Rachel writes . . .

Although warmer weather seemed reluctant to come this year, we were finally blessed with a season of blossom, with our churchyards filled first with snowdrops and crocuses, and then primroses, violets and bluebells. The trees have unfurled their leaves and all around we can see the bright, fresh greens of Spring. Just as the natural world surrounds us with greenery, so too in church, after Trinity Sunday, we enter the long green season of Ordinary Time.

The church year can be divided into two halves; the first six months from Advent through to Trinity Sunday, and the remaining six months, roughly from June to the Feast of Christ the King at the end of November.

The first half of the year is focused on the story of Jesus; we wait for his birth through Advent, celebrate at Christmas and mark the coming of the Wise Men at Epiphany, then begin the journey through Lent and Holy Week, to the Cross, the empty tomb and the joy of the Resurrection. We continue through the Easter season to Ascension, then Pentecost and Trinity Sunday, which draws to a close that half of the year.

During the second half of the year we focus on the story of the people of God. We have time to think about everything we have experienced in the first half of the year, and go deeper into our own personal journey of faith. While we of course hear a reading from the Gospels every week, it is an opportunity to also think about the readings we hear from the Epistles (Letters) of the New Testament. As we hear the letters St Paul and others wrote to the Early Church, the encouragements and also the guidance to change behaviours (particularly the Church in Corinth!), we can think about our own parishes, the welcome we give to visitors, the joy we can find in worship and the fellowship we share.

Just as the lives of the first Christians were centred on loving each other and spreading the Good News, so are our lives today, and the mission and ministry of our parishes. The long green season of Ordinary Time is a time for us all to grow in faith, and to think about parts of the Bible or aspects of faith that we might like to explore more. I pray it will be a fruitful six months for us all.

SOME INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT BEES

- A honey bee can fly at up to 15 miles per hour.
- One ounce of honey would fuel a bee's flight around the world.
- A pound of honey is made by 2 million flower visits. The bees fly 55,000 miles back and forth to bring that hone.
- Honey bees visit 50-100 flowers in one trip; they never sleep.
- Honey bees beat their wings 11,400 times per minute. The beating of the wings makes the buzzing noise.
- An average hive has 50,000 to 60,000 worker bees.
- The honey bee is the only insect that produces food for humans.
- Honey is full of vitamins and essential minerals, antioxidants, and amino acids.
- Eating honey is a natural way to get an energy boost. It is a mixture of simple sugars, glucose and fructose.
- Honey is an antimicrobial agent and can be used effectively on minor burns or scrapes. It has been shown to speed the healing of wounds.

CHURCHYARD WORKING PARTY

Dates for your diary

Saturday 13th June : Saturday 11th July - from 10.00 a.m.

We had four tasks topping our long list of jobs:

1. Reducing the bonfire
2. Trimming/making path edges
3. Continuing clearing/cleaning graves
4. Removing dead hawthorn from the archway (left after a wedding).

The bonfire was checked for wildlife. Fortunately no birds were nesting and our "bonfires are one of my specialities" man was quickly and efficiently on the job.

The 'Lady with the Strimmer' was soon tidying up path edges and around a number of graves and a short stretch of cutting back of edges was achieved. This is very much ongoing and tedious; but it's necessary work.

Likewise, the grave cleaning (this involves clearance of overgrowth and also cleaning of headstones) is ongoing and gives plenty of scope for people who like to have their own project. A number of graves were tidied, or re-tidied, and some were earmarked for next time.



The hawthorn was quickly unwired from the archway, leaving it in its newly pristine state (for which many thanks). Has anyone noticed two other places which have been similarly re-juvenated? There's no prize for getting the correct answer....unless you want a free cuppa and refreshments at the June Working Party (no obligation to work)!

Two pieces of animal/bird skeleton were found and have since been identified as coming from the tail end and a leg bone of Phasianus colchicus - more commonly known as the pheasant! Oh yes, we had to avoid the pheasant nesting area although sadly, after the event, a dead hen pheasant was found on a nearby path. I think it had been knocked by a vehicle but it had also provided food for scavengers.

On another tack: Did you know that roughly 50% of leverets (young hares) don't survive their first 28 days of life (based on one study of hares over one breeding season)? Rabbits (different species from hares) are born naked and with eyes closed. Hares are born with fur and eyes open. Both species are independent at about 28/30 days from birth.

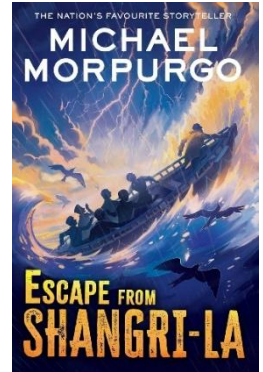

This month I am reviewing *Escape from Shangri La* by Michael Morpurgo.

Cessie's, twelve years old, lives at home with her mum and dad. She is an only child. One day a strange old man is seen loitering outside the family home. He then comes to the house claiming to be Cessie's grandad. He is known as "popsicle". He has been estranged from his son, Cessie's father, for many years. He left his wife and baby son when they were living in Essex.

After a very difficult time in the family home, where Popsicle causes some problems and has a spell in hospital, Cessie's parents decide to send him to a nursing home called Shangri La. Cessie who loves him dearly and has formed a special bond with him is determined to help him escape and unravel the truth of his past. Much of his past is about World War Two and the D day landings when he took one of the boats over to France.

He manages with the help of Cessie to re enact his trip to France to see if he can find out what happened to his first love Lucie Alice. Is she still alive? and what happened to her after he left France.

A lot of this warm and friendly story is about father and son relationships. How they can be badly damaged but also repaired.

A heartfelt war story from a master storyteller.

ANZAC BISCUITS

Makes 24

Ingredients

150g Plain Flour
175g Porridge oats
100g desiccated coconut
100g soft light brown sugar
Pinch of salt
150g unsalted butter, diced
125g golden syrup
1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
2 tbsp boiling water

Method

1. Preheat the oven to 180c/160cFan/Gas mark 4 and line with parchment 2 large baking trays.
2. In a large mixing bowl, combine the plain flour, oats, coconut, sugar and pinch of salt.
3. Melt unsalted butter with the golden syrup in a small pan over a low heat. Remove the pan from the heat, add the bicarbonate of soda and boiling water and quickly mix to combine.
4. Pour the melted butter mixture into the dry ingredients and mix until thoroughly combined.
5. Scoop tablespoons of mixture into balls arranging on the prepared baking trays. Leave space between each biscuit and flatted each biscuit slightly.
6. Bake in the middle of a preheated oven for 12 – 13 minutes, or until almost firm and starting to crisp. The biscuits will crisp and firm more when they cool
7. Remove from the oven, leave to cool on the trays for 2 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely. Store in an airtight container

If desired add a little more flavour –

Add some ginger, either ground or diced stem ginger or perhaps some grated lemon zest and candied peel.

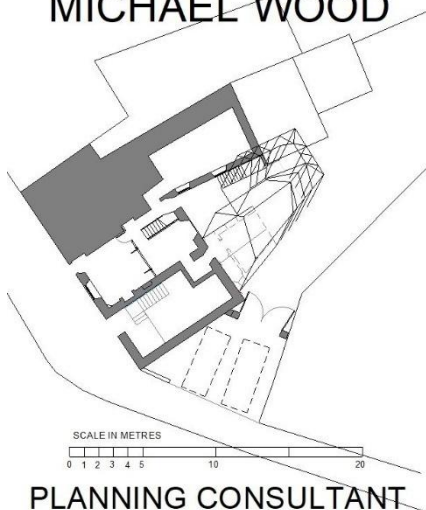

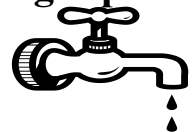

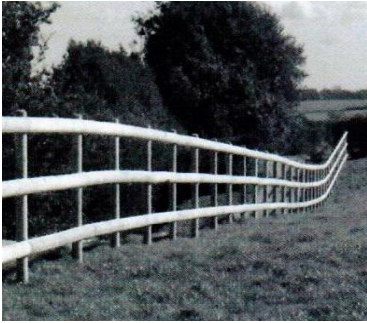
