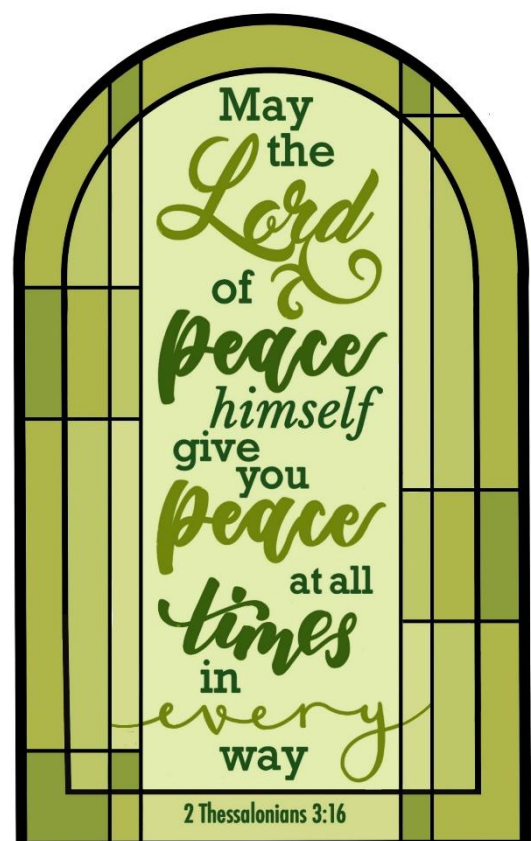

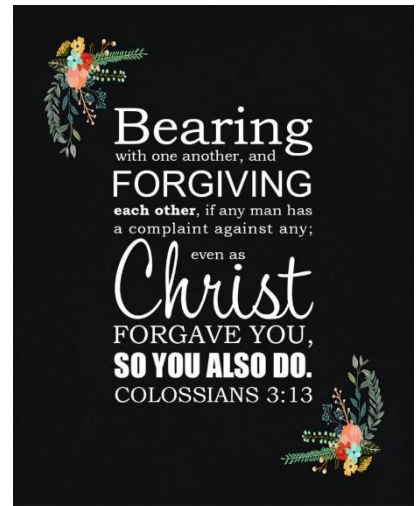

FROM THE ACTING VICAR

Whether it's pottering around the garden, exploring the beautiful countryside around West Moors or just doing some chair based exercises, I hope you're managing to get some opportunities to be a little bit active.



A friend of mine is training to cycle from one side of Ireland to the other for fun (apparently there are people who like to do that sort of thing), and he's been asking me to join him for a decent practice ride for a few weeks now. But by persevering and exercising grace towards each other, we will go on to make us an even healthier church!

THOUGHTS FROM BISHOP KAREN

One Church, One Faith, One Lord

It has been a joy these first four months of the year being the acting bishop of Stepney. The former bishop moved on in the autumn, and bishop (now archbishop) Sarah asked me to support the team as she moved on to Lambeth. Familiar with parts of London, the Windrush Line was new to me, so getting to know Islington, Tower Hamlets and Bethnal Green has been a new discovery, finding new vibrancy and life in the East End.



Spending a couple of days a week in our capital city I discovered frequent buses, the ability to walk thousands of steps a day between tube stations, churches and hotels and a great area team, Archdeacon, Missioner and Director of Ordinands. I met parish clergy, committed laity and young people; the newly ordained and the long serving area dean; interns testing their vocation, vicars to be licensed and new believers ready to be baptised and confirmed.

Yet the challenges of urban ministry are not too different from the challenges we face here in the Salisbury diocese, some churches struggle while others thrive; areas of deprivation adjoin areas of plenty; and partnerships and collaboration are encouraged as a way of sharing resources and working together joyfully in God's world. And the opportunities are the same too. A chance to reach out to those in need and offer hospitality, extending a welcome to newcomers in whom Christ is working, and walking alongside individuals in their faith journey.

As I have been energised by a new experience, so the London diocese have gained from my insights and objectivity. Now a new bishop begins in Stepney and I pass the baton on. It is always good to be reminded that the church is much bigger than our own experience of it, and we share together in God's amazing plan, thankful for brothers and sisters everywhere and for all they can teach us.

MU theme for 2026 – “Join US and JOIN IN”.

Meeting on the third Monday of the month at 7:30pm in the Church Hall.

The next meeting we will meet at 9 Avon Rd on Monday June 15th at 7pm where some will go for a walk, others will enjoy Liz and Mike's garden. We all join together for our BYO picnic suppers.

I would like to thank all those who bought a leaf for our tree, which was to raise money for various projects that our MU branch supports. We made £223, which together with other monies from our fundraisers, will be allocated at the end of the year to various groups.

Many of our branch members will be going to Salisbury Cathedral on Saturday June 13th for a service to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the inception of the Mothers' Union, the brainchild of Mary Sumner.

Mary Sumner was a Vicar's wife, living in Old Alresford. Mary realised, after the birth of her grandchild, how difficult early motherhood was. So she publicised a meeting in her parish for mothers to offer each other mutual support. Her plan was to involve women of all social classes, to support one another and see motherhood as a profession as important as those of men, if not more so. At first it was held in the Rectory, however in 1885 at Portsmouth Church Congress, Bishop of Newcastle, Ernest Wilberforce invited Mary to speak on his behalf. At first she was nervous but gave a passionate address about national morality and the importance of women's vocation as mothers. Women present started meetings in their parishes and so Mothers' Union grew rapidly and by 1892 60 thousand members lived in 28 dioceses. In 1897 during the Diamond Jubilee year of Queen Victoria she became patron of MU giving it an unprecedented stamp of approval. Then followed branches throughout the British Empire. The first MU conference of Overseas Workers was held in 1920.

Mary Sumner is remembered by many Anglican Provinces on August 9th and in the Church of England she is remembered by a lesser festival on this day.

Here at St Mary's we will be celebrating this anniversary on Sunday June 14th at 10am, when members of our branch will fulfil roles during the service, and as the custom here at St Mary's there will be a celebratory cake afterwards,

HIGH MEAD FARM

On Sunday 10th May Sue and Jess from High Mead Farm attended our 10 am service where they were presented with a cheque for £550 by Revd. Jeff.

Sue was joined by our own Chris Scott and together they made a presentation about their history, what they do and how they will spend our Lent Charity donation.

We learned that High Mead Farm is not a charity but is a not-for-profit organisation which helps adults with varying disabilities including wheelchair users, deaf and older people; these are known as "Co-Farmers".



There are 6 paid members of staff and all the others are volunteers. Jess looks after the animals while Sue runs the shop, which has recently doubled in size.

Chris helps with the animals and collects the ducks and hens eggs. They keep bees and produce their own honey. They grow vegetables and several varieties of tomatoes. The animals include alpacas and goats and a pigmy goat who thinks she is a dog! - plus 6 black lambs.

The Co -Farmers receive cookery lessons twice a week and they produce quiche, cake and scones for sale in the shop. For this purpose our Lent Charity donation is being used to purchase a chilled cabinet to display these items.

They received a round of applause and we were all invited to attend their Spring Fayre.

Following the service there will be a Deanery Synod meeting where the main item will be Mission and Outreach, following the election of officers for the next three years.

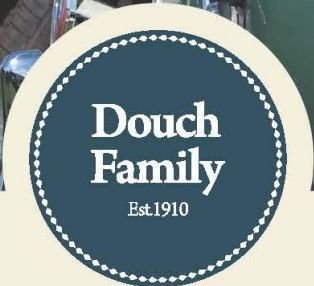
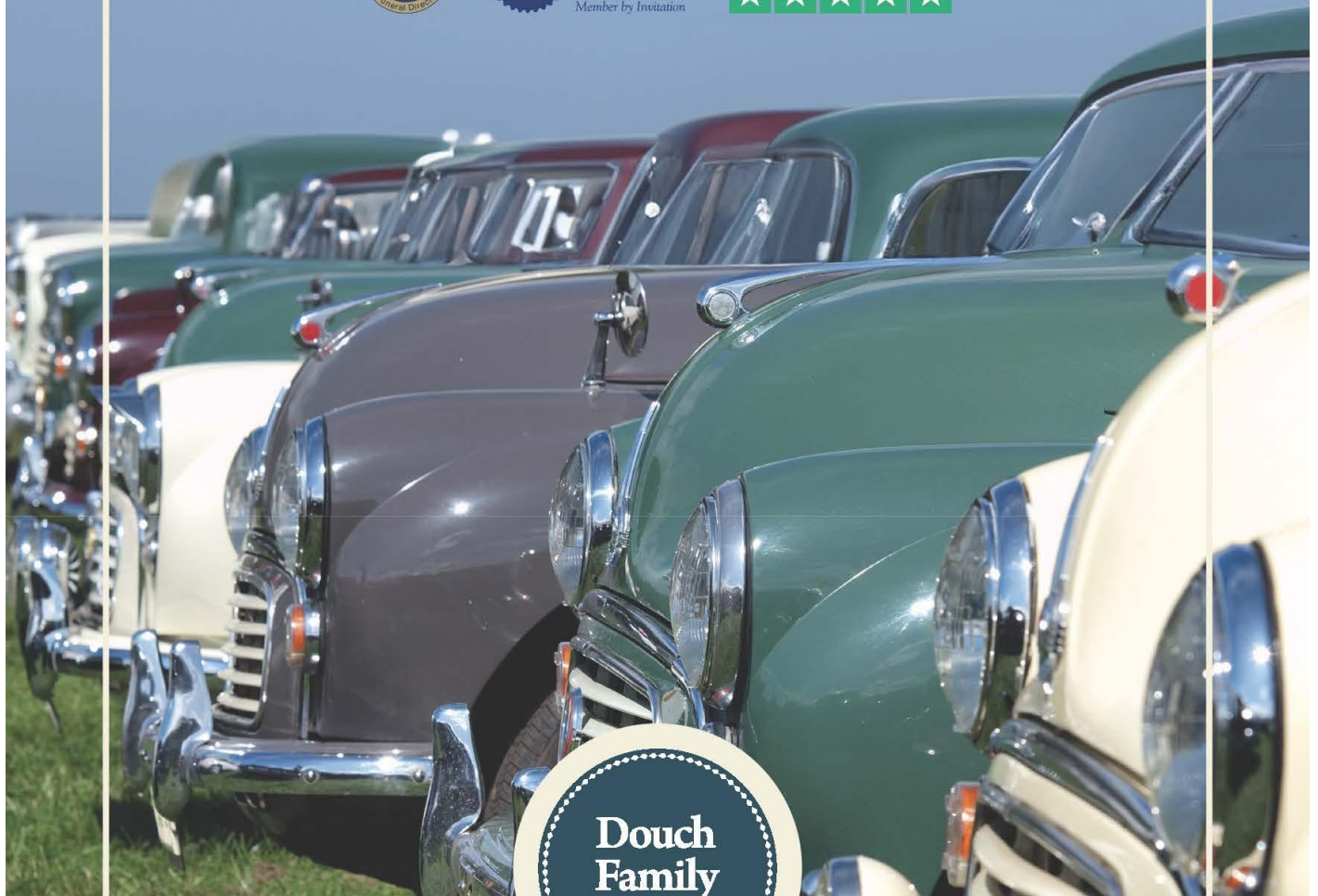

THROUGH THE ROOF - ROOFBREAKERS - OUR DISABILITY POLICY IN MORE DETAIL

A couple of months ago our PCC accepted a Disability Policy.

Here, Part 1 of 3, are some of the key pointers it contained.



- We are made in the image of God, and as such all people are of equal importance and significance.
- In God there is no distinction between male and female, Greek or Jew, bond or free – disabled or able.
- We all, irrespective of our status, have privileges and responsibilities in the practice and outworking of our faith.
- Just as there is a 'bias to the poor' so there is a Biblical imperative to have a corporate responsibility to those on the margins of society and within the structures of our church.

- **We recognise** there are many forms of disability, both visible or hidden, and that many people are living with issues and conditions that will limit their ability to take a full part in the life of the church unless access issues are addressed.
- **We celebrate** the contribution which disabled people and will seek to remove barriers to full participation and belonging; to release the rich diversity of gifts and talents that disabled people bring to the service of God.
- **We believe** that everyone should have the opportunity to participate, contribute, and belong to this faith community.
- **We believe** that people with disabilities positively affect and enhance human diversity and community life.
- **We recognise** that many barriers faced by people with an impairment result from attitudes and environments created by others which could be changed, rather than from the condition itself.
- **We encourage** all people, including those with disabilities, to enrich our congregational life by practising their faith and using their gifts in ministries of discipleship, leadership, and mission; worship, small groups, outreach, and many activities.
- **We will seek** to understand the needs of those affected by disabilities, those who care for them and will support as appropriate.
- **We will undertake** to do everything we can to modify any policy, or practice that excludes those with disabilities from any aspect of congregational life, through dialogue and discussion with all parties involved.

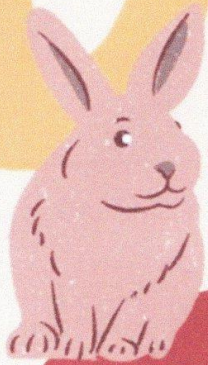
