurer. We were very pleased to announce the appointment of a new Treasurer.

January saw the launch of our Tots & Tinies group, which after a cold start, is now thriving. This was followed in February by our first Lunch Together. This is regularly attended by between 15 and 20 people and is a welcome new addition to our Café church and Giles

Coffee Shop offerings. We also started a new weekly prayer group, a wonderful new addition to St Giles.

Despite the reduction of people on the electoral role, the year has seen a welcome increase in attendance at all our services. Café church is now regularly our largest service with over 50 people of all ages in attendance. Attendance, particularly from people who are not regular attendees was also up at our Christmas services.

There was an increase in the number of baptisms and weddings. The school and pre-school also hold regular services in the church.

It was lovely to welcome so many people into church on a very wet village day in July. We were not only able to accommodate all we had planned, indoors, but were also joined by the Friends and the History Society. Despite the weather the teddy zip wire went ahead, with the local MP climbing the tower to launch the teddies.

September saw participation in the annual 'Bike n Hike', for which a significant amount was raised to support St Giles.

September also saw the launch of our review of giving campaign, with the congregation being asked to review their current giving (monetary and otherwise) in support of the day to day running of St Giles.

The highlight in September however, was the licensing of Christie as Vicar in charge at St Giles and the focus of Bishop Jane's address was the importance of prayer.

We continue to host the Codicote Pre-School in our Parish Centre. Following discussions, their contract was renewed for a further year. There were thoughts about expansion on our premises, but this has not been progressed. We were pleased to be able to enable them to offer sessions during the school holidays for the first time.

Proceedings of the Parochial Church Council

The PCC met six times during 2025, chaired by Christie Gilfeather, who was Curate-in-Charge until September, when she was licensed as Team Vicar in a joyful service in St Giles, led by Bishop Jane.

The PCC teams and Standing Committee met between the main meetings to carry forward the business of the PCC. Each team leader provided regular updates to the full PCC. The PCC also received reports from Deanery Synod and The Welwyn Team Council following their respective meetings. A code of conduct for PCC members was agreed in March.

Mission became a regular item on the agenda in 2025, with an opportunity for more in-depth consideration of youth and children's work, mission charity partners and the mission action planning process. A Mission Planning Team was created in June to work with the PCC in writing a Mission Action Plan for St Giles.

The Annual Meeting of Parishioners and APCM was held in May 2025, and was an opportunity to thank our longstanding Treasurer Ian Macfarlane for his work over many years. Sue Grant and Bruce Lendrum were re-elected Churchwardens and we welcomed new members of the congregation to the PCC. Officers and teams were appointed at the July meeting.

During the autumn, the PCC planned and held a successful giving campaign, asking people to consider their individual level of giving and also to make more use of the Parish Giving Scheme. A small group was set up to investigate and plan an overhaul of the church audio visual systems, work which will continue into 2026.

Fabric Report

Bruce Lendrum became the Fabric Team Leader in May 2025, taking over from David Stott.

Work to repair the floor in the choir stalls and the replacement of the floor to the rear of the sound desk was completed in 2025. Working parties, to tidy the church and churchyard, were held in April and November and were a great success. A replacement of the grave marker for John Gootheridge, known as a 'leaping board', was installed in the churchyard. Gutters and cesspits continued to be emptied.

An Environmental Assessment was commissioned. Heating engineers carried out an inspection of the boilers. Boiler one remains functional, boiler two was repaired, but boiler three is beyond repair. A cover for the entrance to the boiler house and the installation of a handrail on the steps has improved accessibility. As recommended by the Church Wardens, the heating has been on continuously throughout the year, at a low heat, to assist in the drying of the church. The engineers commented that the boiler house was the driest they had seen it.

The sheep were moved to new areas around the churchyard due the long dry summer and James Howe and family were thanked for their work.

Meetings about the sound and audio-visual system and interior decoration of the church will take place in 2026 and continuation of Quinquennial inspection requirements.

Safeguarding

Safeguarding is a standing item on the agenda at every PCC meeting.

During 2025, five Safeguarding concerns were reported and referred through the appropriate channels. The Parish Safeguarding Officer (PSO) continues to complete any necessary DBS checks for the Parish of St. Giles Codicote. The PCC is fully compliant with DBS checks.

The St. Giles safeguarding e-mail address is: Safeguarding@stgiles-church.org.uk.

During the earlier part of 2025, the focus for the PSO was to support Christie to implement the 'Exploring Church' culture survey to the PCC and then to the wider congregation. The results were shared and discussed at a meeting in April, facilitated by Christie and Jos Perris from the Diocese's Safeguarding Team. The session led to meaningful discussions and raised people's awareness of their own responsibility regarding promoting and ensuring a safe church.

Compliance with safeguarding training within the PCC is good. All members have completed their training and the PSO, Reader, and Incumbent completed their Leadership Training.

The Welwyn Team 2025

The Team Council met on three occasions in 2025: 19th February, 17th June, and 21st October.

The Team Council consists of: the Team Rector; five representatives of the Ministry Team and two lay representatives from each church. Team Council meetings are a useful opportunity to learn about what is happening in other team churches, as well as to encourage each other and have a space for fellowship between the different congregations.

The more specific purposes and tasks of the Team Council are laid out in its constitution.

Matters discussed in these meeting included:

- Special events in the churches
- Seasonal services
- Safeguarding
- Team events and activities (e.g. Summer Evensongs)

Pattern of Prayer in the Welwyn Team:

Each day members of the Clergy Team and members of the congregations gather at one of the team churches to say Morning or Evening Prayer. This is a good opportunity to worship

together and pray for the work of all of our churches. Anyone is welcome to attend these services, regardless of which church you belong to. The pattern is as follows:

- Monday: 5pm Evening Prayer at St Peter's Tewin
- Tuesday: 8:30am Morning Prayer at St Giles Codicote
- Wednesday: 8am Bible study, 9am Morning Prayer and 9:30am Eucharist at St Mary's Welwyn
- Thursday: 5pm Evening Prayer at All Saints Datchworth
- Friday: 8:30am Morning Prayer at St Michael's Woolmer Green
- Saturday: 9am Parish Prayers at St Mary's Welwyn

Welwyn Hatfield Deanery Synod 2025

St Giles, Codicote is a member of the Welwyn Hatfield Deanery. The Welwyn Hatfield Deanery Synod met three times in 2025: March, June and October. Each meeting included worship, fellowship, and discussion of issues affecting parishes across the deanery.

- Guest speakers during the year included:
 - *Single Friendly Churches*, encouraging greater awareness of how welcoming churches are to single people.
 - A talk on mission in the early church, highlighting the role of families and women.
 - A presentation from *Resolve*, focusing on their work and ways churches can engage in fundraising and community support.
- Ministry and pastoral updates were shared, including:
 - Clergy appointments, departures, ordinations and anniversaries.
 - Support for churches during vacancies and maternity leave.
 - Updates from the Deanery Pastoral Committee.
- Deanery and diocesan initiatives discussed included:
 - Development of a Deanery Sunday.
 - The diocesan focus on Growing Younger and More Diverse.
 - Ongoing work of the Alban Way Project for 16–35 year olds.
- Diocesan and national church matters included:
 - Progress in the process to appoint a new Bishop of St Albans.
 - Discussion of Parish Share and financial pressures on parishes.
 - Updates from General Synod, including safeguarding discussions.
- Safeguarding remains a priority:
 - Parishes were reminded to keep safeguarding on PCC agendas.
 - Attention was drawn to safer recruitment guidance and good data protection practice.
- Deanery Synod continues to offer a valuable way for parishes to share information, support one another, and engage with wider diocesan life.

Administration and Communication

The PCC continued to buy administration services from The Welwyn Team in 2025, with the team administrator, Tina Hassan working three hours per week for us. All other admin tasks were carried out by Christie, the Wardens and the PCC secretary.

Effective communication is one of our three key priorities at St Giles, with an aim to share who we are as a church and what we believe. This is done for the local and wider community through use of our website, Facebook page, The Parish Magazine, Codicote School newsletter and various themed leaflets and posters displayed in Church and in the village. In 2025, the Communications Team produced a 'Welcome Leaflet' which was delivered or given to people moving into Codicote. This gives basic information about the church and activities that newcomers might want to join. It has proved useful to have this available at the back of church and at Giles Coffee Shop. Logos were produced for the new Tuesday Prayer Group and for Café Church. These will be added to advertising materials.

The weekly update email continues to be an important communication tool for sharing service times, important notices and general information. We worked to improve the format in 2025. It is sent out on a Friday morning to a list of subscribers, mainly with close connections to the church.

The Communications Team meets regularly, maintaining an overview of communications across the church and discussing a wide range of topics including: advertising, displays, Facebook, the website, weekly update email and The Parish Magazine. A who's who board was developed for the church porch and website in 2025 to help people put faces to names.

Working alongside the Mission Planning Team, draft materials for sharing our church core values were developed for use in 2026.

Mission Planning Team

The Mission Planning Team was established in June following our Mission Morning led by Rev'd Kate Lomax, Flourishing Churches Officer for the Diocese, and I. Everyone was invited to think about joining the team if they were interested in helping to shape the Mission Action Plan for St Giles and think about the practicalities of the missional activities that we are hoping to undertake. Initially, the team spent some time looking in detail at the feedback and ideas which came up the Mission Morning before refining our core values, which are the foundation on which we plan all of our activities.

School Governors Report

Codicote Church of England Primary School takes its responsibility as a Church school very seriously, with Christian faith and values deeply embedded in its ethos, philosophy and daily practice. The opening paragraph of the school's Self-Evaluation Form clearly articulates this commitment: *"At Codicote Church of England Primary School... children and adults are committed to living Christian values in their everyday lives, irrespective of individual cultures, faiths or material possessions."* The school's motto, *"Everyone shall know success,"* is rooted in theology, deriving from Psalm 20:4: *"May he grant you your heart's desire and fulfil all your plans."* Christian values genuinely infuse the school culture and shape both decision-making and relationships across the school community.

Collective worship plays a central role in school life. Assemblies take place daily, often with parents and carers invited, and Governors are always welcome to attend. Prayer and musical worship form an integral part of these gatherings and are a visible expression of the school's Christian character.

Governance at Codicote Church of England Primary School is robust and values-led. The full Governing Body meets each half term in person on the school site, with every meeting beginning with prayer. Governors and school leadership work collaboratively, taking their responsibilities seriously and striving together to sustain and develop the school in alignment with shared Christian values. In addition to attending and participating in Governors' meetings and enjoying assemblies, I have been delighted to attend School Council meetings with pupils from each year group and listen to them, witnessing how their voice helps to shape the school's direction.

In 2025, Mrs Pollard, completed her twentieth year as the school's Headteacher and is serving her eighteenth term of office as a Trustee on the Diocesan Board of Education. She meets regularly with the Diocesan team to review, reflect upon and refine the school's progress towards its targets and key aims as a faith school. The school uses the Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools (SIAMS) framework as a working document to evaluate how its Christian vision informs and drives the school's culture, enabling both pupils and adults to thrive and flourish.

The annual Governors' Day took place on 15th October 2025. Governors each hold agreed areas of focus and specialism, based on their expertise and interests. Governors are encouraged to visit all classes and activities. This 'open door' approach demonstrates how the Headteacher and staff actively encourage constructive feedback. Our Vicar, Christie, has responsibility for Collective Worship and Religious Education and, as a former English teacher, I hold the monitoring role for English, Phonics and Early Learning. The post of Diocesan Governor was filled in 2025 but has recently become vacant at the end of the year, this is a priority item for the PCC.

Engaging young people is one of St Giles' strategic priorities and aligns closely with the shared objective of the PCC and Mrs Pollard to strengthen further the links between church and school. Throughout 2025, the school supported St Giles' initiatives to encourage pupils and their families to attend church services and Café Church. This partnership is already bearing fruit, with increasing attendance at Café Church and excellent participation in Christmas services. Since the beginning of the academic year in September 2025, Christie has also been a regular fixture at the school, spending focused time with Year 6 pupils. A key element of this work has been listening to pupils' ideas on how the church can feel

welcoming and inclusive. Towards the end of 2025, consultation with young people began more formally, including opportunities at Carol Concerts and Christingle services for pupils to share their thoughts. This work will continue and develop further through engagement with pupils during 2026.

Safeguarding remains a clear priority for the school. All Governors have completed PREVENT and safeguarding training, with additional training actively encouraged. Governors report completed courses and qualifications at each meeting, ensuring continued vigilance and accountability. The school was inspected by OFSTED on 25th February 2025 under the new framework and achieved an 'Outstanding' grading in both *Behaviour and Attitudes* and *Personal Development*. While OFSTED reports do not explicitly reference Christian values, inspectors noted that *"Pupils are taught to celebrate and respect differences, preparing them well for life in a diverse society. They know discrimination is wrong. This means that unkindness is rare and not tolerated by pupils or staff."* These findings clearly reflect the school's Christian ethos in practice.

The atmosphere within the school is very positive, behaviour is consistently good, and attendance remains high. This is a significant achievement at a time when many schools are facing increasing challenges in this area and reflects the strength of the school's culture and pastoral care and is testament to the commitment of staff, pupils and families. The school continues to hold services in church at Easter, Harvest and Christmas, as well as a special service for Year 6 leavers and their families in the summer term. At this service, each Year 6 pupil is presented with a Bible from St Giles and prayed for, marking an important moment of transition and blessing.

It is a privilege to continue serving as PCC Foundation Governor, and a pleasure to witness the deepening and strengthening relationship between Codicote Church of England Primary School and St Giles.

Café Church

This year Café Church has gone from strength to strength, growing in number and in depth thanks to the help of our committed planning team supported by the hardworking kitchen team, who bake and serve the refreshments. Themes over the year have included: waiting patiently; mission impossible and endurance. In early summer we embarked on a series focussing on the parables of Jesus. Particular highlights included hunting around the PMH for 'lost' chocolate coins and 100 tiny sheep that were given out and then subsequently became resident in people's cars/windowsills/handbags as a small reminder of God's love.

One of the great strengths of Café Church is the way that it enables people of all ages to engage in new and creative ways, with the deep truths of our faith. We continue to be encouraged by all that God is doing among the Café Church community and the important place it holds within the worshipping life of St Giles. The team spent some time at the end of the year thinking about how we might make Café Church even more accessible to families, particularly in terms of the time of day that we meet together. In 2026 we look forward to building on what is already a wonderful foundation and trying some new things.

Tots and Tinies

We launched Tots and Tinies in January in response to a need in the village for a space where parents and carers of young children could get together in a relaxed and welcoming space. Beginning at 9:30am and lasting one hour, the group meets each week in church. There is free play for the children, and snacks and drinks available for both the children and the adults. At about halfway through our time together we sing some songs and nursery rhymes, including a song which encourages the children to give thanks to God for all of his good gifts, and a blessing song at the end. In Spring and Summer, attendance was variable, but the group has really solidified since the beginning of Autumn term. On average we have half a dozen children and the same number of adults, and they are beginning to build relationships and form their own community. It is a great way that we can serve the village and meet people. Thanks to Rev'd Ryan Gilfeather for setting the group up at the beginning of the year, and to all of the leaders and volunteers who support this initiative.

The Bury Home Group

The Bury is a sheltered accommodation complex of apartments and bungalows for over 55s, located close to the church. Our afternoon home group generally meets fortnightly during term time at a group member's bungalow and comprises seven long-standing members. We were greatly saddened by the loss of dear Doreen (Bath) towards the end of 2025, and we miss her warmth, her laughter, and her kind, caring concern for all.

Each time we meet, we begin with a time of deep sharing over tea and delicious cake, followed by a Bible study and then a fairly lengthy time of open prayer, including prayers relating to any issues which have arisen earlier during the time of sharing. All the group members look forward enormously to the meetings and report often that they benefit greatly from them, not only from a social point of view, but also in terms of learning more about God through his word, and reflecting on how we can apply this knowledge to our lives. We like to take our time over the initial sharing, the Bible study and the prayers, and so the meetings are unusually long, at around two hours! We all support each other with wise advice, comfort and love. The Holy Spirit is palpably present during our meetings, especially during the time of prayer. In between meetings we pray for each other on our own, and it is always a joy and so faith-building to learn of answers to prayer at subsequent meetings.

Tuesday Prayer Group

The Tuesday Prayer Group began in its present format in October 2025 with the encouragement of Christie and the PCC. The group meets at 11.00 am after the Tots and Tinies group, which seems to be a good time as the church is already heated that day, especially in the winter months. The people gather in a circle in the chancel in front of the High Altar where it feels the prayers of the ages have been offered over many centuries.

It is an informal group that is open to anyone who may wish to join. There is no registration or need to commit to attending every week, but an open invitation to come and pray when the time and need require it. There will always be someone in St Giles Church at 11am on a Tuesday to lead a prayer session for one hour, unless it happens to be Christmas Day or something similar. Even when a funeral was taking place in the church, the group were still keen to meet and did so at my house.

Although it is called a prayer group, we use the set readings as found in the Church of England Lectionary for the Sunday coming up as a basis for our prayer, which often results in some Bible study and discussion, which leads into prayer for the world, the Church and individuals. Those who have attended have said that it helps them to concentrate on the readings when they attend the church service the following Sunday and listen more carefully to the sermon. Hopefully it also enriches and develops their relationship with the Father, Son and Holy Spirit and the worshipping community.

There have been about eight people who have ventured to experience the prayer group with four to six people most weeks, which is encouraging. A core group seems to be emerging who I hope will be people who can lead the group occasionally. Anyone who thinks they might like to come along on a Tuesday at 11am would be most welcome.

Music

St Giles' choral tradition remains as strong as ever, with further growth in the choir in 2025; the choir now comprises twelve singers, ably accompanied on the organ by Caroline Agarwala and Margaret Connold. We are a happy, relaxed, yet dedicated team, who love to come together to bring our worship to our amazing God, not only at the services themselves but also at the rehearsals.

It is a privilege for us to be leading the congregation in worship on the regular Eucharistic second and fourth Sunday services of the month. In addition, during the course of 2025, we led the music at various special services, including Palm Sunday, Good Friday open air service in the village centre, Easter Day, the Welwyn Team summer Evensong, Christie's Licensing as Vicar, Remembrance Sunday, Christmas Carols and the Christmas Eve Midnight Communion.

We have continued the now long-standing tradition of inviting singers in the congregation and community to join us for the annual Carol Service. In December 2025, the choir swelled to 22! In recent years, some of these singers have joined the regular choir, and 2025 was no

exception. We are always keen to welcome new choir members, not least those from our wider community, as we seek to be as mission-focused as possible.

For the first time in 2025 we supported Codicote Community Choir by joining their carol singing event at the open air Christmas Light Switch-on celebration in the village centre. This was most uplifting, and the Community Choir Leader was very appreciative of our support, so much so that we have been invited to turn this into an annual fixture.

As a group we all support each other in prayer and in practical ways, as and when each of us go through times of need. I am personally so very grateful for the love, kindness, support and encouragement that has been extended to me throughout 2025 by every single one of these wonderful Spirit-filled individuals.
