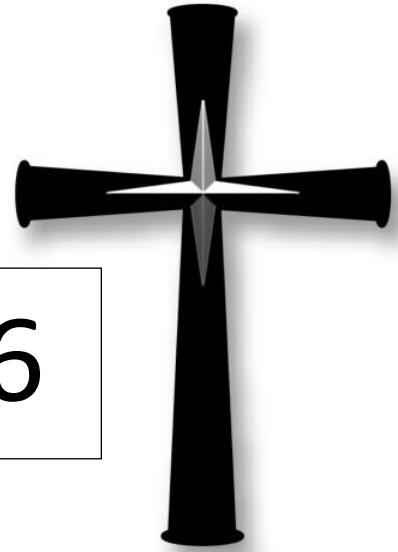

The letter this month comes from Bishop Andrew who will be installed on 19 September 2026

Dear Friends

Greetings from Wiltshire! Rebecca and I are still here, in our final preparations for removal to St Albans, deep in decisions about books, bedding, and the many maddening items we must decide whether to keep or discard. Our Lord's instruction that 'one's life does not consist in the abundance of worldly possessions' feels like an important reminder, as we cram them precariously into the vans that will shortly shuttle up the M4.

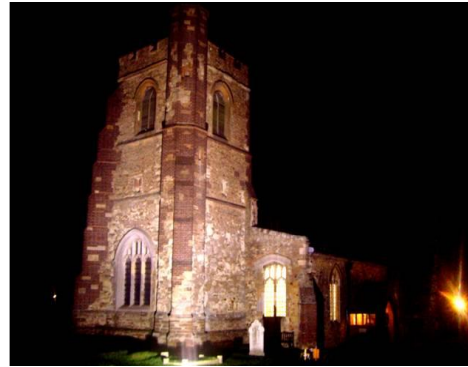
We are so ready to be with you, I might say. In these weeks since my Confirmation of Election as your new bishop, I have been getting ready in various ways - one of which has been reading John Bunyan's *Pilgrim's Progress*. I remember the story from a parish weekend in Knebworth fifty years ago, when we painted pictures and acted out scenes from the tale – Vanity Fair, the Slough of Despond, and so on. Only recently did I learn how many of Bunyan's locations were drawn, naturally enough, from the Bedfordshire landscape he knew by heart, around Elstow Abbey, where he was Christened.

I love the idea of grounding our route to heaven in the places we know on earth, which fills our ordinary world with potential for encounter with God. This was Jacob's realisation in the desert, back into the mists of Old Testament history, when he awakes from a dream to exclaim 'God is in this place, and I knew it not'. Thereafter, not only does he know God better, but he knows the place better, too: naming it 'Bethel' - the house of God, and the gate of heaven.

Wherever you are today while reading this, my prayer is that you will find the Lord God to be there too: calling you - like Christian, Bunyan's traveller - towards the heavenly city. We are greatly looking forward to joining you on that journey and hope to see many of you in St Albans Cathedral in September, for my installation service. Until then, please know I pray for you and hopefully we'll fit everything useful into the van, and leave the needless things behind! God bless you.

Hymn of the month: September

"I vow to Thee my country all earthly things above."

We will soon be enjoying "The Last Night of the Proms" when in days gone by, thousands of people would be lustily singing "I vow to thee my country the service of my love" (it's not always included nowadays). It is a famous patriotic hymn sung at ceremonial occasions, including Remembrance Day services.

The words were written between 1908 and 1912, by a diplomat, Cecil Spring Rice, who was deeply affected by the "noise of battle, the thunder of guns and the loss of life". He wanted to concentrate on themes of sacrifice and of love.

The first verse describes how a Christian owes his loyalties to his homeland.

"The love that never falters, the love that pays the price
The love that makes undaunted the final sacrifice."

In the second verse his loyalties are to the heavenly kingdom.

"And there's another country I've heard of long ago,
Most dear to them that love her, most great to them that know"

Several years after it was written, and after the death of C S Rice, Gustav Holst adapted a melody from "Jupiter" in his "Planets Suite" to fit the words. The tune is known as "Thaxted", the name of the village where Holst lived. It was first performed in 1921 and became the school song of St Paul's School where Holst taught.

The final lines are based on the book of Proverbs and refer to "Wisdom" when speaking of "Her."

"Her ways are ways of gentleness, and all her paths are peace."

CHURCHWARDENS' NEWS

Summer has been a very busy time, more so than usual. The new Area Dean Jairo Nyaongo came in July and August to officiate Holy Communion at the Wednesday morning service in the Parish Centre. He has also agreed to come again in September. Jairo also officiated the baptism of Georgia Harrison in church.

A key lock box has been put up at the church in time for the inspection of the church by our insurers, Ecclesiastical. We are pleased to report no issues were identified requiring necessary action. A fire risk assessment has been completed using their template and will be presented to the PCC for approval.

Several applications for grants have been made and we await the meetings and decisions of the Trusts as to whether or not we have been successful to enable the repairs to the exterior of the church identified during the Quinquennial Report to be performed.

The dead cherry tree has been removed, which required a faculty from the Diocese, and was organised by Rob Prew. It was important to get this completed as quickly as possible due to potential safety issues.

The refurbishment at the Vicarage is underway and is going well. This will allow the Diocese to rent short term but also provide a lovely home to help attract a new vicar to the parish.

Measures have to be taken to control the amount of water being used at the allotments. Thanks to the hot weather and lack of rain, the allotment users have to use metred water to have successful crops. An acceptable programme has to be developed to stay within the budget available. A meeting has been called in an attempt to find a solution.

We are trying very hard to maintain the usual services of the church but unfortunately on a couple of occasions we have had to cancel the Sunday morning services at the Parish Centre. This has only happened at the request of the visiting minister due to time constraints or other commitments.

The search for a new vicar will again be underway when the advertisements go live again at the end of August. Hopefully this time we will be successful in finding a suitable candidate.

Flyers for the open church on 12th September for Bike and Hike have been designed and will be circulated around the village of Streatley. The opportunity will be available between 10 am and 4 pm to play the organ and ring the bells. We will also have refreshments available.

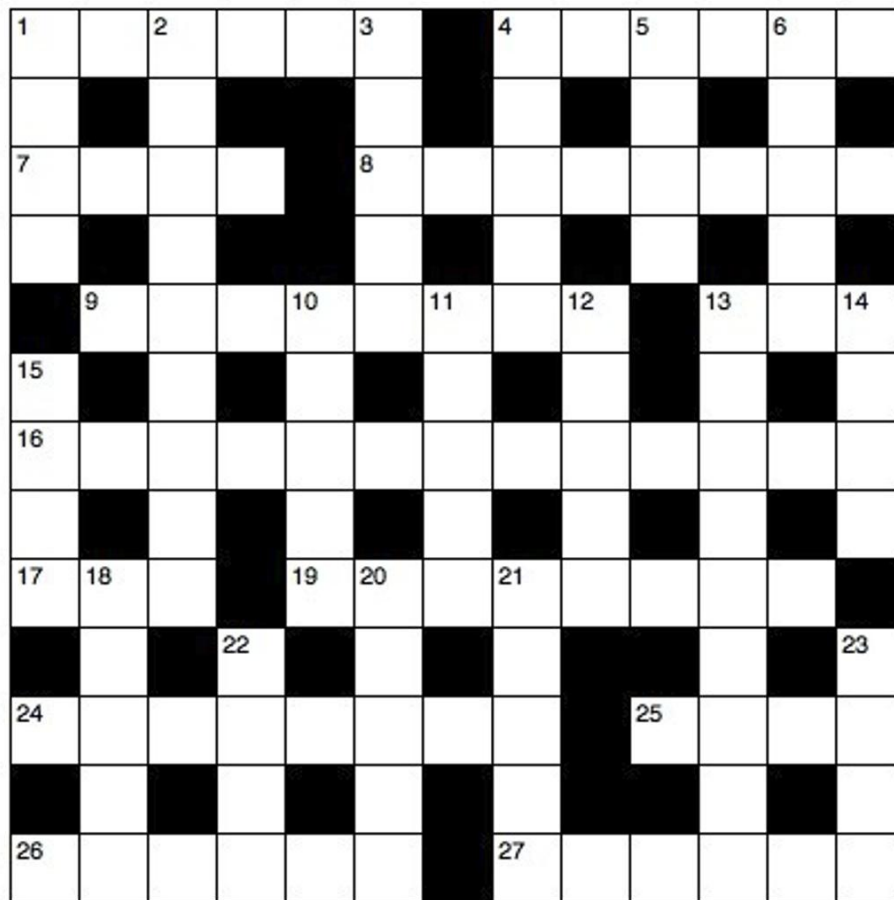

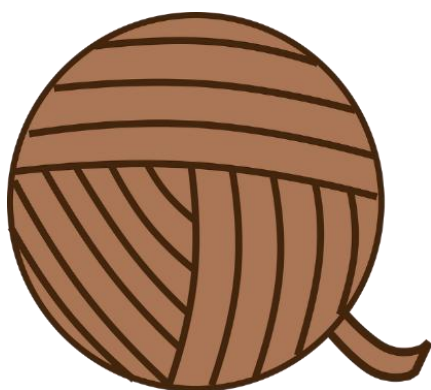

July 2026 meeting

On the hottest day of the year so far we enjoyed a lovely afternoon tea followed by a very interesting talk by Kay Goddard about the history of quilting. Unfortunately, I was not aware of this story and failed to take notes as I was so interested in following her talk - so I apologise to Kay.

During the 1800s, quilting was apparently originally used as codes using shapes. Many slaves were shackled and tried to escape to Canada - many were shot as they fled. Others who were lucky managed to leave these codes on trees telling people to go left or right etc. Kay did tell us how we could use any pieces of material to do quilting and then showed us one she had made (see photo).

Kay is coming again in September and I will definitely be taking notes.

St Margaret's Ladies' Guild

August 2026

On 13th August - the hottest day of the year - maybe the century - we welcomed David Longman who had kindly stepped in for Bill Hamilton who is undergoing major heart surgery and we wish him well.

13 members and 3 guests braved the heat to hear David tell us the story of the Bayeux Tapestry and what an interesting story it was. If like me, you just associated the Tapestry as depicting the Battle of Hastings 1066, I can now assure you that there was much more involved and all very interesting. David a former History teacher who has visited the tapestry at the Bayeux Museum in France on 5 occasions was really able to share his knowledge with us.

The tapestry has been housed in France for nearly 100 years and President Macron was reluctant to let us have it but due to restoration work needing to be done he finally agreed, with huge security checks and it being insured for £800,000,000, it will be at the British Museum in London for 8 months and the first release of tickets for us to view at £33 were quickly taken up - more to be released in October.

The tapestry is 70 metres long and 70 centimetres high - they are done on 9 linen panels although the first 2 do not join together very well. The pictures contain 623 men, 190 horses, 37 ships, 35 dogs and 3 women. The first woman is Queen Edith, wife of Edward the Confessor, second a Saxon lady with her son and finally Aelfgyva - named but not much known about her - thought she might have been part of a scandal at the time. It is thought to be a work of propaganda and shows the viewpoint of the Normans. It is thought to have been sewn by Anglo-Saxon women, who were excellent seamstresses. It was

commissioned by Bishop Odo - half-brother of William. It was embellished in a new museum in Normandy but disappeared from the 15th to 18th century.

In 1064, Edward the Confessor who was married to Edith, daughter of Earl Godwin of Wessex, but they had no children. So thoughts turned to whom would succeed Edward. His chief nobleman and fixer was Harold Godwinson, Edith's brother, who was given the task to appoint a successor.

He was sent to meet William Duke of Normandy and although he prayed in Bosham Church for a safe crossing of the English Channel the boat was blown off course and Harold was captured by Guy Ponthieu's men. Eventually he meets William and tells him why he is in Normandy and Brittany and he joins William's army. Harold actually rescues some of William's men from the quicksand - they are captured in Renner and end up in Dinan. William needs Harold on his side as he is a great soldier and Harold swears a sacred oath of loyalty to Duke William. Harold tells King Edward about his adventures. On 5th January 1066, King Edward dies and is buried in Westminster Abbey. Harold then claims Edward wanted him to be King, so he is crowned.

However, spies from England arrive in Normandy to tell William of Harold's betrayal. So William then orders an invasion fleet to be made ready to take England by force. Then so much action took place with Harold Hardrada, joint King of Norway, who had been stuck in France getting involved. So much happens but the actual Battle of Hastings commenced at 9 am on 10th October. The Saxons fought on foot with shields challenging the Normans who were on horses. William held up his helmet to show he was alive. Normans turned and broke through the Saxon lines. It is claimed and heard by many that Harold was struck in the eye but there is no evidence and is believed to be an 18th century story. Saxons defeated - so William and his men advanced to London for his coronation which took place on 25th December 1066.

It is believed there maybe 2 panels missing which would complete the story. There is a museum in Reading which displays a similar copy with a few noticeable changes.

I had no idea what caused the Battle but now feel much more knowledgeable about it all.

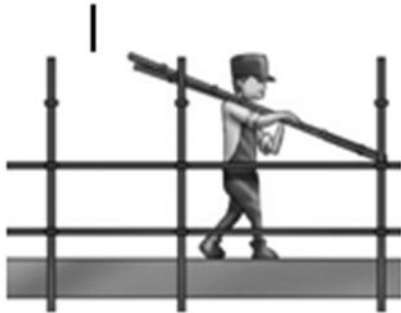
