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Bill Lowe—Local Botanist

You may have seen the notice in our last newsletter about the Say it with Flowers exhibition which took place in June at the Oxmarket Gallery in Chichester and in which the diaries of well known Harrow regular Bill Lowe, were on display. Some of his beautiful images have been included in this month's newsletter. The following piece by local artist Sheryl Pape gives more details of their background:

Celebrating Local Botany: The Legacy of Bill Lowe by Sheryl Pape

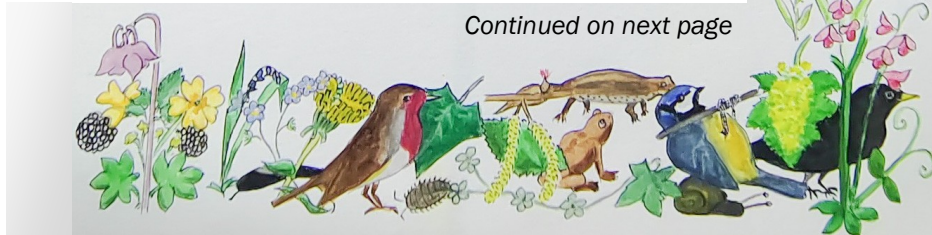
Bill Lowe, a dedicated botany enthusiast, has deep roots in our community. Born in London, his family was evacuated to the countryside during World War II, first settling at Shingles Corner around 1942. His early education began at Rake School and later at Langrish Primary School, where his love for plants began. As a teenager, Bill worked at Baileys' Nursery shop in Petersfield. His fascination with plants started young; he recalls a memorable day when he and a friend believed they had discovered a monkey orchid. After presenting it to their teacher, they learned it wasn't what they thought, leading Bill to promise to never harm a wildflower again—a promise he has kept.

I first met Bill at The Harrow, where he and his best friend, Steve Povey—a fellow botanist—were discussing their shared passion for flora. As a Botanical Artist and SBA Fellow, I had plans to collaborate with Steve on a book about the botany of the Hampshire Hangers. Sadly, after Steve's passing, I had no expert to consult with, however I found a new friendship with Bill, who generously shared his extensive knowledge of local orchids and rare plants.

In 1968, Bill was appointed warden of Noar Hill by Lady Anne Brewis, a role he held for nearly twenty years. During this time, he cultivated a deep interest in British orchids, often consulting the esteemed botanist Francis Rose. Bill's mission to identify every British orchid was nearly complete, with only one exception—the elusive Small White orchid. Alongside friends Bridget Long and Steve, Bill

travelled across the country in search of rare orchids, including the remarkable discovery of the Lady's Slipper orchid in the wild.

Bill's diaries, filled with illustrations and findings from his botanical adventures, are invaluable. They offer insights not only into the local botanical world but also into the social history of our area. As Bill approached his 89th birthday, he graciously shared some of these diaries and allowed them to be displayed in June in Chichester.

Steep Parish Council continues to make progress on several projects and initiatives affecting the village.

Traffic and Road Safety

Work is ongoing to develop the proposed 20mph scheme for Church Road, alongside consideration of wider traffic-calming measures. The Council is also reviewing previous traffic survey work to help support future improvements.

South Downs Local Plan Consultation

The Council has agreed to submit a response to the South Downs National Park Local Plan consultation. Residents are encouraged to share their views as the consultation will help shape planning policies for the years ahead.

Church Road Public Open Space

Councillors continue to examine proposals for the future management of the Church Road public open space, including maintenance responsibilities and long-term arrangements. Residents will be kept informed and consulted before any decisions are made.

War Memorial Project

Plans to enhance the War Memorial are progressing, with quotations being obtained and grant funding applications being prepared to support the next phase of the project.

The next meeting of Steep Parish Council will take place on Monday 6 July 2026.

Stroud Parish Council met for its AGM on May 19th. It was a busy agenda covering a wide range of topics relating to ensuring Stroud remains a fantastic place to live and work. We were delighted to be joined by our new County Councillor – Nick Drew.

The Council discussed the consultation process on the National Park's Local Plan. The council will submit a response that is in line with the outputs of the Parish Priorities Statement that was written this winter.

As ever, the important issue of road safety was raised. The Council are trying to organise a meeting with the Police and Crime Commissioner to discuss whether the average speed cameras on the A272 can be extended to cover our stretch.

Related to roads, please continue to report pot holes and other issues via the OurHants app.

As we are in summer, please ensure to remind playground users that it closes at 8pm. This an important part of the park's lease arrangements.

OLD DAIRY FARM NURSERY

Old Dairy Farm Nursery life has been all go so far this year! One of our biggest recent achievements has been the opening of our new nursery building last September. The additional space has been a huge success, giving children even greater opportunities to learn, explore and grow within a calm, inspiring environment. It has allowed us to further develop our vision for early years education whilst maintaining the warm, family feel that sits at the heart of our nursery.

Old Dairy Farm Nursery is inspired by the Reggio Emilia approach, recognising children as capable, curious and enthusiastic learners. We place great importance on child-led learning, creativity, independence and de-

veloping a lifelong love of learning. Every day, we aim to create meaningful opportunities that encourage children to question, investigate and explore the world around them.

This year also saw growing recognition nationally of the importance of early childhood education and child development, including Princess Catherine's visit to Reggio Emilia in Italy in May to learn more about early years approaches and how environments and relationships shape children's development, something that strongly aligns with our own values and ethos at Old Dairy Farm Nursery.

Being farm-based remains a very special part of who we are. Children benefit from daily experiences that connect them with nature and the changing seasons, from walks around the farm, collecting eggs and caring for our chickens and chicks, to planting, growing and observing wildlife. These hands-on experiences help children develop confidence, responsibility and an understanding of the world around them.

Outdoor learning continues to play a huge role in nursery life. Our Forest School sessions allow children regular opportunities to explore woodland environments, build dens, climb, investigate nature and develop resilience, problem-solving and teamwork skills through play and adventure outdoors.

This year has also seen continued investment and growth in our team and provision, strengthening leadership, developing staff skills and continually reflecting on how we can provide the very best experiences for children and families.

We are incredibly proud of all that has been achieved so far and very

grateful to our wonderful nursery community for their continued support. It has been lovely to see so many local families continue to be part of Old Dairy Farm Nursery's journey, and we look forward to an exciting final few weeks with our preschoolers. They are particularly excited as they prepare for their graduation party at Stroud Revels before beginning their next adventure. We look forward to celebrating with them and wish them every success for their next exciting chapter at school in September.



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As we approach the end of another busy and rewarding academic year, it is a wonderful opportunity to reflect on all that our school community has achieved together and celebrate the values that continue to guide everything we do.

Ambition encourages our children to believe in themselves and strive to be the very best version of who they can be. This year we have seen pupils challenge themselves academically, creatively and personally. One of the highlights of the year came at Easter with our first whole-school performance since Covid, as 50 pupils from Years 1–6 came together to perform *Shrek the Musical*. The enthusiasm, confidence and teamwork shown by our pupils were remarkable, and the production was a wonderful celebration of talent and perseverance.

This year, alongside an ever-growing offer of extra-curricular clubs, experiences and trips, we have reviewed our approach to the teaching of early writing to ensure transcription skills are securely and consistently embedded from our youngest pupils onwards. We know that developing these strong foundations gives children the confidence and skills they need to flourish as learners as they move up through the

school.

As always, a school's success is built on the efforts of many people working together. We would like to thank our staff, families and wider community for their continued encouragement and support. TOMATO SALAD

Living here we are blessed in being the closest county to the tomato-growing heaven in this country that is the Isle of Wight, just a short trip across the Solent! I thought I'd share this delicious recipe with you.

Ingredients:

Isle of Wight tomatoes (as many as you like/need depending on numbers of guests and whether this salad is an accompaniment or a starter)

Fresh basil

Olive oil

Salt and pepper

Method:

1. Chop your tomatoes and put in a large bowl.
2. Marinate - with minced garlic, torn fresh basil leaves, olive oil, salt and pepper. Let sit at room temperature for 30 minutes to create a rich juice.
3. Cook your favourite pasta (spaghetti works very well with this. Please use fresh pasta. Dried is awful with this!!) Drain, and toss immediately with your mixture. Top with Parmesan or Mozzarella.

Lovely on its own as a starter or an accompaniment to anything you fancy. I'd serve it with fish of your choice.

Yum! You're back in Italy with this one and not nearly so far to travel (either you or the tomatoes!)

Summer is for Hawkmoths

Summer is upon us, despite the cold and heavy rain at the time of writing (6th June 2026) and, if the weather warms, summer will be time for some **spectacular hawkmoths**. Hawkmoths are large, fast flying, and often brightly coloured moths.

My Field Guide to the Moths of Great Britain and Ireland (Waring and Townsend 2017) explains that we have nine UK resident species, and nine immigrants plus a few that arrive from time to time.

At the time of writing, we have already had several hawkmoth species to our Stroud garden moth light. First to arrive on 24 May was a spectacular **Lime Hawkmoth** (with a distinctive scalloped-edged forewing and subtly coloured in pinkish and green with a dark green band across its forewings) and, at the same time, the strange **Poplar Hawkmoth** with hindwings that project beyond the forewing. A few days later on 1st June a yellow and pink coloured **Small Elephant Hawkmoth** arrived. A fellow moth-er in Waterlooville has already had the rare **Striped Hawkmoth** (an immigrant from North Africa and Southern Europe).

Other species that we have seen previously and hope to see again are the chunky olive-green and pink **Elephant Hawkmoth**, the massive **Privet Hawkmoth**, the **Eyed Hawkmoth** with large eye markings on its hindwings, and the **Hummingbird Hawkmoth** that will soon be feeding in daylight, hummingbird-like, on our Buddleia

bushes.

Other species that could perhaps turn up are the **Bedstraw Hawkmoth**, the **Pine Hawkmoth**, the **Convolvulus Hawkmoth** (recorded recently from Petersfield), the **Pine Hawkmoth**, and just possibly the **Narrow-bordered Bee Hawkmoth** with transparent wing patches. Perhaps even the large **Death's-head Hawkmoth** with a skull-like marking on its thorax and ability to squeak when disturbed; a rare migrant from continental Europe and Africa and of which a larva has been recorded from Steep but so far, none from Stroud.

Addendum 10th June 2026

Another amazing hawkmoth to the garden this evening. A splendid **Privet Hawkmoth**, UK's largest hawkmoth with an impressive pink and black striped body and hindwings. This massive moth had a body length of 4.5cm and an open wing-spread (in defensive) mode of 10.4cm.



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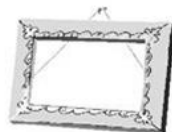
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CHURCH NEWS

Pentecost

All Age Pet Service

June 7th saw a wide range of pets and their owners gather, with black labradors most numerous as usual. A pony arrived at the north door and was directed to the opened south door and tethered outside so all could admire him. We had spiders and glow-worms that survived the canine presence. Graham led us with his guitar and Susie spoke about God's world and how we must protect it. David Anson prayed for each pet by name and at least one dog joined in the hymns. Coldhayes Open Garden
