For many years before we moved here, we would visit Bourton on the Water for a day out. As tourists, we were looking for rest, relaxation and refreshing, before returning to the demands of work and home life. Seen from that perspective, our tourists and visitors are simply people in need. Looking for a warm welcome of course, and help in finding their way around. Looking for places to buy food and to find entertainment. But perhaps there is space on holiday to be surprised by something deeper and more spiritual. On holiday, one is often open to new experiences. There is the time and energy to wonder at the beauty of the churches.

Those feeling isolated in city lives might long for the friendliness of the village communities. Time to ponder those bigger questions of life to which they will soon return.

In the past two months, I have been warmly welcomed into numerous homes, experiencing for myself how well the churches across the Benefice welcome in the outsider and the stranger. Thank you so much for all you do to welcome visitors. Hospitality is a Christian virtue found here in abundance. Our beautiful churches are open daily, with Visitors' Books and space to sit to reflect and pray. They are not like museums or shops. They are sacred spaces, where generations before you have come, in sadness and in joy. If you are a visitor or a second-home owner in this area, my prayer for you is that you encounter here, all you need spiritually, and that you receive it with gratitude.

New Chaplain appointed for Cotswold School

You'll have read in previous 70x7s about the exciting plan led by our local Deanery to appoint a Chaplain at The Cotswold School, where most of our local children attend for secondary education.



Well, the excitement has now reached fever pitch – not only were there 12 applicants, but after an intensive interview process, we have a confirmed appointee – **The Cotswold School is delighted to announce the appointment of Tim Fletcher as its new Chaplain, with the role beginning in Autumn Term 2026.**

You may recall that this role is a shared commitment between the Cotswold School, the churches of the North Cotswolds Deanery, ecumenical partners and the Diocese of Gloucester. The majority of funding comes from the Diocese and other sources, but we have our part to play, and our Chastleton Teas project is aimed at finding that “extra” funding from our benefice. So far, so good, and don't forget our upcoming Chastleton dates on 5th August and 8th October.

Tim joins the school from Sportily, a Gloucestershire-based faith and sports charity, where he currently serves as Sports and Faith Leader. Over the past five years, he has worked as a Pioneer Sports Minister, building partnerships with schools, churches and local communities, and creating welcoming spaces where children and young people can grow in confidence, wellbeing and faith.

Through his work with Sportily, Tim has led sports sessions, youth groups, Youth Alpha courses, community cafés, outdoor coffee hubs, public acts of worship, interactive faith-based activities and community chaplaincy.

Tim also brings direct school-based chaplaincy and ministry experience. He has worked for four years with Hardwicke Primary School, leading activities including Active RE lessons, prayer and reflection days, spirituality days, collective worship, transition work and leadership development programmes, and he currently serves as a school chaplain there. In addition, he has supported Severn Vale School through its

Christian Union gatherings, further strengthening his experience of working with young people in secondary education.

Tim holds a BA (Hons) in Theology, Mission and Ministry from Ridley Hall Theological College, Cambridge.

As Chaplain at The Cotswold School, Tim will work as part of the school's wellbeing team, supporting the emotional and spiritual wellbeing of pupils and staff, contributing to the pastoral life of the school, and helping to strengthen links between the school, local churches and the wider community. The role will serve the whole school community, including those of all faiths and none, creating opportunities for young people to engage with questions of faith, meaning and purpose.

For us, it is time to start thinking how we could invite Tim to support our own youth initiatives (remembering that he is only one person), and how we can best support him. Please continue to pray for Tim, the school and this important project.

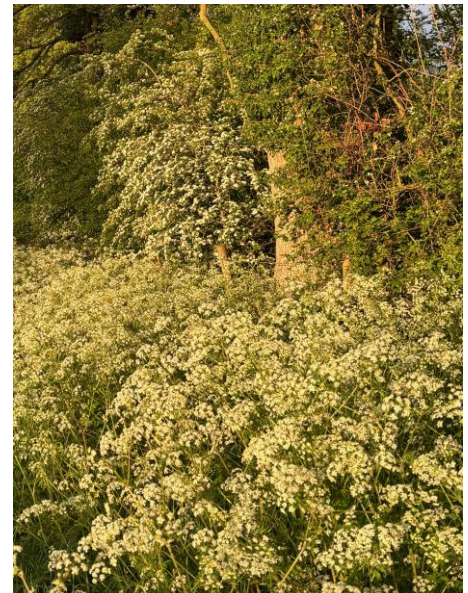

UPPER SLAUGHTER

The weather over the past few weeks has felt more like March than May. After that lovely warm spell earlier in the spring, the sudden return of cold mornings, frosts and chilly winds has caught quite a few of us out. Penny von Holzing tells me this cold snap has a name in Germany: the Eisheiligen or “Ice Saints”. Across parts of Germany, Austria and Switzerland, farmers and gardeners traditionally waited until after the middle of May before planting out more delicate crops, believing that one final cold snap would arrive around the feast days of a group of saints, including St Pancras, St Servatius and St Boniface. Whether folklore or meteorology, it certainly seems to have proved accurate this year.



That said, even with the colder weather, the countryside has looked glorious over the past few weeks. The hedgerows are full of hawthorn blossom and cow parsley, all frothy white like the top of an over-enthusiastic cappuccino! For a few weeks every May, the lanes and fields around the village are at their absolute best.

Hopefully, by the time you are reading this, we will have finally left the Ice Saints behind us and be looking forward properly to summer and village events.

The main date for diaries is the Church Fete on Saturday 4 July, from 12–3pm on the banks of the River Eye. This is always one of the highlights of the village calendar and an important fundraiser, so do come along if you can.
