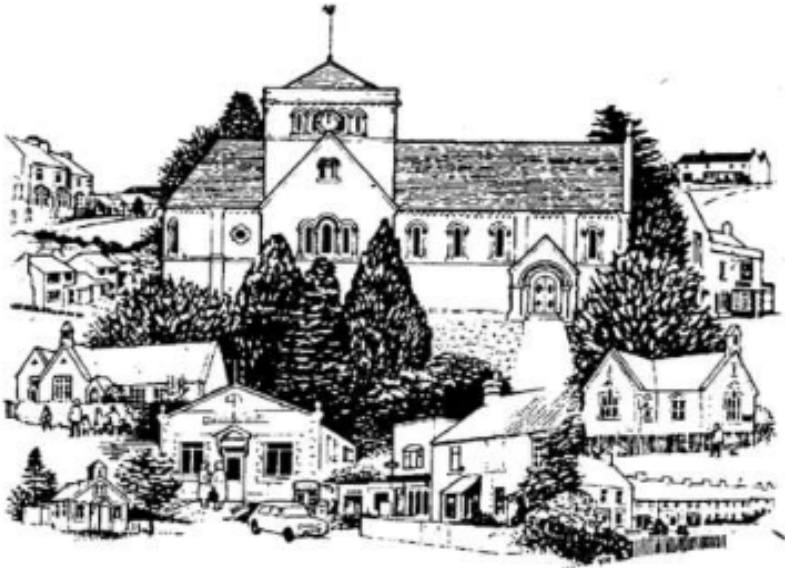

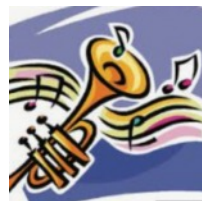

A Letter from the now Acting Bishop of Salisbury Rt Revd Karen Gorham.

One Church, One Faith, One Lord

It was a joy, for the first four months of the year, being the acting Bishop of Stepney. The former bishop moved on in the autumn, and Bishop (now Archbishop) Sarah asked me to support the team as she moved on to Lambeth. Familiar with parts of London, the Windrush Line was new to me, so getting to know Islington, Tower Hamlets and Bethnal Green was a new discovery, finding new vibrancy and life in the East End.

Spending a couple of days a week in our capital city, I discovered frequent buses, the ability to walk thousands of steps a day between tube stations, churches and hotels and a great area team, Archdeacon, Missioner and Director of Ordinands. I met parish clergy, committed laity and young people; the newly ordained and the long serving Area Dean; interns testing their vocation, vicars to be licensed and new believers ready to be baptised and confirmed.

Yet the challenges of urban ministry are not too different from the challenges we face here in the Salisbury Diocese. Some churches struggle while others thrive; areas of deprivation adjoin areas of plenty and partnerships and collaboration are encouraged as a way of sharing resources and working together joyfully in God's world; and the opportunities are the same too. A chance to reach out to those in need and offer hospitality, extending a welcome to newcomers in whom Christ is working, and walking alongside individuals in their faith journey.

As I have been energised by a new experience, so the London diocese has gained from my insights and objectivity. Now a new bishop begins in Stepney and I pass on the baton. It is always good to be reminded that the church is much bigger than our own experience of it, and we share together in God's amazing plan, thankful for brothers and sisters everywhere and for all they can teach us.

Sonja is currently going through the process of 'Safer Recruitment' and training to become our new Parish Safeguarding Officer.

It was lovely to see so many of you at our May meeting. Derek Dexter's talk on Fuchsias was extremely enjoyable and knowledgeable.

The Gardening Club has gone from strength to strength lately; a big welcome goes to all our new members, and a big thank you to all other members for their loyalty over the years.

The trip to Iford Manor and Downside Nursery at Westwood in May was delightful, with wisteria covered gardens, cakes, coffee and plant purchases filling the day.

Our June speaker, on the 4th, is Neil Ross on “What the Gardening Books Never Tell You”. All are welcome.

Tips for June

1. Fertilise your roses to encourage strong growth and good flower production. Use granular feed around the roots. If it doesn't rain during the first week or two, gently water in or use a hoe, being careful not to harm the roots.
2. Plant rooted chrysanthemum cuttings and hardened-off summer-bedding plants into their final flowering positions.
3. Pinch the side shoots from your tomato plants. Gently twist off the shoots that sprout from the joint between the main stem and the fruit-bearing branches.
4. Keep your greenhouses well-ventilated during the day to reduce the surges in temperature. Keeping doors and windows open all day will also allow pollinating insects and predators of aphids and greenfly to benefit your greenhouse plants.

DM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS AND UPDATES



The People's Emergency Briefing

The People's Emergency Briefing is a UK public information initiative and documentary highlighting the urgent climate and nature crises, offering evidence-based insights and actionable solutions. In collaboration with Dilton Memorial Hall Committee, the Parish Council has booked the Memorial Hall to show this film, free of charge. The screening will take place on **Friday 19 June 2026** at 6.30pm. Refreshments will be provided.

Playing field hedgerow maintenance morning 1 May.

During the session, we cleared the long grass and tidied the area around the remaining shrubs. New plants were added to fill the gaps, then watered, mulched, and fitted with protective guards to support their recovery. Dilton Marsh Parish Council gives thanks to the volunteers whose hard work and positive spirit made the morning an enjoyable success.

It has now become clear that the harm caused to a significant number of shrubs along the rear fence line was deliberate. Many were found cut cleanly at the base with a sharp tool, indicating intentional vandalism. The hedgerow and surrounding playing field will now be closely monitored, and any further acts of damage will be reported to the police.

Reporting Dog Fouling

If you are aware of dog fouling, the Parish Council encourages you to report this to Wiltshire Council. The more reports that are made, the more likely that the Dog Warden will start attending problem areas. "I am a rose of Sharon, a lily of the valleys" Song of Solomon 2 v1.

Our May meeting was held in Holy Trinity Church. Jocelyn updated us on items relating to the 150 year celebrations taking place this Summer in Durban, London and Salisbury. We hope to be part of the Salisbury Cathedral service and visit to the Bishop's Garden in June. We have also been invited to take part in the village Flower Show in July. We have several keen gardeners amongst our members. Plans are well in hand for our summer outing to Christchurch in July, with most coach seats already booked.

We welcomed our speaker, Michelle Coleman, to tell us about and to demonstrate her flower jewellery. Love of flowers, their beauty and their symbolism to our everyday lives has inspired her to create some minute and truly beautiful creations. The Mothers' Union can be compared with a bulb; begun by Mary Sumner, nurtured and grown with love and God's blessing to become the world wide movement today and is still growing.

Michelle explained how she collects flowers, leaves etc and then carefully presses them for six weeks, either in a flower press or between the pages of a book, carefully protecting each one between paper or cotton pads to absorb any moisture. Subtle and beautiful colours and colour changes can take place during this process. Michelle then fascinated us all by showing how these leaves are placed into the finished locket preserving their colour and design. Delicate finger work and patience result in a very pleasing piece of jewellery. Michelle was thanked and presented with flowers from Jenny's garden. I wonder if some of those will appear in future creative works. Rosie led us in prayers for the needs of the world and thanks for blessings received.

For our next meeting we will join our friends from Westbury MU for a day of reflection led by Revd Margaret Davies, beginning with Holy Communion at 11am on Wednesday 3 June.

The Swifts Are Back!

At this time of year, it's all about the Swifts. One of my old pair returned on 24 April, five days earlier than last year, and once again, I have to thank my eagle-eyed friend Bud for letting me know that he had seen swifts in the village. I had already unblocked the swift boxes as I'd heard they were flying up through France earlier than last year, so I was prepared. The second bird arrived on 26 April and went straight into the box for a rest and reunion with its partner, which it probably hadn't seen since August last year.

Well, this was exciting enough, but imagine how excited I was when my new pair arrived together on 2 May. They came screaming in, like the over-excited youngsters they are, circling the house several times, made two flybys of the swift brick entrance and eventually both went in.

Now the only problem with this was that a pair of sparrows had just started building their nest in the swift brick and were none too pleased to be evicted. Lots of angry exchanges went on for the next couple of days, during which time my poor long-suffering hubby was dispatched to his garage with drill and boards in hand and instructed to rustle up a temporary sparrow box. He really didn't mind as he felt so sorry for the evicted sparrows. Thankfully they have taken to their new home and have started furnishing it with dry grass, hay etc but they still pop back into the swift brick when they know the swifts are out; somehow I think the 'Swift Wars' may not be over just yet as I think the sparrows are up to mischief. I'm so happy that, after only five years, I now have two resident pairs.

The second wave of prospecting swifts will be returning in late May/early June, so hopefully my two pairs will attract others ready for next year. Fingers crossed! If anyone is interested in installing swift bricks there is lots of information on the action for swifts facebook page.



St Michael and All Angels, Figcheldean

Situated 4 miles north of Amesbury, the village of Figcheldean is found by turning off the A 345 and the church is at the far side of the village as the ground goes uphill. It is mentioned in the Charter of Henry I (1100-1135) although the present building is from a century after, including the tower which, in an early picture, is shown with a pointed roof though the height of which was raised as part of a 19th century restoration. Entry to the church into the nave is through the south porch where are the effigies of two knights thought to have been brought from a different church closed in the reign of Edward VI . The nave, without pews and chairs, enhances a feeling of space with north and south aisles separated from the central nave by round columns making five pointed arches above. The columns, though alike, show differences in the capitals and in some the type of stone reflect differences at the time of building the church. An addition to the height of the nave was made in the 15th century by the building of a clerestory above the central part with windows both sides. In the same century the chancel was rebuilt, the church standing on sloping ground; the chancel floor is several steps higher than the floor of the nave and it is evident that a nave altar is now used regularly for Holy Communion, the same as we have here at Holy Trinity and is increasingly common in other churches. Inevitably there have been other changes and a date stone records restorations in 1679 and later in the 19th century. There is a paper for visitors to take away on which I have based much of these notes and a booklet on the church and village in which is suggested that this was the setting for Longfellow's poem *The Village Blacksmith*. Situated adjacent to Salisbury Plain and a place where troops were based in two World Wars, the church would have been visited by many who left their signatures in the form of graffiti in the stone.

Besides interest in the building of the church, it is recorded that in parish archives 1668 a collection was made for the relief of poor sufferers from the fire in London and in 1670 a further collection to the redemption of English captives under Turkish slavery and 50 names are recorded. Also recorded are remembrances of the anniversaries of the Gunpowder Plot, the happy arrival of William (the third) and of the martyrdom of Charles the First. **Peter Likeman**

Common sorrel

FACT FILE

Latin name: *Rumex acetosa* **Size:** reaches 50–60 cm

Habitat: grasslands, woodland edges, roadside verges and gardens

Conservation status: least concern

Common sorrel is a common, upright plant, often found in grasslands, woodland edges and verges. It has slender leaves and attractive flowers in May and June, peppering the grass of the churchyard with crimson and pink. Chaffinches, sparrows, and thrushes rely heavily on the abundance of small seeds in late summer and autumn. Common sorrel is the vital primary larval food plant for the small copper butterfly. Females lay eggs on the leaves, which the caterpillars then eat exclusively to survive. It also supports moths such as the Forester moth and the Blood-veined moth. Its other common names, from 'sour ducks' to 'vinegar plant' all allude to the fact that its leaves taste extremely tart and dry due to their high levels of oxalic acid!

Flavous nomad bee

FACT FILE

Latin name: *Nomada flava* **Length:** 10-12mm

Habitat: Hedgerows, mowed lawns and grasslands

Conservation status: Least concern

Finally after 2 painstaking years I managed to ID this bee after an obliging one landed long enough for me to snap a photo! Don't be alarmed about the wasp-like markings - it won't sting but it does steal! This solitary bee is known as a kleptoparasite, because it steals other bees' nests. It doesn't have a home, instead it lays its eggs in an unsealed cell in the burrow of a mining bee, particularly the Chocolate mining bee. When the Nomad bee's egg hatches, its larvae eats host bee's egg or larvae and then helps itself to the pollen stores! In the cell, the larvae pupates then emerges the following spring at the same time as its host bees come out. This behaviour is hard on the mining bees, but nature works in mysterious ways and every species, even these kleptoparasites, have a role to play, such as keeping the population of mining bees in check.

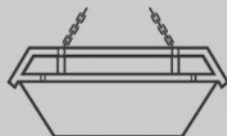

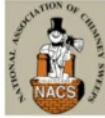

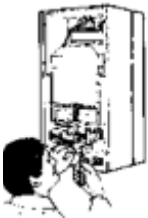
