Thought for the Month

Which is your favourite season? The hope and new growth of spring, the mellow season of autumn, the cosiness of winter (once we get in out of the wind and rain) or perhaps the warmth and sunshine we hope for in the summer (even if we sometimes complain that it is too hot and sometimes that it is not hot enough!).

In summer many of us enjoy a break from routine. I don't know about you, but whenever I go away, I instinctively feel that it gives me an opportunity not only to slow down and breathe, but also to take stock of the positive and negative aspects of my normal day to day life. I often return with a desire to do things a little differently in the future.

In nature, spring is a busy, busy time, with plants that looked almost dead bursting into leaf and bud, and new life springing forth as new lambs and calves and other baby creatures come into the world. But in summer things slow down.

Many people feel guilty when they rest, as though stillness is wasted time. But in Mark 6:31 Jesus, speaking to the disciples, says, 'Come away... and rest a while.' Rest is not a luxury – it is something we all need to build into our lives, and it is a spiritual practice too. Sometimes we can only find God in the stillness when we stop racing about. July gives us permission to pause — to sit in the garden, to watch the sea, to enjoy a cup of tea without hurrying. These small pauses become places where we can breathe and find God.

Summer also teaches us to see God in small, everyday gifts: a breeze through an open window, the smell of cut grass, birdsong early in the morning, a neighbour's wave, a shared ice cream on the seafront. July helps us to notice what we usually rush past. In July, even the evenings hold a soft glow; light lingers – it refuses to leave quickly. Even if we can't manage a week away on holiday, or even a whole day out, we can all find time for a 'mini sabbath' when we can rest awhile and reconnect with God, with others, and the world around us.

As John Greenleaf Whittier wrote in one of the verses of the well-known hymn 'Dear Lord and Father of Mankind,' this is a prayer we can all make to God during the coming month:

***Drop Thy still dews of quietness,
Till all our strivings cease;
Take from our souls the strain and stress,
And let our ordered lives confess
The beauty of Thy peace.***

Book Review

Title: **What to look for in Summer**

Publisher: Ladybird Books

ISBN: 978-0241416204



It was a lovely surprise to discover that Ladybird books are publishing a new series of the 'What to look for' in Spring, Summer, Autumn and Winter books.

I remember the original four books from my childhood and now they have been produced with a new text and pictures for children today to enjoy. Although I shall still treasure my rather battered old Ladybird books, these new ones have pictures and text that are perhaps more appealing and relevant to children today.

What to look for in Summer would make a lovely gift for a child at the start of the summer holidays.

The suggested reading age is from seven years old but these books could be easily enjoyed by younger children, with some support and encouragement.



The Story of The Edward Edwards Community Library in Niton

Last month, the Eco Tips were based around using and sharing the many resources provided by our libraries on the Island. As I was reading about the various libraries, I was intrigued to discover that Niton, like many other villages, has a library that is community-run and staffed entirely by volunteers.

Niton library has an interesting history and is dedicated to the main, great pioneer of free libraries for everyone, Edward Edwards.

Edward Edwards was born into a poor family in London, where his father worked as a bricklayer. After the bricklaying company went bankrupt, Edward became an assistant at the British Library. There he began a campaign to get a national system of free libraries. Sadly, the Conservative government opposed this idea, on the grounds that wealthy would be paying for libraries that they would not need to use themselves. . .

So, in 1836, Edward Edwards published an anonymous pamphlet, explaining how a lack of public libraries restricted education to only a small elite. He published a letter to Benjamin Hawes, who sat on the parliamentary select committee on the British Museum, suggesting ideas for the improvement of the museum library, including longer opening hours to extend the use of the library for working people. The letter was widely discussed and he later joined the staff of The British Museum working in the printed books department.

He became the first librarian of the Manchester Free Library. The opening of this library was attended by authors including William Thackeray and Charles Dickens. However, Edwards' extreme and radical views were unpopular and he was eventually dismissed in 1858.

After this, Edwards wrote articles for the 8th edition of Encyclopaedia Britannica and a biography of Sir Walter Raleigh. In 1870, he was engaged to catalogue the library of Queen's College, Oxford. When the Library Association was formed in 1877, he was proposed as the first president but he declined because he had become very deaf.

He eventually retired to Niton, on the Isle of Wight, where he had often come on holiday. His behaviour became increasingly eccentric and he was cared for by the Reverend John Harrison, a Baptist Minister. In 1885, he got lost walking near the Pepper Pot on St Catherine's Down. When he was found several days later, he had hypothermia, which then developed into pneumonia. Edward Edwards died in his sleep in Niton in 1886, at the age of 73. He is buried in Niton churchyard. Niton Library has been named in his honour: Edward Edwards Community Library.

Summer Eco Tips to prevent waste

Waste prevention is even better than recycling! When a lot of people decide to make even some small changes, the impact adds up over time. Here are four simple ways to prevent waste:

- Water is a precious resource but it is easy to waste it without intending to. When we wait for a shower to heat up, a lot of water is simply going down the drain. Try putting a clean bucket in the shower to catch the water as it warms. This will probably only collect about a quarter of a bucket full. However, that is a lot of water for every shower taken by a family in just a week! This can be used to water the garden, or for house plants.
- In the summer heat, a lot of food can be wasted, simply because it hasn't been stored in the best way. To avoid waste, make sure shopping is put away promptly and the fruit and vegetables are stored in cool places to keep them fresh for longer.
- Challenge yourself to try a new, meat free recipe each week. Reducing the amount of meat that we eat is not only good for the planet but also be good for our health, too. You might make some new family favourites. . .
- Just remembering to take a refillable water bottle each time we go out in the summer, rather than buying a drink in a plastic bottle, saves a lot of single use plastic. This might help to ensure we all keep well hydrated, too.
