Norfolk Churches Trust Bike Ride, Walk and Drive Saturday 12th September

This year the Norfolk Churches Trust (NCT) celebrates its 50th anniversary. During this time grants of over £7 million have been awarded to over 730 Norfolk churches to help with repairs. Our three parish churches are included in this number.

Since 1983, to help raise funds, the Trust has been organising an annual bike ride, a contribution is also given to your chosen place of worship. and has been renamed '2026 Bike Ride, Walk and Drive'. The aim of the event is to ask friends and family to sponsor you for each church visited, but perhaps you would just like to make a one-off donation, either is fine.

Why not sign up and walk the churches in Norwich, bike ride, or car drive across the churches of Norfolk.

Of the money raised, half goes to the Norfolk Churches Trust and just under half to your nominated church (a small percentage deducted is for administration purposes). So how many churches is it possible to visit in one day – 10, 20, 30?

There are 12 suggested routes which can be found on the website norfolkchurchestrust.org.uk/bike-ride-walk/suggested-routes/

One route includes our three parish churches; it covers just under 20 miles and visits 10 churches, sounds like a leisurely day's bike ride to me!

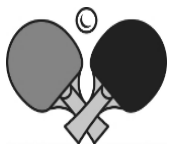

Neatishead Industrial Exhibition & Cottage Flower Shows 1894-1914

Since the creation of a timeline of events in our three villages (for Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee in 2022) and our research using the NIB Archive we have become aware of the "Neatishead Industrial Exhibition and Cottage Flower Show" the first of which took place in July 1894 at Holly Grove in Neatishead and continued annually until 1914.

In NIB of May 1980, Miss Mable Duffield (1902-1985) recalls the Annual Show was a very important event that she attended as a toddler from the early 1900s and which she believed continued until the 1940s.

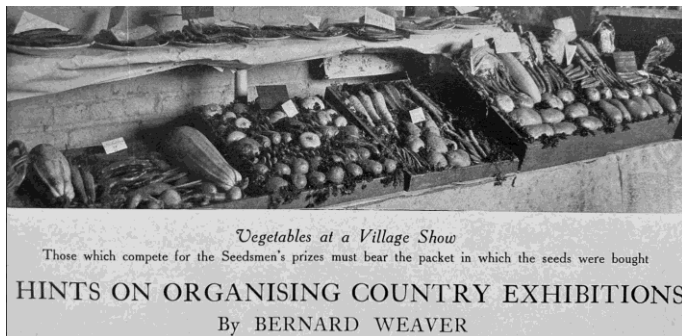
There is also mention of these 'Shows' in Alice Dennes' booklet 'A look at Neatishead' and searching the British Newspaper Archive we have

found detailed reports of this annual event in which the people of Neatishead, Irstead and Barton Turf, including the children, all took part.

As well as listing all the classes which included flowers, vegetables, honey, wood carving, fretwork, home cooking, homemade beer, ironing, needlework, painting and drawing, a number of the newspapers report the names of those who won 1st, 2nd and 3rd prizes in each class.

Looking through the School Log book for these years, it documents in 1905 'Excessive heat – school closed for Industrial Exhibition in Neatishead, 31st July'. Interestingly excessive heat is also mentioned in July 1906 when 'Lady Preston distributed prizes, medals and certificates to scholars – needlework for girls and painting and drawing for boys'.

In the Downham Market Gazette of 1899 it reports 'The exhibits in most classes were very good, and showed great credit on the cottagers' part for bringing up their vegetables in such excellent condition, considering the weeks without a drop of rain. The drought by the way is regarded as very serious by the farmers in the neighbourhood, whose turnips have almost all perished.' It would seem that the weather then was somewhat similar to that of today.



These cottage flower shows are not difficult to organise, and a brief survey of the history of one of the oldest and most successful ones will throw some light on the best methods to adopt when running them.' This quote comes from an article that refers to the Neatishead Show entitled 'Hints on Organising Country Exhibitions' which was found in the December 1908 issue of the magazine 'The Country Home'. The writer, Bernard Weaver (could this be the Mr Weaver who is noted in the newspaper reports to be secretary of these shows?), continues to describe in much detail the shows held in Neatishead, which included band concerts, swing boats, a rifle saloon, tug of war, ladies bicycle competition and fireworks.

One also mentions a display by the King's Own Norfolk Imperial Yeomanry of Turk's head cutting, lemon slicing and tent pegging!! More research needed to discover what these are or perhaps a reader might be able to help us?

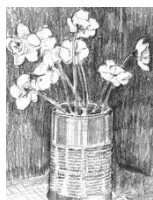

Wildlife Notes

August is the month when many garden bird watchers notice a decline in the numbers of birds in their gardens. This is not unusual as firstly, there is an abundance of wild food available in the countryside and secondly, many of the adult birds are undergoing their annual moult. Whilst they are losing their old worn feathers, they are more vulnerable to predation so many of them hide away in cover and skulk in the undergrowth. Don't worry as they will return in due course with bright new feathers.

This is however a month when you may see something different in your garden as juvenile birds spread out and move away from their birthplace. Already wading birds are moving southwards so look out for Common Sandpipers along the edge of rivers and broads. These are small birds, slightly smaller than a Starling, and are light brown coloured on the upperparts and white underneath with a thin white

wing bar. They have a stiff winged, fluttering way of flying low over the water often giving their peeping call as they fly off when disturbed at the side of the river. As the month progresses, they may occur in small flocks but often they are solitary birds when they first arrive from upland breeding sites.



Lime Nail Galls - Jerry Simpson

On the 8th July I was doing some clearing up in Neatishead churchyard when my attention was drawn to some bright red coloured structures on the upper surface of a leaf on one of the Lime trees. These turned out to be Lime Nail Galls and are pointed pouches caused by microscopic mites (*Eriophyes tiliae*) which occur when the mites feed in the spring and secrete chemicals that cause the tree to form the tubular structures growing upwards from the top surface of the leaf. From the underside of the leaf, they just appear as a small light-coloured spot. They can be found on the leaves of both the Common Lime (*Tilia platyphyllos*) and the Small Leaved Lime (*Tilia cordata*) and fortunately don't impact the health of the tree. I had never seen these before but if you have Lime trees in your garden take a look and you may well spot some as they are such a bright red colour.

In early July a small group of us carried out a moth trapping evening at Barton Common to try and boost our list of moths for the site. It was a warm evening during the hot spell and we were kept busy recording

what came to the 3 traps we had set up. We recorded 120 different species of moth of which over 60 were new records for the site and included 4 species of large Hawkmoths namely Eyed, Poplar, Elephant and Pine.

Diving Beetle – Duncan Hale-Sutton

As usual there is what in fishing terms you would call a bycatch as other insects are accidentally attracted to the light traps and we were pleased to see a Great Silver Diving Beetle turn up which is one of Europe's biggest beetles. Look out for Common Darter and Migrant Hawker dragonflies this month.

Wherry Yacht Charter Honey, I shrunk the wherry!

When model maker John Hollis decided to build his first sailing vessel, he had no idea just how absorbing the project would become. Known for his finely crafted steam and electric-powered models, John set himself a new challenge: to create a fully working sailing model that combined historical accuracy, elegant performance, and extraordinary interior detail. The result was Norada, a striking miniature of a Norfolk Broads wherry yacht that manages to capture both the beauty and character of the original vessel.



Q: Why did you decide to build a model sailing boat?

John: I'd already built several powered models before Norada, mostly steam and electric boats. Each build taught me new skills, but after a while I felt the urge to do something different. Sailing models had always intrigued me, yet I'd never attempted one. They're a very different proposition—you're dealing with balance, wind, rigging and sail handling, not just motors and propellers. Eventually, curiosity got the better of me, and I decided it was time to give sail a go.

Q: Why choose Norada as your subject?

John: Once I knew I wanted to build a sailing vessel, I set some fairly firm criteria. I wanted a model about 1.5 metres long, with a simple sail plan and a mast that could be lowered or removed for transport. That immediately drew my attention to boats from the Norfolk Broads, where lowering masts to pass under bridges is part of everyday sailing. I began researching wherry yachts and contacted the Wherry Yacht Charter Charitable Trust in Wroxham. Each of their vessels has its own personality, but Norada stood out. She's the only wherry yacht with a boom attached to the sail; the others are loose-footed. From a modelling point of view, that made her a more practical choice. I also liked her more slender hull form and lower freeboard—she has a very elegant look on the water.



Q: What did you enjoy most about building the model?

John: The interior, without a doubt. I wanted the inside of the model to be just as engaging as the outside, even if most people only ever see it briefly. I chose a large scale hoping I might use ready-made fittings, but that didn't work out—almost everything had to be made from scratch. That turned out to be a blessing. Making the furniture, lighting, washbasins, mattresses and galley fittings forced me to slow down and really think about how the real boat was arranged. There's something very satisfying about knowing that all those details are there, even if they're only noticed by someone who takes a close look.



Q: What proved to be the most challenging part of the project?

John: Two things stand out. The first was the lack of plans. As far as I know, no drawings of Norada exist, so I had to produce my own. The deck plan was manageable, but the underwater profile took several attempts before the boatyard finally confirmed one version looked right. The second challenge was the Blake Victory marine toilet. That single item involved around 75 individual components and took an enormous amount of time and patience. Sail-making was also a steep learning curve—I'd never done it before, and my first attempt didn't even fit. Starting again taught me a lot, and I'm glad I persevered.

Q: With Norada complete, what's next on the building board?

John: At the moment, I'm enjoying sailing her. She behaves remarkably like the real vessel: she slides sideways when beating, spills gusts gently under the gaff rig, and sails happily with reefs in. She's not the most practical model to operate, but once she's on the water, all that effort feels worthwhile. As for future projects, I've already started on another historic vessel. This time it's the steam yacht Amazon, built in 1885 and listed in the Historic Ships Register. She has a remarkable history: Amazon took part in Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee Fleet Review in 1897 and, remarkably, is still afloat today. She also has a wonderful human story attached to her. From the late 1960s to the early 1980s she was owned by the actor Arthur Lowe, who famously used the vessel as his 'digs' while touring theatres along the south coast. It's exactly the sort of subject I enjoy a rich in history, full of character, and guaranteed to present a whole new set of modelling challenges.

Final thought: The real Norada is one of five historic wherries lovingly maintained by Wherry Yacht Charter and made available for the public to enjoy through scheduled sailing trips and private charters. As impressive as John's miniature Norada is, nothing quite compares to the real thing—so why not come and experience sailing on a wherry for yourself?

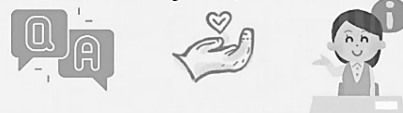
