Rachel writes . . .

My church diary tells me that July 4th is one of the feast days of Martin, Bishop of Tours. This intrigued me, because why would someone need more than one feast day? Google helpfully explained that Martin has several dates on which he is commemorated - November 11th is the main one, which marks his burial in Tours in 397 when a shrine was established. The shrine became an important abbey and place of pilgrimage, but the abbey was attacked a number of times by Vikings and was burned down. His mortal remains were translated to a new basilica on July 4th in 1493 and so it became the feast day of his translation.

Martin was born in Poland in the 4th century, the son of a soldier in Rome's Imperial Army. The family moved to Italy when he was a child and he was educated there, including in Christian education. He was required to join the Imperial Army, and during his military service he had an encounter with a beggar. Martin's response to the beggar was to take his sword and slice his woollen cloak in half to share what he had with the beggar. Later, he had a dream in which he saw Christ wearing half his cloak.

Following his military service Martin became a disciple of Hilary of Poitiers, travelled to visit his family (and convert some of them) and spent time as a hermit. Eventually he was acclaimed by the people to be the Bishop of Tours, but he didn't want to the job. He was tricked back to Tours, but rumbled what they were up to and hid in barn full of geese.

I'm sure that anyone who lives in a rural area knows exactly how loud geese can be, and so won't have any trouble understanding how the racket of goosey indignation alerted the good people of Tours to Martin's whereabouts; they pulled him out of the barn and carried him off to the cathedral to make him their bishop.

Because of his act of generosity, Martin is the patron saint of beggars. He is also the patron saint of wool weavers and tailors, and many other places and groups of people besides. And because without them he would not have been found and installed as bishop, he is patron saint of geese. What strikes me most about Martin's story is his willingness to share the abundance he had been blessed with. What do we have in abundance, and what could we slice in half to share with someone in need?

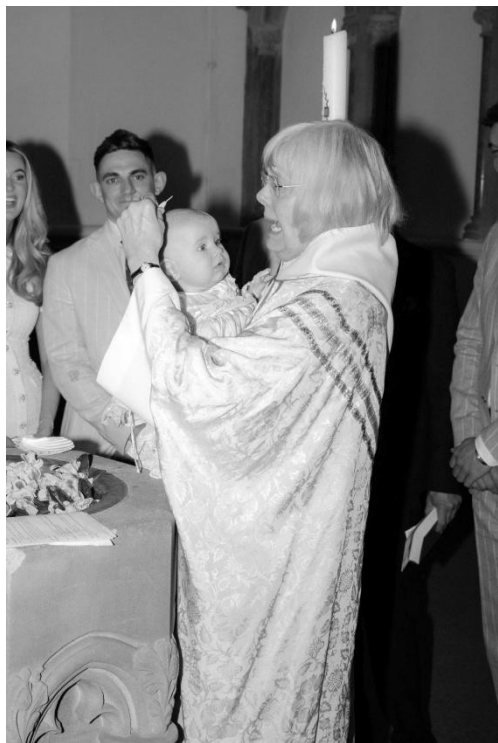

After all the strange, Aprilish weather we've been experiencing, 13th June produced good gardening weather.

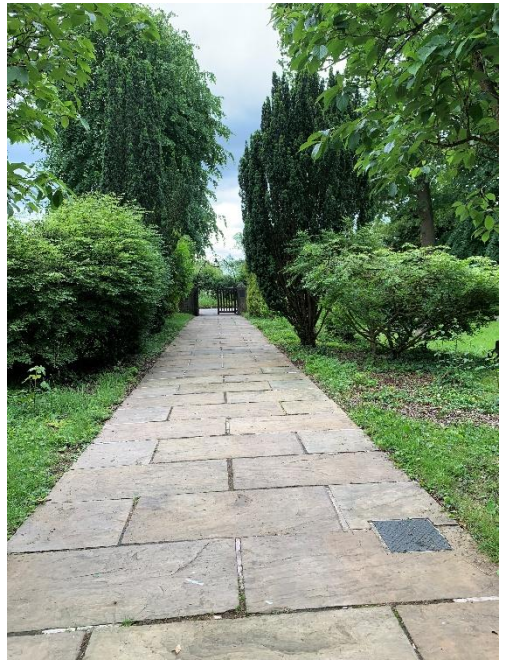
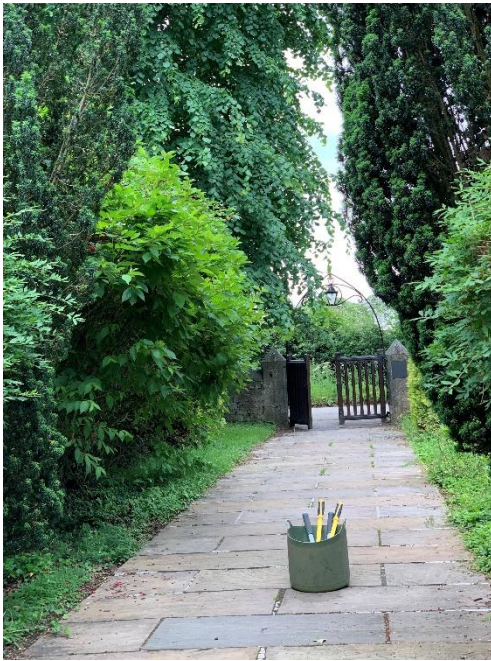
The bonfire has been reinstated and the posh 'not-a-permanent-structure' compost area proved useful when a further stretch of sods was cut away from the path edge (only about a hundred yards to go, then we'll be back at the beginning!). Thank you to the volunteer who came up mid-week a couple of weeks ago, who also did a long stretch of edging.

Someone has recently done tremendous work strimming the area around graves, especially where all the wild flowers were over and the grass was rather long for mowing. This has made a *huge* difference to the overall look of the whole area. Thank you so much!

Incidentally, shortly after our last Working Party I had a text message telling of a swarm of bees in the churchyard. It was too late to do much by the time I saw the message but checking next morning, it was still there. The weather had been atrocious and not really swarm weather, so it was surprising to see them and that they had survived thus far. I no longer keep bees...but knew a person....and so I reported the swarm and by the time Topsy and I had walked around The Hollow and arrived back in the churchyard, the Bee Man had turned up. He successfully gathered the bees, bar a few 'scouts' and took them home to give them a new residence!



Back to 13th June: with one person tackling path edges, the others of us had a team effort working in the area either side of the front path (leading to the church door). This is an on-going job. Last month, you may remember, the back of the bushes (which had not yet flowered) were tackled. This month the flowers were virtually over and tremendous growth had taken place leaving long, straggly branches leaning over the path. These have been trimmed back and will be pruned again later. Eventually we hope to have smaller, stronger bushes. Overhanging lime tree branches were included in this trimming back. On the opposite side, where bushes have already experienced a bit of a down-sizing, plants and weeds were thriving and have been temporarily

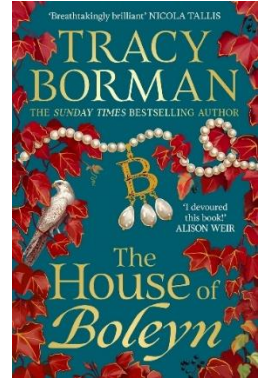

BOOK REVIEW

THE HOUSE OF BOLEYN

This month I am reviewing The House of Boleyn by Tracy Borman.

Another novel set in Tudor times and the well known story of Anne Boleyn. Thomas Boleyn, lord of Hever Castle, is called to London in 1509, to present himself to the new King , Henry VIII. This sets in motion events which ensure the Boleyn name will never be forgotten. Years later as Henry relentlessly pursues Thomas's daughter, Anne, to be his Queen, Hever Castle becomes her escape. It is a place where her trusted attendants and her father must advise, protect and support her. The King sends lavish gifts to Anne and, the Boleyn family are given greater prominence at court , their glory shines over everything and everyone.

Ambition turns the family on itself; enemies outside the castle circle closer and danger stalks the corridors of Hever. And as Henry's gaze moves elsewhere when Anne cannot give him the heir he desperately wants the family faces a terrible, bloody fate.

This novel brings drama, danger and passion to the reader. The Boleyn family's thirty year rise and precipitous fall is written powerfully and emotionally. Although this is a well known story Tracy Borman takes us deep into the Tudor world introducing other players in Anne's tragic story.

This month's book out of the ***Random Selection Box*** was:

Sapiens: A Brief History of Humankind by Yuval Noah Harari

June's randomly generated themes were Poverty & Progress

The Grass is Singing by Doris Lessing: Set in Southern Rhodesia the novel explores the psychological collapse of Mary Turner, trapped in an isolated, loveless marriage with a 'poor white' farmer. Her tragic life and murder expose the toxic racial hierarchies of colonialism.

Mutant Message Down Under by Marlo Morgan A controversial novel which the author says is based in fact. An American woman in Australia is summoned by a remote nomadic tribe to accompany them on a walkabout through the outback.

Poor by Katriona O'Sullivan: A true story, Katriona became a mother at 15 and ended up homeless. This is the story of how she turned her life around.

Shuggie Bain by Douglas Stuart: An exploration of love, pride and poverty, Shuggie Bain charts the endeavors of an ambitious boy from a dire mining town with a thirst for a better life.

The Little Match Girl by Hans Christian Anderson: One of Anderson's saddest and most poignant tales about a child from a poverty stricken family forced out onto the streets to sell matches.

A British Childhood by Frank Cottrell-Boyce: What does it mean to be young in modern Britain? Cottrell-Boyce condemns our failure to look after the nation's most vulnerable citizens. He calls on everyone to protect the innocence, and the imagination, of childhood.

I Capture the Castle by Dodie Smith: Cassandra's diary records the story of a failing writer and his children who live in a ruined castle. A rags to riches romance where everyone falls in love with the wrong person!

The Book of Hope by Jane Goodall & Douglas Abrams: In conversation with Abrams, Goodall explores reasons to be hopeful about our world she closes the conversation by saying "Find your reasons to hope and let them drive you onward."

Mr Loverman by Bernadine Evaristo: Dapper, charming Barry is hiding a secret – but it's not what his wife suspects. A life-affirming story about being true to yourself.

Undercurrent by Natasha Carthew: Set in Cornwall this is a powerful exploration of rural poverty, and the impact of living without the means or support to build a future. A story of hope, beauty, and fierce resilience.

Fires Which Burn Brightly by Sebastian Faulks: A reluctant memoirist, Faulks offers readers a series of detailed snapshots from a life in progress. A frank exploration with the intention 'to arrive where we started and know the place for the first time.'

The Year of the Runaways by Sunjeev Sahota: A tale of modern slavery this novel tells of the bold dreams and daily struggles of thirteen young men thrown together by circumstance who live in a house in Sheffield. Each of them were in flight from India and in search of a new life.

ANYONE FOR TENNIS?



Wimbledon, or 'The Championships, Wimbledon' to give its proper title, is the world's oldest tennis tournament and arguably the most famous as well. Since the first-ever competition in 1877, the Championships have been held almost every year at the All England Lawn Tennis and Croquet Club in Wimbledon, London. It takes place at the end of June over a two-week period.

Wimbledon is one of the tennis world's four major 'Grand Slams' tournaments and the only one still played on grass. It has come a long way since the first competition and remains one of the most popular events on the entire international sporting calendar. But where did it all begin?

The inaugural Wimbledon tournament took place with very little fanfare. Lawn tennis was a relatively new concept and an offshoot of the game traditionalists call 'real tennis' which took place on an indoor court. However, lawn tennis was growing in popularity and the first Championships took place on 14th April 1877.

The tournament had only a Gentleman's Singles contest. No women were allowed to compete and there were also no doubles matches. The first Wimbledon champion was Spencer William Gore who beat his opponent 6-1, 6-2, 6-4 in just 48 minutes. As has become a tradition for many following years, the final was postponed due to rain. This is an occurrence that only stopped with the installation of the retractable roof over Centre court in 2009.

No tournaments took place during either of the World Wars, but the game continued to grow in popularity on either side of the conflicts, and more participants joined every single year. In 1884, the Ladies Singles and Men's Doubles competitions were introduced, marking the first time that women were allowed to compete. Maud Watson beats her sister Lilian to become the first female champion. By now crowds were up to 3,000.

May Sutton becomes the first overseas Champion, the American winning the ladies' singles in 1905. Two years later Norman Brookes, of Australia, becomes the first foreign male Champion. The Club moved in 1922 as it needed more space for extra courts and remains at the same Church Road site today. Wimbledon went Open in 1968. The competition also made history the previous year, becoming the first event to be televised in colour.

Modern players at Wimbledon must wear white. Only a thin single strip of colour under 10mm is allowed on the neckline, sleeves, trousers, or skirt. In the 19th century, Wimbledon players opted for long-sleeved white shirts and trousers with full-length white dresses for female players. In the 1920s and 1930s fashions began to change, but the white has always remained.

Strawberries and cream have become synonymous with the tournament, with approximately 28,000kg of strawberries eaten each year. It also has close ties to the Royal family and has a firm place in British heritage, as well as recognised importance in the world of tennis.

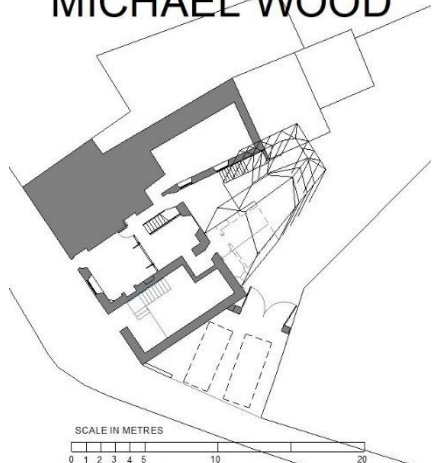

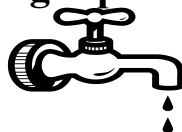
